# Yankee Air Fleet Attacks Axis Navies

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, May 31 (AP)—More than 100 U. S. four-engine bombers, cooperating in twin attacks against axis bases in southern Italy, blasted Naples and Foggia by daylight Sunday and left smoke-shrouded ruins in their wake, it was announced today. Explosions and fires raged at Naples, hit by a force of more than 100 B-17 Flying Fortresses of the north African command. More than 50 B-24 Liberator bombers of the ninth U. S. air force struck from middle east bases at the airfield of Foggia, 80 miles northwest of Naples. These were the major forays of a day which included renewed attacks upon Bardia, potential stepping stones of invasion, and Pantelleria, the battered Italian bastion in the Sicilian straits.

## NAZI RADIO SAYS GINE 22 SET AS DAY OF INVASION

STOCKHOLM, May 31 (AP)—The German radio suggested today that the day of the invasion of the continent was June 22, attributing its information today to "confidential and well informed sources in London." As invasion rumors increased in Germany, Nazi officials renewed its efforts to spread Russian, British and American lies about the German air force. It said the German air force had been ordered to attack the Soviet Union on June 22, the day of the invasion of the continent. The German press continued to harp that the "Hitler first" strategy of the United Nations was a dangerous. The Berlin correspondent of the Svenska Dagbladet declared that President Roosevelt can now order Premier Stalin of Russia how to act. The propaganda line in the Reich capital was this: That Roosevelt ordered Stalin to invade the Soviet Union on June 22, the day of the invasion of the continent. The German press described this as follows: (1) The North African victory of the U. S. 8th Army forces enabled the two nations to throw their own ground forces against Europe. (2) Russia must depend on the U. S. and Britain for food and material, and (3) Russia is having difficulties with its industries and other bad conditions. The German radio spoke increasingly of June 22 as the day when the allies would hurl their full might against the European fortress. They pointed out that this was the date of the German-French armistice of 1940.

## TAX BILL FIRST HOUSE BUSINESS

WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP)—A legislative program to cut taxes and increase government revenue was the first business of the House today. The bill to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1939, which would reduce the top rate of income tax from 63 to 60 percent, was introduced by Rep. Charles McNary, D-Ind. The bill also would reduce the top rate of corporate tax from 30 to 28 percent. McNary said the bill was necessary to stimulate the economy and to provide relief for the taxpayer. The House is expected to vote on the bill today.

## BUSINESS HOUSES OBSERVE HOLIDAY

# REPEALER DEBATE

Meanwhile, Howell asserted that the legislature and state Republican Chairman Reilly Atkinson "are afraid to speak on the recall."
