### VICTORY GARDEN RAISERS WARNED

BOISE, April 22 (AP)—Idahoans growing victory gardens this year to stretch rationed food supplies were warned by Dr. E. L. Berry, state director of public health, to use care in preserving and canning processes at home to prevent food poisoning. Methods of canning used in the home usually are not as efficient as those in commercial canneries, he said in a press statement. "Therefore it is important to remember that trouble-making organisms can develop in a carefully processed food."

"Some of these germs may only spoil food but others can cause serious illness and death if only a small portion of the poisoned product is consumed."

He said one of the most dangerous of these organisms is the botulinus. "If a food is sufficiently acid, the botulinus may be destroyed by processing at 212 degrees Fahrenheit," his statement read. "With non-acid vegetables, such as beans, peas and corn, as well as meats, use of the steam pressure cooker is recommended."

He warned against the addition of small amounts of acid, such as vinegar or lemon juice, as being of little value, and against the use of chemical preservatives such as salicylic acid, sodium benzoate or "canning powder" as sometimes harmful. "The only safe way to process foods properly is with the correct amount of heat," he said. He also urged full sterilization of cans, and careful examination of all cans for cracks, leaks or rough edges.

### BOMBS CARRIED SAILORS' NAMES

SAN DIEGO, Calif., April 22 (AP)—In addition to Japanese medals, the bombs dropped on Tokyo also carried the names of the sailors who carried them.

The bombs were painted with various slogans. Lieut. Robert Noone, U. S. N. R., Auburndale, Mass., said here.

Noone, a patient at the naval hospital, who was signal officer aboard the Hornet, said various objects were tied to the bombs and almost everyone aboard the carrier autographed them.

"Jimmy Donahue took off first," Noone related. "Because of the load of planes, he had only about half the flight deck on which to get air speed. We all cheered and whistled as the plane left the deck. The cheering continued with every take-off."

"When the last plane had left there was a physical letdown all over the Hornet. Everyone was exhausted from the nervous tension of watching the planes get into the air. We mentally pushed every plane off the deck."

Noone, who is convalescing from injuries suffered in the sinking of the Hornet, said the aircraft carrier and several extra crews of army fliers brought aboard to replace anyone who might get sick.

"Those left spent most of the next day and night in the radio shack listening to broadcasts of the raid from a Tokyo station."

BUHL WOMAN IS INQUEST WITNESS

PAYETTE, April 22 (UP)—A coroner's jury last night found that Tom Hargis, Payette rancher, came to his death "as a result of gunshot wounds inflicted in the apartment of Earl Clark."

The verdict was returned after the jury had heard testimony from several witnesses at a four-hour inquest presided over by Coroner Edith Landon and Prosecuting Attorney W. R. McClure.

McClure announced immediately after the verdict had been returned that he would file charges against Clark, who has been held in Payette city jail on an open charge since Harris' death.

Harris died in a hospital early today, 24 hours after officers were called to an apartment to find him suffering from four bullet wounds in his body. Police Chief Cecil Rose said the bullets were fired from a .22 caliber pistol, and reported that a fifth shot had been fired in the apartment.

Four Others Present

In addition to Clark, four other persons were present at the time of the shooting, Rose said.

Seven witnesses who took the stand were able to present no clear picture of how or why the shooting occurred. Mrs. Clark, proprietor of a Payette night club, and a friend, Stella Berger, both testified that they were asleep in another room of the apartment when the shots awakened them.

Clark did not take the stand.

Wen Widener, who had been a guest at the apartment earlier in the evening, also could shed no light on the shooting. Chief Rose and other officers told their part in investigating the affray after Mr. and Mrs. Clark called them immediately after Harris was wounded.

Informal Party

The testimony indicated that an informal party had been in progress during the entire evening. Mrs. Clark had left for a moment to attend to business at her club, she said, but had returned and retired. No testimony revealed an argument or other difference between the two men was brought out by questioning.

Officers said the gun used in the shooting belonged to Clark.

Harris and Clark had been partners for some months in a produce farming venture in Whitby, both of them had had previous experience there. Clark is a former automobile salesman.

Harris, about 40 years of age, was a native of Payette county and had lived here all his life. He is survived by his wife, two daughters and a son.



FIRST DEATH OF DISEASE IN YEAR

BOISE, April 22 (UP)—Dr. E. L. Berry, state director of public health, said today the death of William Wadsworth at Payette was the first death from spotted fever to be called to his attention this year.

Another death, suspected of having been caused by the fever, is now being investigated at state laboratories, Dr. Berry said, but no definite report has been made as yet as to exact cause of death.

Dr. Berry issued a new warning to all persons working in outdoor areas to be particularly careful of ticks at this season of the year. Heavy boots should be worn, with trousers tucked into the boot tops, he said, and a jacket tucked into the trousers, to prevent ticks from lodging on the body.

Persons returning from an outdoor trip should carefully examine their clothing and bodies for ticks and destroy them promptly if found, he said.

"The best possible protection, of course, is vaccination, and all persons regularly engaged in outdoor work should be provided with this preventative at once."

He said his office yet has no reports as to the prevalence of the tick fever this year.

# HITLER SUMMONS BALKAN LEADERS

BERN, Switzerland, April 22 (AP)—Adolf Hitler has summoned Balkan leaders before him, and well-informed foreign diplomats said one purpose of the series of discussions with his satellites might be to raise an army of possibly 500,000 men for an early spring offensive against Russia.

Hitler wants an army to fight against Russia, and he wants to guard against an invasion, said these sources, who have close access to the German leader. Furthermore, an official spokesman in Berlin said that the battles would be continued in Tunisia, and that there was no question of execution.

The latest axis satellite leaders to be called before Hitler are Dr. Joseph Tiso, president of Slovakia; Dr. Ante Pavelic, Croatian fascist leader, said reports received here.

Hitler already has conferred with King Boris of Bulgaria, Premier Musiolli of Italy, President Salazar of Portugal, and Admiral Nicholas Horthy, Hungarian regent, and Vidkun Quisling of Norway.

Foreign sources summarized the results of the talks thus: Bulgaria has agreed to join the German army, will assume the defense of Thrace, to free German troops there.

Autonomous will be growing in his country against further losses, said to have agreed to send to the Russian front only troops who have been there previously, who have been brought home for rest and re-equipping.

Horthy is said to be agreeable to the use of Hungarian divisions against Yugoslavian partisans, but apparently was trying to avoid a new contingent for the Russian front.

## JAPS' DEED IRKS NATION'S SOLONS

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—News that Japan has executed some of the American fliers captured after the bombing of Tokyo brought indignant comment in congress and predictions it will arouse the American people to a greater fighting pitch.

Speaker Rayburn, D. Tex., called it "so gruesome that it defies comment," and House Minority Leader Martin, R. Mass., said "it will strengthen the determination of the American people to fight this war to complete victory." Martin added: "Chairman Connally, D. Tex., of the foreign relations committee described the action as 'brutal and savage and a violation of all international law—it will bring down upon the perpetrators the merited condemnation of history.'"

Wheeler's Comment  
Senator Ferguson, R. Mich., observed, "we haven't had any sadder news in this war," while Senator Wheeler, D. Mont., said "it was a cowardly thing for the Japs to do." Representative Macdonald, A-L, N. Y., said that "when we attack Japan by land from China, as we must, we must take no prisoners." Representative Marmion, D. Ala., commented that "We won't take many prisoners after that!" There were others, however, who cautioned that this country must not let its indignation lead it away from elusive matters.

No Surprise to Mrs. Chiang  
In New York, Mrs. Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the Chinese generalissimo, said that the execution of the American fliers "comes as no surprise to us Chinese who have witnessed the calculated cruelty perpetrated by the enemy on our own people through the years, and especially for the past six years."

Mrs. Chiang's statement, released by the Chinese news service, added:  
"This latest flagrant violation of international and humane laws should steel the determination of the United Nations to bring it immediately to law the enemy who knows no law but brute force."

Just then the destroyer O'Brien cut across right by our funnel, and I was thrown against a turret. Guess it knocked me out for a while, but I don't remember feeling any pain. My back doesn't feel any too good now, but I'll fight again—you wait and see."

## MOTHER KILLS 2 CHILDREN, SELF

SEATTLE, April 22 (AP)—A grief-stricken father, who came home from work and found that his wife had killed their two small children and then committed suicide, said today she was obsessed with the fear that she was a failure as a mother.

The father, John L. Frey, found the body of his wife, Geraldine, 24, in bed. Her wrists and throat had been slashed with a straight edge razor, which was found beneath her body.

Linda, Carol, 17 months, lay dead in her crib. Her throat had been cut. John, 4, apparently had been drowned in the bathtub, but a mark on his head indicated he may have been struck with a blunt object.

A note, signed by the mother, was found on a table. It said: "I alone am responsible for this."

Frey, an assistant engineer in the army engineer's office, said his wife feared that she was not raising the children properly.

"She wouldn't give any reason, and there really wasn't any," he cooed. "She had been dependent lately, but I never dreamed she would do anything like this."

Police said Mrs. Frey had washed and ironed the children's clothes and put them neatly away, then washed the dishes before writing the note and killing the children and herself.
