Full-Time Secretary Approved by State Christian Churches

BOISE, June 25—Organizing a five-year program for strengthening of the Christian church in Idaho, the employees of a full-time secretary was approved at a Thursday afternoon session of the 15th annual convention of the State Christian Churches, which closed last night.
Rev. Max C. Cronberger, president of the state board and pastor of Twin Falls First Christian church, said a man was chosen to fill the newly created position, but that his name was not announced here for about 10 days or two weeks.
Probably a Boyce
The work of the full-time secretary, who will begin his office Sept. 1, is to keep in touch with all churches, which will consist of evangelism and Christian education, along with services for counseling. It was said by Rev. Cronberger.

BRITISH BOMBERS RAID WUPPERTAL

factories, as well as many smaller industries.
The raid marked the sixth consecutive night that the force of 400 bombers have pounded the Ruhr area. The British air force has also bombed European fortresses and brought the total tonnage of bombs dropped by British and American planes in this theater during that period to at least 6,000 tons.
The European aerial offensive was rolling forward at a greater rate than ever before. Upward of 500 allied planes, including American Thunderbolt fighters, participated in the largest single night attack of the war against the European coast from the West Indies, to the Cherbourg peninsula in northern France yesterday.
At least 12 German planes were destroyed on the way to and from Wuppertal, the opposition over the city. British and American planes in the vicinity of the Ruhr, returning pilots said.
A Daily Telegraph dispatch from London said that the British air force has been successful in a series of raids on the Ruhr area.

"Since the bulk of the prune orchards are located in areas where freeze damage was severe, losses were heavy." However, some prunes apparently did not suffer greatly.

Abolishment of NYA Approved

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—The senate appropriations committee today approved a bill to abolish the National Youth Administration.
The action reflects a subcommittee report favoring a \$400,000,000 appropriation to finance NYA's youth training and student-aid program for the fiscal year starting July 1.
As the bill goes to the senate it will include a provision for liquidation of the agency no later than Jan. 1, 1944.

Mysterious Disease Deadlier Than 1918 "Flu" Stamped out

By ELLIOTT CHAZE NEW ORLEANS, June 25 (AP)—How it can now how deadly, authorities here, surrounded and apparently stamped out a mysterious disease which in rate of progress and deadliness, threatened to outstrip the deadly wartime "flu" epidemic of 1918.

The situation was all the more tense because the disease had its origin in the midst of more than a score of military camps and bases. Under Secretary of War Patterson said recently that, prior to the start of the African campaign, 60 percent of the soldiers of the United States had passed through the disease.

While some health operations hastened to isolate and treat the 2,000 persons who had contracted the disease in its early stages, others began earnestly to seek its cause and to learn of its character.

One of the first to be isolated was a nurse in a Vile Plate hospital. She died. Next, it spread in turn to three nurses who had tended to the first one and also to her parents and her brother.

Many Inoculated: In treatment, physicians first tried for means of preventing the disease. They used anti-diphtheria serum, they tried blood plasma drawn from many donors in the hope it might be a variety of antibodies and therefore might be effective.

Physicians turned naturally to the muckrat because the illness had started at peak of the muckrat season in that vicinity and it was thought possible that animal muckrat had been and proved to be the disease. It became apparent at once that muckrat was not a possibility because, inoculated experimentally, had a dozen died. The experiments next tried birds. None was ill.

Recallable of Disease: Dr. David E. Brown, director of the state department of health, reported these peculiarities of the disease.

Persons subjected to constant exposure developed a more virulent form of the disease than those casually exposed.

Patients who died always contracted the disease within 48 hours of exposure to death, a strange ill and terrifyingly rapid disease.

Post mortem examination showed that the lung tissue was liver-colored and mucky, but that the blood was black coagulated blood.
