JAPANESE FEEL FULL WAR, ARMY DEPLY ASSERTS

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—Congress was assured today the United Nations were rapidly approaching a "final victory" and that war would be brought home to Japan in such a manner that "the whole empire will be fully occupied in a most violent and destructive way."

A statement from Lieut. Gen. Joseph T. McNamara, deputy chief of staff, was included in testimony made public by the senate appropriations committee as the senate made today a "decisive budget" war bill.

At one point, McNamara told Gen. McNamara, U. S. Dept. of War, the use of the word "war" might have an overemphasized effect.

"In the training and equipping of our armies and getting them ready for combat, we have made more progress in the last year, we have now committed to act, in concert with the United Nations, a rather large force."

Asserting that "strong and effective" operations "convinced the United Nations of widely separated fronts, McNamara nevertheless declared in a statement that the coordinated operation of our land and air forces will bring us toward a final victory."

"Our operations in the Pacific have turned the tide of Japanese advance into a gradual withdrawal toward their home bases. Since our victory at Attu, the same movements of the Japanese have followed our lead."

"It is my intention to bring the war home to Japan in such a manner that the whole empire will feel its full impact in a most violent and destructive way."

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—American battleships have steamed into the Mediterranean to reinforce British squadrons preparing to escort allied landing forces to the shores of Sicily in Europe, the uncontrolled Scandinavian Telegraph Bureau reported today.

The STB dispatch, datelined Berlin, did not identify the American warships, but the report coincided with a general rise in Italian invasion fever, as reflected in reports reaching London from Europe.

European sources said also that the harbor-bound Italian fleet had put to sea, either to seek a safer haven or, less likely, to strike an offensive blow against the British.

The reports reached London from Rome by way of Madrid and Stockholm and were checked by official Italian sources. Madrid source said that the Italian fleet was bound for "offensive operations" but Stockholm reported the warships were en route to safer ports in the Adriatic.

A large portion of the fleet was reported to be the Italian navy's largest "base" but an American source said that early this month, coupled with a British assault last Wednesday night, may have forced the fleet to the port.

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Sen. Clark Flays at "Half Truths" And "Bubbling Optimism" of OWI

By MERVIN G. SHOFARZ Criticizing the office of war information for its "half-truths" and "bubbling optimism," Sen. D. Worth Clark told United States War Veterans in state convention here today that this government agency is impairing the war effort.

Speaking in the Idaho theater before approximately 50 veterans and members of the department auxiliary, which is also holding its convention here, Senator Clark warned his listeners against "wishful thinking" in connection with the possible early collapse of Germany.

He pointed to the strong position of a result that he compared to the situation in 1918, and then emphasized the job of defeating the Japanese, who, he said, "must be exterminated."

"Germany has more food than anyone else in Europe," declared the senator, "she possesses a large stockpile of raw materials, and she is in abundance, along with the other resources of conquered countries, including the oil of Russia. The collapse of Germany is just another thing that we are green about—but nothing to cause us to relax in our all-out war effort."

Clark warned his listeners of the cost of invasion, and the cost of the war in general. "We have to invade the continent," he asserted, "make no mistake about that. We are going to lose two million men in doing it. And then will come the heavy responsibilities made it possible for him to leave north Africa temporarily."

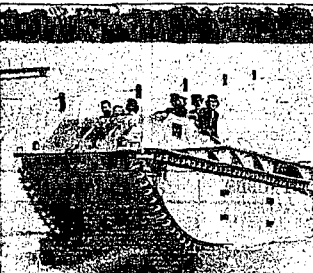

COMPROMISE ON ROLLBACK URGED

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D., Wyo., today urged congress to compromise with President Roosevelt on the subsidy-rollback issue to prevent the possible abolition of the commodity credit corporation.

He suggested that senate and house conferees work out a plan authorizing direct subsidy payments to farmers instead of processors for keeping down the cost of living. He predicted that unless such a compromise is reached, the CCC, with many of its functions as well as wartime functions, is doomed.

The CCC expires Wednesday midnight unless extended by congress. Both the senate and house have approved legislation to extend the CCC and to increase its borrowing power. But both the senate and house also have passed amendments specifically banning the present subsidy-rollback program of the CCC.

If the CCC dies as a result of the current presidential congressional quarrel over subsidies, it would go the way of the commodity credit corporation, which the government makes loans to farmers on wheat, corn, rice, peanuts and other commodities; sells government-owned wheat at competitive prices to foreign countries; acts as a purchaser for feed-lean livestock to ascertain reasons for a "downward strike" by packers.

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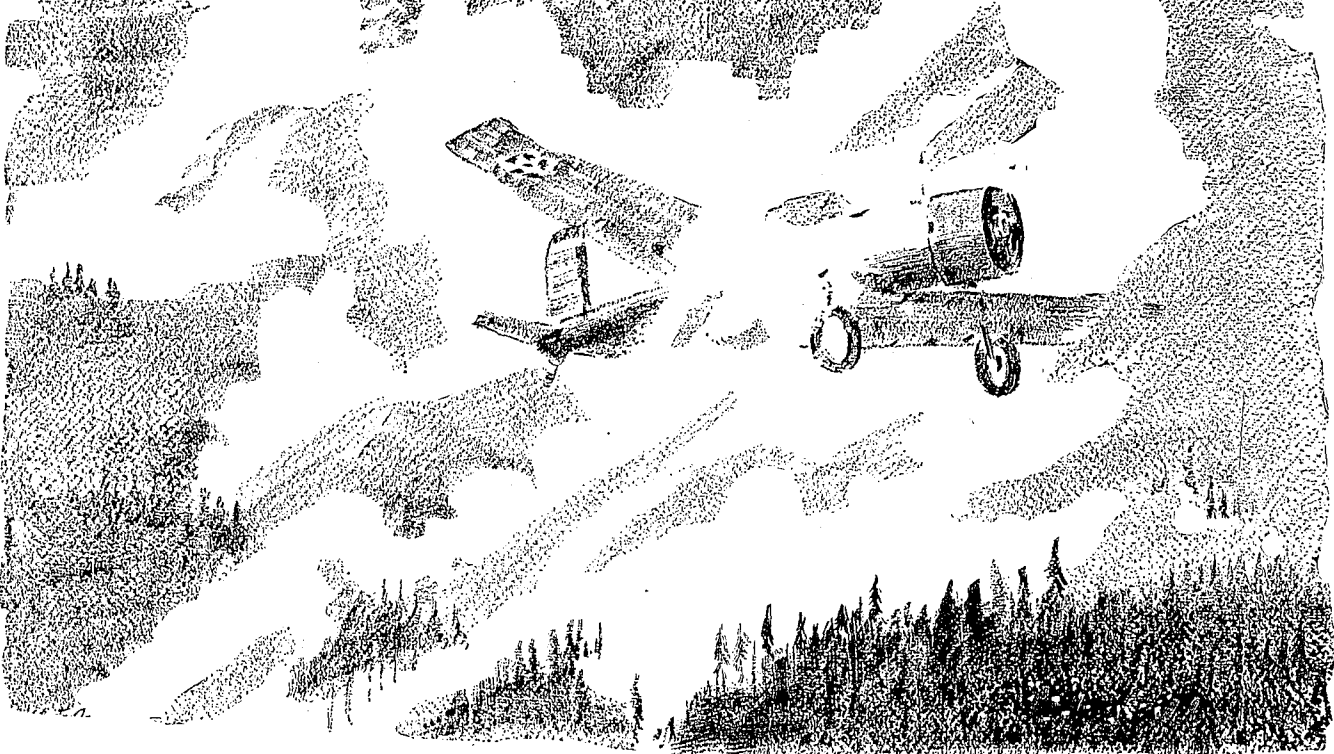
