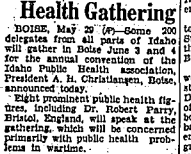

FARMERS TO GET WAR CITATIONS

BOISE, May 29 (AP)—Official recognition is forthcoming to Idaho farmers who have made outstanding contributions to the food production effort, Clifford J. Vaughn, Idaho state USDA, said today.

He said large certificates of "farm war service" are being distributed by county USDA war bonds to families who have made a special contribution in the nationwide food for freedom production-cannass campaign.

"The certificates are a personal recognition for men who are making in long hours and hard work to produce the commodities that are essential to victory for all the United Nations," Vaughn said.

He said that Idaho's farm products are going to all parts of the world to help win the war. Vaughn said Idaho farmers deserved the honor of appreciation. He said they had pledged to increase production of virtually every commodity raised in the state.

"More Idaho dehydrated potatoes will be going to help win the war. Idaho's more Idaho beans will be shipped to the Russian soldiers on the eastern front; more dried milk will go from Idaho to feed the hungry children of the Axis forces out," he said.

"The certificates will bear the signatures of Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard and the county USDA war bonds chairman who directed the sign-up," he added.

Pioneer of Buhl Passes on Coast

Buhl, May 29.—The death of Miss Mary Hinckley, 87, at Santa Cruz, Calif., marks the passing of one of the oldest and most independent residents. She succumbed after a short illness at the home of a niece, Mrs. Sherman Lynch, where she went from Buhl.

Miss Hinckley was born Feb. 14, 1856, in Michigan. She came as a pioneer to Buhl in January of 1906. She made her home with her brother, John, until he died a few years ago. Miss Hinckley ran the first hotel in Buhl before water was on the line. Her brother hauled the water from Coeur d'Alene.

She raised four orphaned sons for her brother. Despite her age she kept up on all current events. Buhl residents remember Miss Hinckley for her erect carriage as she walked into town from McCollum addition, where her home was located. She was a charter member of the Buhl Presbyterian church and a faithful worker.

Her birthday, Feb. 14, became an annual affair, celebrated by close friends.

She is survived by one sister and several nieces and nephews.

Chaplain J. A. Howard, former Buhl minister now in the army, officiated at funeral services May 24. Cremation was carried out in Santa Cruz.

NAVY RECRUITER WILL VISIT CITY

BOISE, May 29 (AP)—Lieut. Fred A. Bartlett, attached to the office of procurement, Seattle, will visit six Idaho cities within the next two weeks to interview applicants for naval reserve officer commissions. It was announced today.

Lieut. O. A. Hebert, officer in charge of the Boise navy recruiting station, said Bartlett would visit Boise, Weiser, Caldwell, Post Falls, Idaho Falls and Twin Falls in an attempt to recruit technically trained men for commissions offered by the navy.

Men applying for commissions directly from civilian life must be between 19 and 30 years of age and should have a college degree, Hebert indicated.

Among those particularly needed were men having degrees in agriculture, ceramic, general, metallurgical, electrical, industrial, electrical, mechanical and petroleum fields, he said.

Work as air combat intelligence officers, interviewing pilots of fighters and bombers, or their return from battle to aircraft carrier, and other assignments is now being offered to newspaper reporters and radio announcers between 25 and 30 years of age.

In addition, men with wide experience in purchasing, shipping, stock control and warehousing, are sought for the supply corps; sergeants aged 27 to 40, who have had four years of college, are needed for the chaplain corps, and commercial officers are needed from the ranks of restaurant and hotel managers accustomed to serving more than 400 meals daily, Hebert said.

TRIO IN COMPANY TO MAKE BLOCKS

JEROME, May 29.—The purchase of one brick plant and the leasing of another, and plans for besting operations at Jerome this week, were revealed last night by Robert Miller, one of three Twin Falls men forming a company for the manufacture of cinder brick, block and tile and cinder attic insulation.

Other members of the company are Robert E. Lee, who is a partner with Miller in the Robert E. Lee Brick company, and W. L. Barber, proprietor of the Factory Radio service, Twin Falls.

Miller said last night that the new company had purchased the \$100,000 plant of the Volcan Cinder block company, Fifth which has been manufacturing cinder blocks handled by the Lee company. This plant has been moved to Jerome, where it is being consolidated with the \$25,000 plant of the Pyramid Insulation company which the local group has leased, with an option to buy.

From six to 10 men will be employed at the Jerome plant, where remodeling and reconditioning is now going on, Miller said. The sales of the company will be handled through the Lee office at Twin Falls.

The Pyramid plant has not been in operation since last summer.

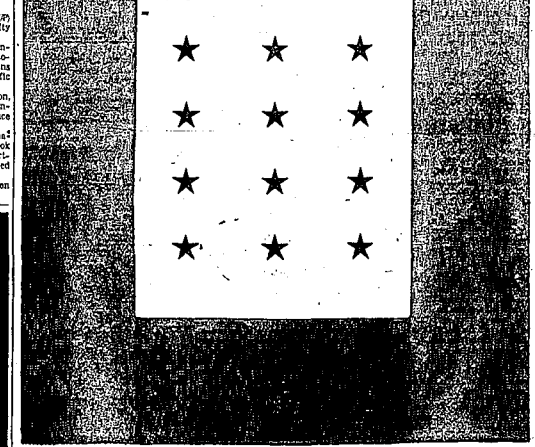

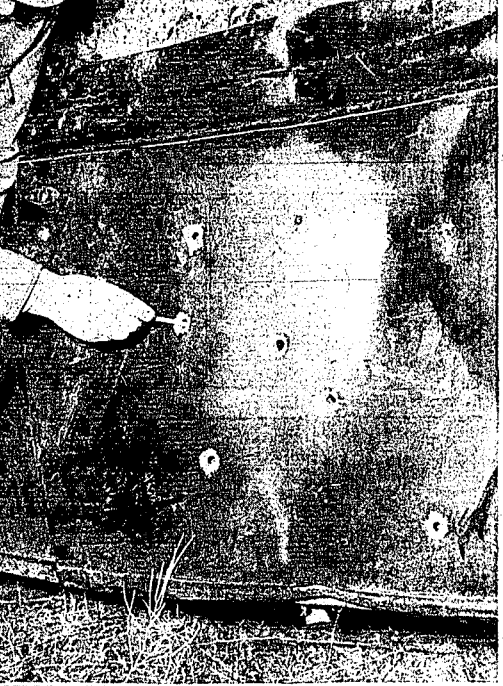

The officers said that those applying would be given a "five" shell, so that they would have one in fire at a target to learn its performance, and the other to hold in readiness for prowlers.
