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ARMS OUTPUT IN U.S. SLACKENING

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—Arms production failed to show any gain in May, Chairman Donald M. Nelson of the war production board disclosed in a war production report which described the slackening of the production pace as "a very serious condition."

Apparently hindering an imminent military offensive was the fact, Nelson declared in his monthly production communique: "We are on the verge of one of the greatest trials in our national history. We must prepare ourselves to meet a sudden and steadily increasing strain to which we may ever be subjected."

Overall war production was virtually unchanged in May over April, the WPA chief said. Guns were recorded only in aircraft, which went up five per cent, and in navy and army vessels, up two per cent.

Drop in Tanks
In the other major programs, declines were recorded: A three per cent drop in tanks, artillery, anti-aircraft guns and other weapons; a seven per cent setback in miscellaneous munitions, and a four per cent drop in merchant vessel production.

Nelson assigned no reason for the lag in production. He said that deliveries from merchant shippers reached the record total of 1,800,000 pounds in May, WPA said there was a decline of four per cent in the volume of war material produced in the month. WPA's index of ship production is not based on deliveries but on the amount of work actually done in a given period.

Must Continue Increase
"Increases in munitions production during the rest of this year must continue at the average rate achieved so far in 1943 to meet the year's requirements," Nelson said.

A slackening of the pace, such as occurred in May, is therefore a very serious matter, since it places upon the remaining months of the year additional strains in a period when production difficulties will multiply the industrial machine in operating so close to capacity.

Priest Foils Japs; Saves 70 on Island

AN ADVANCED BASE IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC, June 23 (The Daily News)—An American Catholic priest who for 10 months outwitted and outwitted the enemy in the rescue of more than 70 priests, many and other white persons from Japanese-occupied Bougainville Island, is reported today at the unannounced quiet and safety of his life.

"I want to go home," said the priest, Father Albert Label, Brunswick, Me.

There are 33,000 Catholic people natives of the island who need ministering to. The Japanese would "over catch us."

Father Label came off Bougainville, the big island at the north end of the Solomon, 200 miles from Guadalcanal, several weeks ago with his bishop. With them were cars comprising the best known group of free white people there.

The dark-haired, smiling 35-year-old missionary came out on the instructions of American military authorities. How he was rescued was not divulged.

Father Label, a time of American slant still in his speech after 17 years on Bougainville, related his experiences in an interview. As he talked, there came out casually an amazing story of audacity and courage that sounded like something out of a swash-buckling novel in the days of the Cavaliers.

To the Japanese, he became a symbol of defiance, of the unyielding and unconquered white man on an island swarming with Japanese soldiers.

He was always in their hair, but never in their hands—nor after

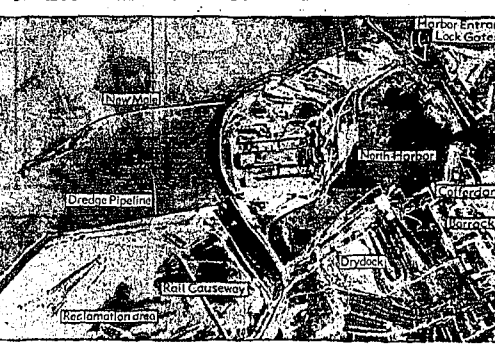
Apparent Objectives
The immediate German objective, as it is at present, appears to be a breakthrough on a comparatively narrow front, followed by a swift, knife thrust into the depth of the rear army defenses. Boys or weeks of fighting would be required to force a path through the German fighting lines, if such a path can be made.

Which way the Germans would turn their main effort is not entirely clear. Their logical goal is Moscow, or by-passing the capital. When the battle of Moscow in February, 1942, the Russians were already looking ahead to the possibility of a new offensive which is only now developing. With the knowledge of the present, they would be completely confident that a new crisis could be surmised.

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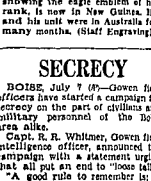
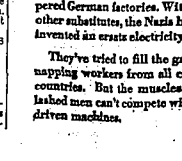
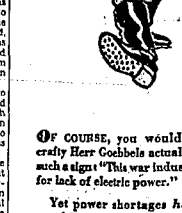
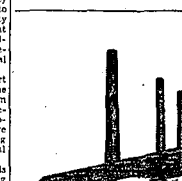
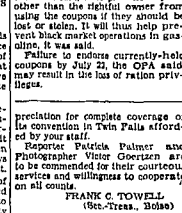
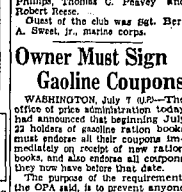
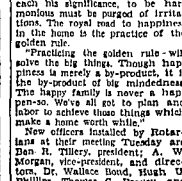
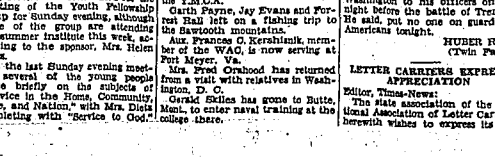
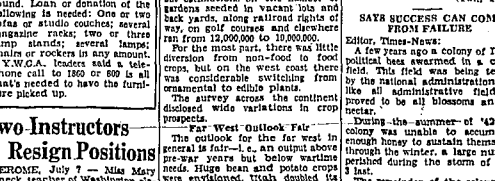
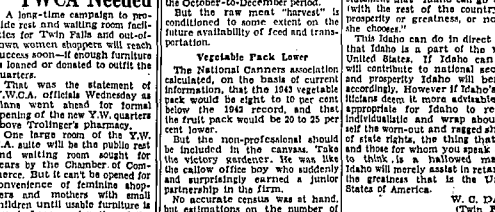
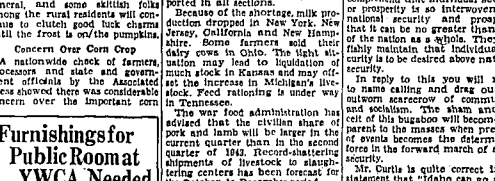
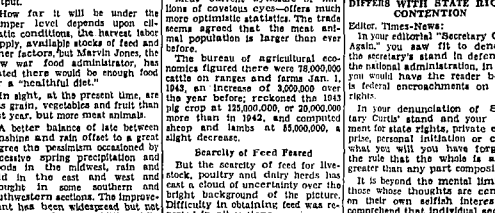
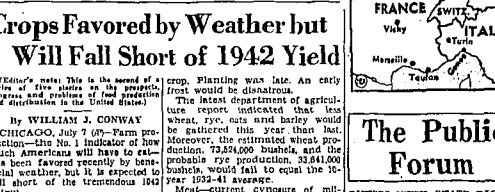
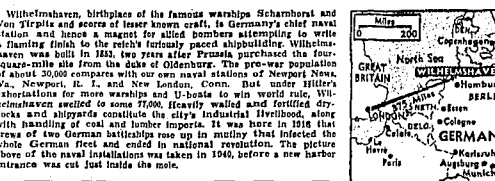
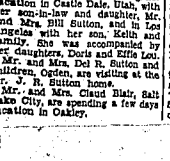
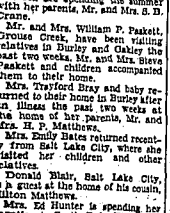
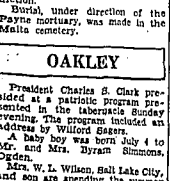
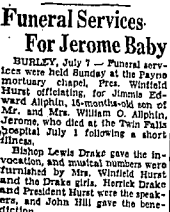
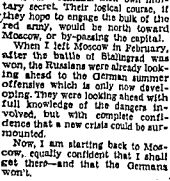
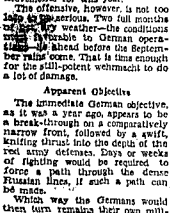
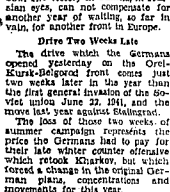
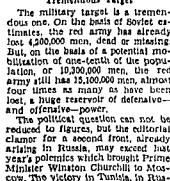
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GUNNER DOWNS 7 PLANES 'FOR DAD'

(Editor's note: This dispatch was written by a young man, a Flying Fortress gunner, who has just returned from a great aerial battle over Guadalcanal, where he shot down seven Japanese planes for a plane carrier on one mission. He was killed in action. He was a member of the Merit Legion.)

By STAFF SGT. BENJAMIN F. WARDEN, III

A FLYING FORTRESS BASE IN NORTH AFRICA, July 7 (AP)—"Dad, I got my wings. That's what I want to tell you, father. Superior Court Judge Benjamin F. Warden, 32, of Berkeley, Calif., because I promised to get a new plane for him when I came over here. I named my gun 'The Judge' and it came through today in great shape."

I got at least seven planes and I believe I hit and damaged more. We were told before the take-off that we were hitting one of the toughest in the line. We were accepted it as its face value without losing confidence in our ability to come through. The waiting on the ground to be a bit of an understatement.

Came Through Our Flak About five minutes off the target we ran into strong anti-aircraft barrage, and coming up through their own flak were more enemy fighters. They were shot down. It had been their habit to lay in the flak. They were shot down but today they came right into their own fire.

The first plane that I got shot at came in at the start—a Messerschmitt pocket off from our right and leveled straight at us as we were leveling. I winked back until the German was 500 yards away and then I saw him burst into flames and plough down under our flares. I signaled the pilot to bank right to look out of his window and see if the plane went down. He nodded yes.

Planes No. 2 and No. 3 were together. Two ME109s got on our tail. The first came on in a glider. The other came on but broke his run at about 1000 feet. I leveled off and the pilot belly when he exploded in a burst. The first plane alighted in a fight for approximately 100 yards and the pilot bailed out. The second plane went down and the pilot also left it.

The next two victories I didn't even get into. The first was a gunner in some other plane saw them attacking the flak. He was a Messerschmitt making a run at our fortress and I picked him up as he came. His flak, held the trigger down until the plane began to smoke, and he started out of control.

200 Rounds Poured in One Shot The other was making a run on a ship hours—the ship was in trouble. The enemy had to pass within 100 yards of the ship. I approximately 200 rounds into him and the ship was hit. He was in a vertical dive and burning. I got two more fighters, but didn't have time to identify them positively.

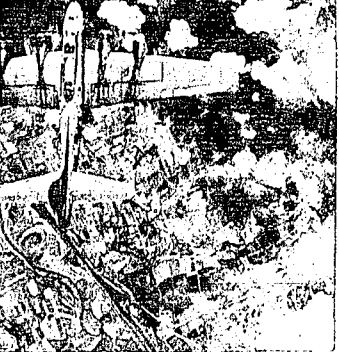

Sulphur Treatment Preserves Flavor, Vitamins in Cherries

(This is the first of a series prepared for the Times-News by the Twin Falls Parent-Teacher association council, in cooperation with the rural-urban council on nutrition and the home demonstration division of the United States department of agriculture.)

After removing the fruit from sulphur treatment, start the process of dehydration immediately. Spread in single layers, preferably on cheese cloths or cotton net. Dry as rapidly as possible, stirring occasionally. Care must be taken, particularly after the food is half dried, to prevent even the slightest amount of scorching which will impair the flavor. Do not allow temperature, at any time, to rise above 150 degrees f. use a thermometer. Dry Until Leatherly

Fruit should be dried until leatherly but not hard. When hot, they will appear softer and less dry than when cool. Drying time will range from 12 to 24 hours depending on the thickness of pieces and type of drier used. Concocheries and rhubarb are now available for conservation. By the cold water method, these products retain their fresh-from-the-garden flavors. Wash and prepare as for table use. Pack into sterilized jars, fill with cold water and seal with hot. When ready to use open and prepare as you would as when fresh.
