"We have passed through the period of military adolescence," he said. "We have now become a more sharply defined picture than that offered by the battle of Tannenberg."

Dumpground Odors Bring New Protests From Citizen Group

The rubbish disposal question, which made city officials feel last year that Monday was hotter than it probably really was, is being brought up again at the city's meeting of the council, when a citizen group appeared to protest continuing use of the dump ground southeast of Twin Falls.

The delegation, consisting of 11 residents of the dump ground vicinity and headed by Carl Johnson, made no appearance a few hours after drilling had begun on a well at the dump ground which is designed to furnish water for the city.

Compulsions of War. He said that when dumping in that locality began last summer the residents were assured it was only a temporary measure and that a permanent location would be sought. He said the dump ground had been a constant fire hazard, that refuse and dead animals created an unbearable odor, and that residents of the territory affected were "up in arms over it."

Several times during the discussion members of the delegation intimated that court action might follow if the city failed to improve the situation.

Greenhalgh, Mayor Earl A. Street and other members of the council sketched the troubles the council has had with garbage disposal since J. O. Breckert gave up his business and the city agreed for time to work out the problem along the lines now intended.

Another possible ultimate solution to the garbage and rubbish disposal problem came in discussion near the end of the meeting, when John E. Hayes, city engineer, recommended construction of an incinerator. It would be built on the site of the present dump ground, he said, and would provide the cheapest means of disposing of garbage.

Hayes pointed out the existence of the water main to half dumping lot, the water main and other pipe water course channels, and pointed out that the water in the City Line might be required to build some type of disposal plant.

PLANE CARRIERS PROTECT CONVOY

Several days of battle involving the convoy's escort, both ships and planes, brought not one "action" story, only one or two actual clashes with slight and but few reports and instructions which flew between the ships and the protective planes overhead—a drama that would be played in another world.

One Battle Seen. Except for one clash which was visible from one of our carriers about six miles away—might just as well have been listening on radio to a radio account of the struggle, which ended with every ship in my group reaching port safely.

The plane dived from the sky and released its bombs. A column of white water reached for the clouds. The plane dived repeatedly over the spot, machine-gunning the enemy submarine, while several other carriers' planes came to the scene to complete the kill.

Not a gun on our ship was fired, except for one light and direct gun—and that on a U. S. ship. Most of the battle was carried out by our surface escort and planes which were out of sight over the horizon 10 to 20 miles from the main body of the convoy. That's how our reconnaissance works.

One of the commonest complaints grown people make against children is a nervous habit called "Stuttering".

"Listening through the story the basic fact soon becomes evident. The complaint is a selfish habit, it is a habit of mind, perhaps his security the household is disturbed."

"My son wants good money but all he gets is a half of it. He puts what he has earned after meeting his expenses into the bank. Instead of letting me have the money, I haven't had a new coat in three years."

"These children are so selfish. They turn on the radio for their parents and never get a chance to hear the ones I want. I'm going to turn the radio on myself and let them do without, that's all."

"In every phase of living it takes too long to finish a crisis. One must pull against the other or there will be a fight. It is a fight to win. One must be careful to establish no ground for the one side. You on the other side must be sure that the head of the family must cooperate from and to every member of it."

"When did the girl have the last new hat? Did she pick it out herself and like it? Has she an allowance? Is she saving too much money there is for hats and movies and living, or does she see you buying what you need to live without thought of a budget? She will not understand that unless she is taught and if she is untaught, and inexperienced, why call her selfish?"

"See some money and he tries a share of it to the household. It's some he puts in the bank, saving it for some day in the future. Why is he saving it when children do it and just honorable thrift when parents do it for them?"

"A child grows up without thought of his parents and family, thinking only of himself, he is expressing what he has not been taught, by his parents. Example is the best teacher, cooperation is the best method, in child training."

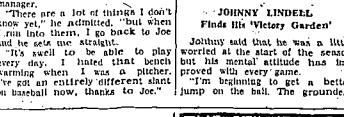

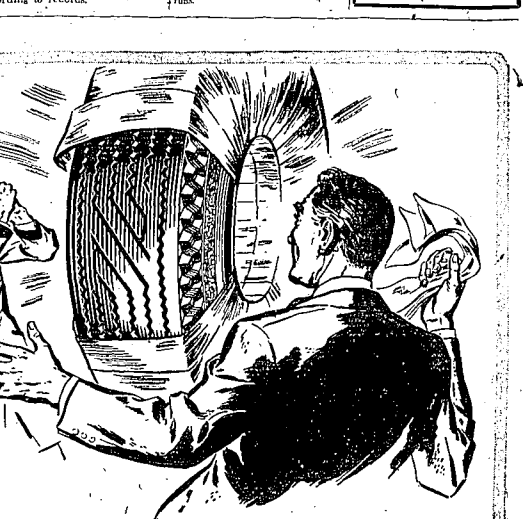

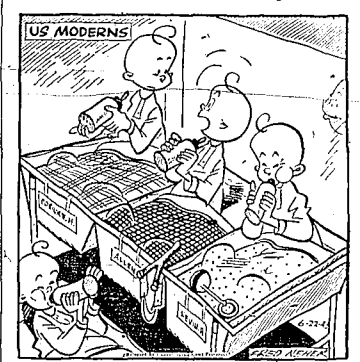
