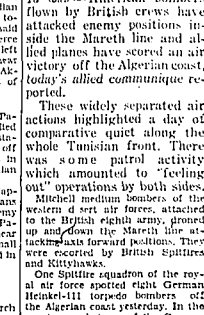

### "EDITING" LOOMS FOR UNITY MOVE

WASHINGTON, March 15.—A resolution calling for closer working relations between the labor and management sides of the labor movement was presented for consideration today before it ever reaches a vote in the Senate.

President Roosevelt was reported to have given tentative endorsement to the proposal. Broad objectives at a White House conference with six senators yesterday by Chief Clerk Tom Connally, D. Tex., of the Senate relations committee is no doubt that there would be some change.

Connally was reported to have indicated that the time is not ripe to attempt to commit the United States to any joint economic, relief or rehabilitation program, as the resolution would do in a general way.

The committee chairman told reporters he was in favor of stating now that the United States wanted to agree with its allies that all working men in maintaining world peace and security after the war, but indicated he was prepared to go further at that time.

The resolution, which Senator Bill E. Whelan, D. N. C., introduced Tuesday, would put the Senate on record as urging this government to take the lead in organizing the United Nations before a program for greater use of labor and management resources, for joint control over re-occupied territory and for joint relief and rehabilitation of people freed from Axis domination.

### Service Men Can Postpone Tax in Idaho

BOISE, March 15.—Pity the poor soldiers and sailors!

Not the Idaho taxpayers, who as March 15 approaches, note that the law pertaining to that service men can defer payment of tax payments until six months after the war ends.

Free Fishing  
They said it was fair that men who are temporarily unemployed should get to fish and hunt free of charge so they could enjoy their leisure hours. They saw to it that soldiers returning from service in the war will be able to enjoy certain benefits from the state just as are veterans of other wars and are exempted from taxation on the property of any disabled veteran of the present conflict.

Other laws made it possible for fishermen in the service to send in advance bonds without disclosing the whereabouts of fish and game to military authorities, and made any military or naval officer an accepted person to administer such laws and from other material duties as needed.

Guardians if Needed  
Still another of veterans' needs, they provided for the appointment of guardians for incompetent veterans. When an eye on maintaining a proper state mind, they said it was desirable for boys in the service to be in the militia for the duration of the war, with their parental consent.

Other laws exempted persons in the armed forces for payment of performance or occupational taxes, and arranged it so teachers' certificates would not lapse in time of war.

These assaults, apparently limited in scope, followed a series of sweeps over the continent yesterday afternoon by British Spitfires and Whirlwind bombers, during which airfields at Abbeville and Maastricht—near Paris—were attacked.

Four RAF fighters were lost on the daylight raids and two enemy fighters were shot down, a communiqué said.

Four enemy trains—including one in Germany proper—were reported shot up in the overnight RAF fighter sweeps.

There were no allied attacks on the continent Saturday night, possibly because of bad weather.

German raiders, meanwhile, were busy last night over the coast of northeast England, the ministry of air and home security reported, dropping bombs at several places which caused some damage but casualties—including a few fatal casualties—were reported downed.

### 42 WOOL LOWER BUT CASH BETTER

BOISE, March 15.—Idaho woolgrowers produced 16,663,000 pounds of wool during 1942, the federal bureau of agricultural statistics reported today, or 100,000 pounds less than the 1941 production.

"A few thousand more alreedy were shown last year than over a year ago," the bureau reported, "but the average fleece weight was a little less."

Average price received for wool last year was 40 cents a pound, or 22 cents above the 1941 average. The improved price resulted in a cash return of \$4,745,000 or \$78,000 more than in the previous year.

Wool production totals and cash income since 1934 were as follows: 1934—18,445,000, \$4,742,000; 1935—18,900,000, \$3,790,000; 1936—18,000,000, \$4,860,000; 1937—18,828,000, \$6,213,000; 1938—17,433,000, \$3,312,000; 1939—16,644,000, \$3,666,000; 1940—16,627,000, \$4,722,000; 1941—16,692,000, \$4,571,000 and 1942—16,663,000, \$4,745,000.

NEW YORK, March 15 (AP)—The Idaho selective service headquarters today urged the military department to get all single men to insure that ungaranteed registrants will remain in the pool and insure military service, Lieut. Col. Norman H. Atkinson, state executive officer, disclosed today.

The plan has the approval of Senator John Thomas, R., today.

"The military department," said Atkinson, "the supply of single men not engaged in an industry or profession is being rapidly exhausted from every state."

"There are hundreds of thousands of men who are not in the pool of the nation, who could be inducted and thus, for example, keep more workers in the pool."

He added that a number of other states have large numbers of single men who are not in the pool and under the present system are forced to be inducted and induct them into the pool.

He pointed out that under the present system, the selective service board is a proportionately smaller number of single men from every state regardless of population.

Single men who are not in the pool can be withdrawn from many states without hurting the war effort.

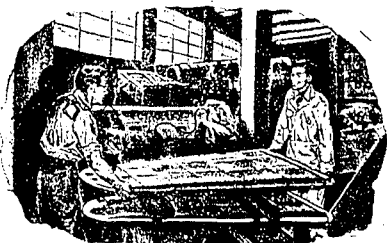
