WAGS Vital, too--So First Army Dogs Sent From Here

A WAVE of WAAC has a right to feel proud of the fact that it is releasing a man to fight, but by multiplying the efficiency of a soldier by a canine you have to hand it to the "canine corps" which some of the more interesting papers refer to as the WAGS. A soldier with a trained dog on sentry duty is considered an equivalent of six soldiers.

"Twin Falls is one of the Idaho shipping centers for the 30,000 dogs which the government plans to give a year in training the army, according to P. L. Lawrence, Twin Falls, who is "dog" for defense representative in this section of the state. The first shipment of dogs from here went to Fort Holston, Neb., Monday, and each of the five dogs will go from there in one of several training planes depending on their characteristics and aptitude.

Bombers, Led by Idahoan, Called "Liberators of China"

QUARTERS IN CHINA, June 29 (Delayed) (P)—This heavy bomber group, commanded by Idahoan Lt. Col. Eugene Beebe, Moscow, has been attacking the Japanese for more than two months but already has won the fond accolade of "liberators of China."

The Japanese will long remember the "liberators of China." They related that when the Japanese maintain a training and supply center for the southwest Pacific. They are here to Ganton, where 1,800 Japanese were reported killed in the attack on the coast.

They were in the thick of the fight around Ichang along the Yangtze and their support enabled Chinese ground forces to turn defeat into resounding victory.

THESE TIPS FROM REDDY KILOWATT WILL HELP MAKE YOUR REFRIGERATOR LAST!

- ★ Defrost regularly, according to manufacturer's instructions. Too much frost materially reduces your refrigerator's efficiency. It should never be thicker than 1/4 inch.
- ★ Open type refrigerator mechanisms require periodic oiling. Failure to do this will cause wear, and sometimes causes escape of the refrigerant when seals and packing become worn.
- ★ Don't overload your refrigerator by careless arrangement of stored foods. This causes poor circulation in the food compartment and may cause food that should keep well to spoil.
- ★ Oil hinge and latches occasionally. Door gaskets should be kept free from grease or spilled food.
- ★ If possible, keep the refrigerator in the kitchen—not on an open back porch, where severe temperature changes affect its operation.

The necessity for keeping your refrigerator clean—both the motor and the food storage compartment, cannot be overemphasized. Remember, like all mechanical equipment, some care must be exercised to keep your refrigerator running efficiently for the many years it was designed to serve you.

Often neglected, but especially important, is the condenser of your refrigerator if you have an open-type mechanism. The fan, back of these honey-comb appearing condensers, forces dust and lint through the condenser, which in time forms a thick blanket; this must be removed for efficient operation. Use your vacuum cleaner's attachment hose for best results, or, if you don't have one, the next best results can be obtained by using a whisk broom or any stiff brush.

CAUSE OF SPUD SHORTAGE TOLD

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—The cause of the "missing" spud shortage, which now has returned to eastern markets after a lengthy absence, is no mystery at all—merely a matter of supply, demand, weather, labor and transportation.

Thus spoke D. C. Spunker, when asked what the story was behind the recent potato shortage throughout the east.

"The shortage of potatoes," said D. C. Mythical, District of Columbia observer who represents authentic sources, "was simple, once you dig into it. In the first place, it came at the end of the season, so to speak.

"That is, the supply of old potatoes was nearly gone and the new crop hadn't put in its appearance. Normally the old stock would have lasted us over, but this year there was an extra heavy military demand—and an unusually heavy civilian demand. This latter was partially attributed to the meat shortage. Folks thought if they couldn't get meat, they'd eat potatoes."

"Also," continued D. C., "poor weather in the northwest states which produce the early crop potatoes—the east delayed the harvest. To add to the crisis were some labor shortage troubles in those areas."

"Finally," explained D. C., "there was the question of transportation—directly carrying a terrific weight. So even when the new crop came along, there was some trouble getting it to market."

Spunker said that it all added up to an eastern potato shortage for a few weeks, but added that the bulk of the new crop now is rolling to market and the shortage is over.

"That's because this year's crop grew up like a champ and the weather was a little better than last year's," he concluded. "It's elementary, gentlemen, elementary."

MECHANICAL EYE AIMS PLANE GUN

NEW YORK, June 29 (AP)—American gunners aboard B-17 bombers only have to hold a dial or operate a foot pedal to "draw a bead" on an attacking fighter plane.

Description of a new sight and range computing mechanical eye, which takes the guesswork out of aerial gunnery, was released today by Thomas A. Morgan, president of the Sperry corporation, with war department approval.

Now an integral part of upper and lower ball turrets in big bombers, the new sight was invented when it was found that the old 20 calibre machine guns using the old "ring and bead" sight system were not effective enough against more maneuverable, faster enemy aircraft.

The sight, which makes 20 calibre machine guns effective at a range up to 1,000 yards, automatically figures the "fall" of the bullet, because of gravity, the ballistic deflection caused by wind and the amount of "lead" required to hit a target.

Tennis Site Now Full of Gardens

There is more than one way of helping the war effort in these days of rationing. It is considered valuable ammunition in a global war.

When city councilmen went to inspect the 12-foot-square plot given to the city by Kenneth Beach they found it occupied by a half-dozen victory gardens. Construction of dirt tennis courts, in preparation for improvement here, would have done no good to the food supply of that neighborhood.

"We've got other things we can work on," declared Commissioner O. L. Coleman, parks commissioner, "we can wall off the garden crops as harvest."

Seabee Home From 'Isle X' In Aleutians

Just returned from "Island X" of the Aleutian scheme Harry Moore is hale and hearty, but darned glad of a 30-day leave after 12 months of active service.

Moore has been with the seabees, the navy's crack construction unit, since February of 1942. He left Twin Falls at that time to sign up with the seabees of Seattle. Upon acceptance Moore was sent to Newport, R. I., and Norfolk, Va., for his initial training period. Then he embarked for Seattle and his port of embarkation for "Island X," he terms it.

Gained Weight

"The lucky seabee got a 30-day leave recently and arrived in Twin Falls last week. He will report back to Camp Lavenore, Calif. July 30 when he begins another short period of specialized training. This time two months—and then back to "Island X."
