Rhineland Points Attacked by RAF in Nonstop Drive

LONDON, June 14 (AP)—The RAF bombed objectives in the Rhineland and in other parts of Germany last night and laid mines in enemy waters, extending the virtually nonstop aerial offensive, the air ministry announced today.

The specific targets named, nor was any indication of the size of the raiding groups.

One British plane was lost, the air ministry said.

Reuters recorded a German broadcast saying "American planes attacked Flushing in the Netherlands yesterday morning. Flushing was one of the targets of RAF day-night raiders Sunday."

Formations of the big bombers were heard passing over the channel coast last night, and the offensive was the United States bombers had left after Sunday night.

RAF day-night raiders, meanwhile, were heard passing over the coast town in London at an early morning alert in London and the coast town.

Yanks Hit Navy Centers

The double-barrage attack yesterday by the eighth U. S. air force against the German navy headquarters in the Rhineland, was the most serious of the operations, said the price was not too high for the results achieved.

Heaviest Toll

It was the heaviest toll ever suffered in a single U. S. air force raid in the Rhineland.

The British fleet 24 bombers attacked a ship in the Rhineland, and the German command, causing heavy damage.

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Waves of Yankee Bombers Attack Sicily in Pre-Invasion Offensive

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, North Africa, June 14 (UP)—Waves of American four-engine bombers, pushing a possible pre-invasion aerial offensive against Sicily, shattered installations at two big airfields yesterday and ran up the two-day toll of enemy planes hit in attacks on this strategic island to at least 152, it was announced today.

The middle-eastern command took the assault on Sicily, a Cairo communique revealed, while the northern African air force confined their activities to patrolling and reconnaissance after a record conquest of three Italian islands in the Sicilian narrows in three days.

An Italian communique said axis planes sank one merchant ship and damaged another in an attack on allied shipping in the Sicilian straits and off the "Toledo" area.

Bomb Attacks Doubt Ended by Air Power

LONDON, June 14 (UP)—The latest investigation of the attack on Sicily to blast way into Europe from the Mediterranean coast, has been shattered by the demonstration of air power in the Mediterranean.

This does not mean the allies are likely to land on Sicily in the near future, it is clear from the reports of the Mediterranean command.

It is increasing belief that an allied generalissimo charged with investigating the many-sided offensive against Sicily, has been appointed. Speculation continues that the generalissimo will be an American, U. S. chief of staff, with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower suggested.

Full Power Not Used

The full power of the U. S. air force in the Mediterranean was achieved with what amounted to a second string of the first line based on the British.

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Coal Row Waits for Ruling of Board

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Japs Continue to Fall Back Before Chinese, U. S. Airmen

American airmen, carrying out a campaign of furious bombing and strafing raids on the enemy's bases, and Chinese commandos striking coordinated blows at Japanese rear, have fashioned new air-land tactics against the Japanese in the China theater, Chinese reported today.

More than 100 bombers were dropped on the big Japanese airfield at Nanchang in Kiangsi province, a strategic base for the Japanese in advanced front in central China.

The Chinese commandos killed 400 Japanese in attacks on their bases behind the front lines in the Kowloon area along the middle Yangtze.

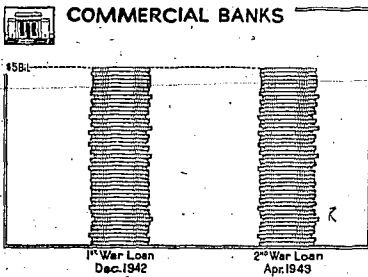

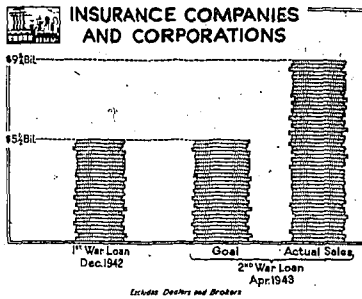
Where did the money come from?

Insurance Companies and other Corporations know that there is no sounder investment than a U. S. Bond. The chart (top of the next column) shows their purchases:

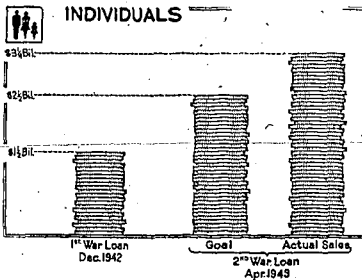


Naturally, it was your money that bought the bonds in the two groups above—for you are the people who put your money in banks and invest in insurance.

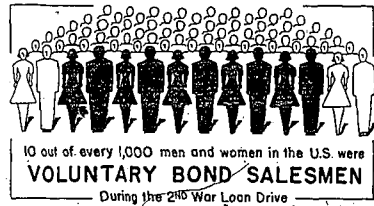
Or, to look at it in terms of those best able to buy bonds, see the chart at top of next column:
