CLARK ASKS U. S. LIFT BASQUE BAN

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Commenting the Basque citizens of Idaho and their contribution to the development of the state, Senator Clark, D. Id., has asked Congress to lift the Basque ban. He said he had received many letters from Basque citizens in this country to remain here permanently.

He has introduced a bill which would instruct the immigration service to consider Basque citizens lawfully admitted to this country, despite the fact that they arrived without passports, as deserting alien men.

One of Idaho's most pressing problems in connection with the bill, is the obtaining and holding of sheepherders. Idaho's sheep industry is one of the state's most valuable assets and of course the meat and wool are vitally necessary to the effort of deserting alien men. It has been almost impossible to obtain men to take care of the sheep and even when obtained, it has been difficult to retain them. In view of higher wages being paid in war work in adjoining states.

"Among our finest citizens who have done so much for the sheep industry are the Basque people. A large majority of these people have preferred to remain in Idaho instead of seeking higher wages elsewhere in other parts of the country. They have sufficient meat and clothing for their fighting force."

"However, the immigration service discovered that some of these people were overzealous in wanting to get away from the old world and make their homes in America and, consequently, had deserted foreign ships on which they were employed as seamen. Apart from this technical desertion, their records are not only clean but excellent. Several were investigated by the immigration service and also by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Both agencies gave them exceptionally good character."

BONUS AVAILABLE TO SPUD GROWERS

GOODING, June 8.—Gooding county farmers who are growing potato and truck crops this year will sign a petition for the postcard form sent to them by the Gooding county AAA office by June 20 to be eligible for the special payments to be made under the department of agriculture's food for freedom program, according to Harrie Parsons, secretary of the county AAA committee.

Payments will be made at the rate of 85¢ a bushel of normal yield of potatoes and \$50 an acre of commercial vegetables on the acreage between 90 and 110 per cent of the 1943 goal set for these crops on the individual farm.

Mr. Parsons explained "We must have the signature of every eligible grower, signifying that he expects to meet the payment program provisions. Legislation assigned to the department of agriculture through previous legislation and have to be obligated by that date."

Recent discussions in congress to amend "incentive payments" will have no bearing on the 1943 payment program for potatoes and truck crops, according to Mr. Parsons.

Any grower of these crops who has not received the postcard form to be signed and returned, should contact the county AAA office at Gooding immediately so they will be received as eligible, the secretary said.

HUGE MERCHANT FLEET PREDICTED

BALTIMORE, June 8.—Near Admiral Emory S. Land last night announced a record-breaking merchant fleet of from 15 to 20 million tons under the American flag after the war.

The chairman of the U. S. maritime commission, lying down the most concrete program of post-war shipping policy yet advanced by a government official, advocated reversal of former commission policy by adoption of transport ships as a definite part of the maritime economy after the war.

Transport shipping, he stressed, is favored by the commission as a means of shipping which follows no definite routes or schedules, but goes when and where cargo may be found.

The admiral spoke at a dinner given by the Maryland Historical society in observance of maritime day.

Other suggestions Land's program embraced were: Private ownership, private operation and private construction; shipment of "a liberal percentage of our overseas traffic in American bottoms; establishment of proper routes, lines and services with a minimum of American competition, as foreign flags furnish all possible competition necessary; and maintenance for the duration of the commission's present policy of holding title to new ships.

Senator Butler, D. N. C., chairman of the Senate commerce committee, said the program is "a definite part of the maritime economy after the war."

PITTSBURGH, June 8 (AP)—Brooklyn's Dodgers clustered four hits for four runs in the eighth inning, winding up their nine-to-one successful western tour with a 4 to 1 night game victory over Pittsburgh before 19,123 fans. The triumph put the Dodgers into a virtual tie with St. Louis for the league leadership, although trailing by 20 percentage points.

It was another personal triumph for fat Freddy Fitzsimmons over the Pirates, who had beaten him for the first time in three years earlier in this city.

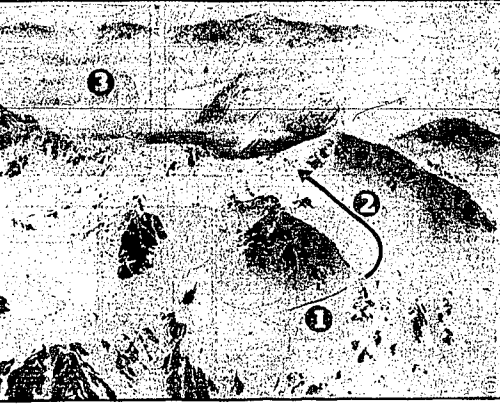
