### RUSSIAN MICH LIKE AMERICANS

(Eddy Gilmore, who gives the following in the "Eddy Gilmore" column, has just returned after nearly two years as an Associated Press correspondent in Moscow.)

NEW YORK, June 18 (UP)—Russia is not a land of beards. I have seen more beards in New York in the few days I've been back here than I did during the 20 months I lived in the Soviet Union.

Russians are clean and neat. Every body wears boots who can find them. And this is a very sound idea because Russia is very cold. "Russians," as Lieutenant General Malinovsky, the Russian general, said to us in a little Cossack schoolhouse on the banks of the Don, "are like Americans. They have a party. They start their party and they close their party. In fact, I don't remember a party ever suggesting that we were sleepy or that we were tired or that we weren't got staying power, as who doesn't know from one look at the middle section and violet of the third section of the bell."

Russians like to make speeches and give a lot of addresses. They are very fond of telling jokes and some of them are very funny, and some of them are not—just like some of ours.

As a matter of fact, I am far from having an inferiority complex. They think they're pretty good, and if you do not know you know they are.

Russians are beautiful curly people. I mean by that when they get together they get together as they do it with beautiful disdain. And again I point to the Russians, and I don't think there will be one.

As a matter of fact, I think they are the most hospitable people I know and some of them are very good, and we deal in that commodity, also.

### FIVE-YEAR FOOD PLAN SUGGESTED

WASHINGTON, June 18 (UP)—A five-year plan for increasing food production by an amount sufficient to feed 100,000,000 more people a year is proposed by Secretary of the Interior Felix.

The federal appropriations committee released a letter from Felix to Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace, suggesting the progressive expansion of food production "as a minimum program for increasing food production for meeting the most pressing deficiencies in food production in the United States."

"It contemplates," he wrote, "increased production aggregating at least 15 billion pounds of fish, 10,000,000 bushels of wheat, a billion pounds of beans, and more than 100,000,000 bushels of potatoes. These commodities are not offered as a balanced diet by themselves, and their translation into overall caloric value (roughly for 100,000,000 persons a year) is the objective only of the scope of the program."

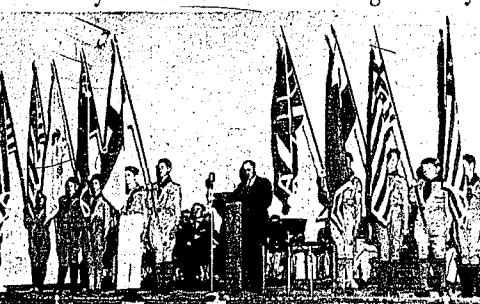
The fish and wildlife service suggested increasing the yield of commercial fisheries, development of farm fish ponds, encouragement of fishing on domestic waters, and greater consumption of wild game meat.

The bureau of reclamation told plans to provide water for millions of acres in the western states. The office of Indian affairs proposed bringing idle Indian land into cultivation and increasing livestock production; the grazing service and the general land office dwelled on the management of grazing; and the geological survey concerned itself with the supply of mineral fertilizers and irrigation water.

### Colorful Climactic Ceremony Closes Flag Week Observance

PATRICIA PALMER, celebrating the anniversary of "old glory" birth, the annual patriotic flag ritual of the flag lodge was attended by a festive throng at the municipal band concert Thursday night.

The evolution of the American flag was traced by Leon A. Chaplin, former Twin Falls mayor, while Boy Scouts brought in nine flags of the nation's history to accompany the music appropriate for each period. Reading the introductory portion of the ritual, Mr. Chaplin said:

"Heralds is as old as the human race. The carrying of banners has been the habit of barbarian and civilized alike. These banners usually contain some concept of life or government of those who bear them."

First flag borne in first was a white flag with red cross, the flag of England and flag of Henry VIII. The second flag was the American flag by John Cabot in 1497. Following came the English flag, changed from blue to white, the white cross of St. Andrew placed thereon by order of King James I called the union of the king's colors.

Next the color changed from blue to crimson, and the two crosses, one a blue field placed in the upper corner. Then came the famous pine tree flag, adopted for all colonial vessels in 1775 and carried by the American flag in the battle of Dunker Hill. Fifth in the nation's flag history was the star flag, used by the southern colonies from 1776 to 1778. The sixteenth flag was the flag of 13 alternate red and white stripes, with the red cross of St. George and the white cross of St. Andrew on an aure field in the upper left corner.

Stars and Stripes Then on June 14, 1777 the "stars and stripes" were born, congress providing that "the flag of the United States be 13 stripes, 7 of alternating red and white, and that the union be 13 stars, white on a blue field representing a new constellation."

Eighteen on the flag was the 15-star banner, adopted in 1812. It was the flag of 15 stars and stripes, being used from 1812 to 1816. The 1814, which inspired Francis Scott Key to write the "Star Spangled Banner" our national anthem.

Margaret Young, who cut stars for this particular flag, subsequently became the mother of Henry Sanderson, who was elected grand exalted ruler of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks in 1934. Last came the American flag as we receive it today, with 48 stars and 13 stripes.

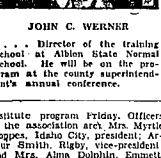

SHOWDOWN IS INEVITABLE

John L. Lewis has been the backbone of the United States of America. It may be that an armistice will be signed without further hostilities, other than verbal.

It will be unfortunate if we permit such a superficial victory to throw us off guard, to divert us from the quest of permanent machinery for handling such situations.

The United Nations can not win this war, except on the basis of a complete surrendering to the job of production. Our preponderance of material strength is too slight, too tenuous, to permit us to go back to business as usual.

As soon as Lewis caved in, temporarily, the thought struck out that we must forget anti-strike legislation, because everything had become easy.

It is a short-sighted attitude. It was not merely the fact that the coal situation merely dramatized the need, which had existed before and will continue to exist.

Regardless of what happens to Lewis and his series of strikes against the security of the United States, a showdown is to come on a general question of the nation's ability to lead down our soldiers, sailors and marines, who depend upon the product of our factories.

One private, discussing the coal strike, summarized the general sentiment thousands have expressed:

"I've been thinking—what would they do if the army should strike? We announced we would not go on striking beyond 30 days without any limit on working hours."

What would we do? Probably shoot as many of the rebels as possible, and imprison the rest.

Is the work of the fighter more important than that of the men who make weapons without which the fighter would be helpless?

Three strikes ended in May, cost for 100 man-days of production. If the fighters had lost 75,000 man-days or in Tunisia and Attu, to strike for more pay or shorter hours, would the cause of democracy be now?

THE CRISIS REARS

Anglo-American invasion of Europe probably is a matter of days, now, rather than of weeks or months. The worm has turned, and totalitarianism is about to go on the offensive.

German propagandists have selected June 20 as the date. They may not be far off. Only one thing is certain, however, exactly when, exactly how the allies are going to strike.

Strongest clues point to the Mediterranean, but readers of detective stories will not be surprised if their members will be following the mystery is to look where the clues do not point.

It is quite possible, and in keeping with the most advanced methods of modern warfare, that we may strike simultaneously at half a dozen or more points, prepared to push hardest wherever blow finds the weakest spot in the defense.

We must not be alarmed by slow progress in the great drive on the continent, which is discouraged if tentative, distracting raids that may look like the real thing—are defeated.

The invasion of Europe will be the biggest military operation in history—perhaps the most complicated. Neither the date nor duration must be permitted to elude us during the preliminary stages.
