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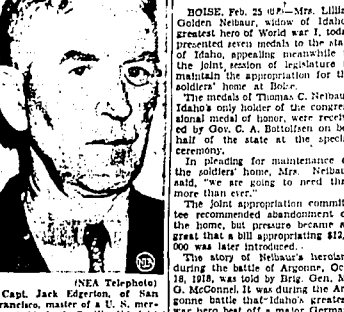

ARMY HELP FOR CROPS DELAYED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said today that plans to use soldiers to pick cotton in Arizona were being held up pending an investigation to determine whether a real emergency exists.

"Further investigation has tended to show that it may not be necessary for the army to harvest the cotton crop."

"It may be found that what looked like an emergency is not an emergency," he pointed out. "We are waiting for confirmation of these facts before proceeding any further with our plans."

"It is recalled that President Roosevelt, at a press conference, said that army men would be used to aid farmers only if a real emergency existed."

Stimson said there were several reasons to believe a "real emergency" may not exist in connection with the cotton crop in Arizona. He declined to say what the reasons were.

HOSPITAL ROOM RATIONING SEEN

BERKELEY, Calif., Feb. 25 (AP)—Hospital rationing may be just around the corner and business men and women soon may be called upon to volunteer as orderlies to provide reasonable care for the sick.

"These possibilities were advanced by nationally-known authorities here for a two-day conference of the Hospital Administrators and Trainers' association of California."

"Unless 50,000 pupil nurses are taken into training this year," said James A. Hamilton, president of the American Hospital association, in an interview, "it may be necessary to ration nursing care on the basis of simple need."

"Further, the 7,000 hospitals in the United States must supplement their staffs by volunteers, with bus-

iness men and women devoting part of their time to serving as orderlies. The nurses' aid program has been a great help, but it must be extended and additional volunteers among women will be needed."

Everett W. Jones, chief hospital consultant for the war production board, told the association that "frills in the hospital must go."

"The day of the private room is gone and within the limits set by the medical profession, hospitals must reduce the average length of stay for civilian patients," he said.

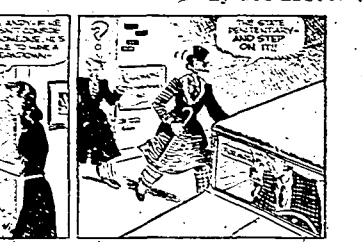

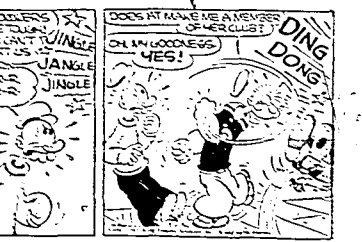

LONDON, Feb. 25 (AP)— Allied sources said today that Adolf Hitler made his party proclamation indicated he intends to raise conscript armies in France and other occupied countries and will massacre all who oppose him.

Went's Hesitate
"We do not hesitate out to demand a contribution to this fatal struggle" from those countries which are responsible for the outbreak of the war. We shall consider it a matter of course not to spare justice and law in a time which is demanding great sacrifices of our own lives.

Wants Force
Later in the proclamation Hitler warned the peoples of Germany and occupied countries that he would tolerate no opposition to the Nazi rule.
