No Cooperation

The house late yesterday passed a resolution for the adjournment at 5 p. m. today, but the senate did not concur. Sen. C. A. Robison, however, announced that he would not attend the session on Saturday night.

There was no evidence of an attempt to comply with Bottelmeier's request for the \$10,000 extra for relief, as was asked by him when he approved the measure repealing the senior citizens' grant act. The legislature seems satisfied in granting the department of public assistance authority for the same appropriation as two years ago.

Two liquor bills in the house, both approved by the senate, will "get a ride" today. Passage of one legalizing liquor by the drink is doubtful. The other, which licenses liquor locker clubs, is opposed by several representatives on grounds it is "unconscionable." It has, however, a chance for passage. Liquor clubs can be opened under present law, but they are not licensed.

Alban Appropriation

Yesterday, the house passed appropriation bills for Lebanon and Alban Normal schools in face of threat by the retrenchment bill. The Alban measure, first up for consideration and test recitation of economy, passed, 33 to 22. The retrenchment, representative of the abandonment of the two normals for the duration as an economy measure.

The appropriation bills for the University of Idaho at Moscow and the southern branch at Pocatello passed without a hitch.

The house also passed a bill appropriating \$100,000 for the University of Idaho. The joint appropriation committee eliminated the appropriation for the southern branch, but pressure was so heavy from over the state, the special bill was put in the house.

match the senate's first successful attack on the administration's farm parity structure.

House leaders predicted early enactment of a senate-approved bill to halt deduction of government benefits in fixing maximum farm prices—one of the cornerstones of President Roosevelt's stabilization program. Only two senators—both Democrats—voted against the bill yesterday. Seventy-eight, including the President's chief lieutenant, Democratic leader Albert W. Bradley of Kentucky, voted for it.

Although farm manpower remains a major issue, yesterday's senate vote temporarily focuses the farm bloc's attention on its drive for higher prices. Earlier this week Wickard, making one of his unimpaired recent appearances before congressional committees, asked the congressmen to give him a "clear mandate" on his food production program.

The answer of the house farm bloc was formation of a seven-man policy committee to coordinate farm bloc demands and possibly carry them to the White House.

American planes also targeted over Burma, completely destroying a Japanese camp, damaging and attacking other targets.
