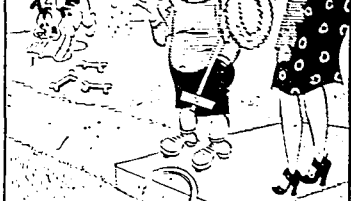

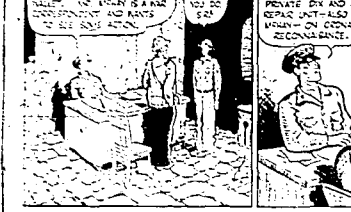

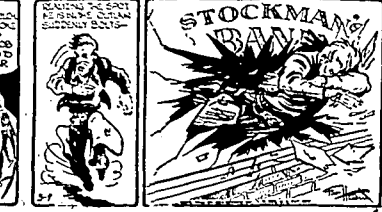

1,500,000 MEN NOW OVERSEAS

NEW YORK, March 9—Col. A. Robert Gimburch, aide to the secretary of War Pattern, said last night armed forces of 1,500,000 men, to be reached by the end of 1944, would mean a restriction in the output of items other than things for war and war workers.

"The total, including naval forces, we can reach without destroying our economy," he told the national ration conference today in a prepared address.

Explaining plans for an army and air force of 2,000,000 men, Gimburch said that the "heart's contentment" of President Roosevelt, Gimburch called the "heart's contentment" as many as 18 men must be producing to sustain each fighter. He said an average of two of them and one-half workers was more likely.

1,500,000 Overseas
The war department said the United States now had 1,500,000 men overseas and estimated the strength of the European theater at 1,000,000. The rest and its activities, he said, had 500,000 on the Russian front, 100,000 along the southern edge of Europe, 1,000,000 on the west and in Scandinavia, 1,000,000 in Africa, 1,000,000 in the Pacific, 1,000,000 in the Atlantic and 1,000,000 in the United States by the end of this year would have that many, with 750,000 men serving overseas.

Plane Riddled By 115 Bullets But Flies Back

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, March 9—An Mitchell bomber with a total of 115 American bullet holes, the Flying Fortress, in getting back to its base no matter what happened, emerged as an outstanding performer in an attack on an Axis convoy. It bombed two axis ships, fought off three Messerschmitts and returned to its base despite 115 bullet holes which left it carrying 115 bullet hole wounds.

This bomber is named, "Junkie," for the wife of its pilot, Lieut. Robert M. Hamilton, 2d, Kemmer, N. Y. "The one and only Junkie" didn't like me," said the red-headed Hamilton. "I think they are prejudiced against Americans."

The Junkie brought its crew back, although the plane's entire system was almost shot out of commission; instrument board shot up and its bomb bay left unworkable.

Twenty bullet holes were counted near Hamilton's seat, 21 near the copilot's place and 61 near the gunner's compartment.
