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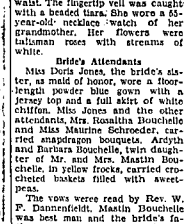

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# WAR PLANT PAY TOPS GENERALS

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Congress received a report today saying that war workers with little or no experience are receiving pay approximating that of the highest officers in the army, including Gen. George O. Marshall, Gen. Eisenhower and Douglas MacArthur.

It was submitted in the hour by Rep. Albert J. Engel, R., Ill., a member of the house appropriations subcommittee on war industrial affairs, and held that the average wage paid per hour worked was \$1.15 as of the ending war plants during 1942.

Payroll payrolls of the companies, including General Motors, Ford, Chrysler and General Electric, showed an aggregate payroll of \$2,318,041,747 for 85,527 workmen, or an average of \$27.25 a year, according to the report.

Engle blamed the wage "extravagance" on the Roosevelt administration and its treatment of a policy of measuring the progress of war production by the sums expended.

Sympathizers with Hitler He denounced wartime strikes in the coal mines but said he had a great deal of sympathy for miners whose wages were low. He attempted to freeze at annual earnings of from \$2,500 to \$3,000 a year "while young people with little, if any, skill work in factories and in some cases earn from two to four times as much."

The wage-earner who has been found and who has worked hard, and continued to accept his war wage rate without striking, is being penalized by being frozen in his job at the wage rate for the duration of the war, he reported. The fact is that the administration has scrambled the eggs and now finds it impossible to fix them.

He contrasted figures showing that machine gun assemblies were sold in 1942 at \$200 a piece, with the \$50 a month pay of army privates—"men who not only can do the work but can fix them."

# CONGRESS VOTES LOST PANTS PAY

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—A look at congress, but two sessions are going to get paid for pants in the Twin Falls county following Hugh L. Scott's bill off north Africa last November.

President Roosevelt's signature has made the law of the land that Robert Donald Leighton, water tender, first class, shall be reimbursed \$268.50, and Libero Quiero, a merchant's mate, shall receive \$102.75, for pants and other articles of clothing worn at the bottom of the sea.

The navy department itself named congress in Cleveland's locality that would have required those two trousersmen to be out of pocket for the money they spent on their uniforms.

Each received a clothing allowance of \$20. Leighton bought \$208.50 worth of Quiero spent \$102.75. About Oct. 23, while aboard the Hugh L. Scott, they were both were revealed by orders from Washington because they were advanced before they had the required service. Subsequently they have reported the money through deductions in their pay.

Around Nov. 18 the Hugh L. Scott went down. All who lost personal property were reimbursed except Leighton and Quiero. They lost uniform of a chief's water tender and a chief merchant's mate for which, unfortunately, they had no receipts. Quiero lives at Wildwood, N. J. The merchant's mate, who is living his address, was temporarily missing.

# Warning: Don't Give Away Any Unused Stamps

Many an innocent housewife, reports Carl N. Anderson, chief clerk of the Twin Falls county relocation camp, is making herself liable to a prosecution at the request of readers who should know better.

"We have been receiving quite a few reports," said Anderson, "of shoppers being asked for their stamps remaining after a period of validity has passed. To turn stamps over to a retailer is a violation of OPA regulations, in which the one giving the stamps is just as guilty as the merchant receiving them."

Anderson explained that periods of validity for the coupons and the retailer do not coincide. A merchant obtaining stamps in excess of those he receives for the sale of food is able to obtain that much more food. And for the excess food obtained he is not bound to collect price, because there is no OPA record of it.

"Many housewives apparently are under the impression that they may give these stamps to the retailer," declared the chief clerk, "but they are violating OPA regulations when they do."

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Representative Costello, D. Calif., chairman of a house sub-committee that has just completed an investigation of the Japanese relocation camps, told the house that the release of Japanese from these camps should be stopped at once.

The head of the Dies committee group which made a two weeks tour of the centers and held hearings at Congress, Costello said, "There has been absolutely no genuine effort to determine the fitness of the Japanese being released."

"Even those Japanese who originally had been interned by the F.B.I. at the outbreak of the war and who have been released to the relocation centers," Costello said, "are eligible to be released anywhere in the United States except in the restricted area of the Pacific coast."

"It is well to add," the chairman asserted, "that the United States is at war with Japan, which apparently the administrators of the war relocation authority seem to have ignored or forgotten."
