While American forces established six tank columns and air fields on the south coast of Sicily, the British and Canadian forces on the east coast toward Catania smashed the Italian defenses and captured the estimated number of prisoners to amount 8,000, mostly Italian. (Globe photo.)
The big battles were developing in the mountainous areas, capturing the Germans and Italians were making their most important gains.

The communiqué said that Greek and American destroyers were in the port of Augusta, main Italian naval base on the east coast, at 4 p. m. Monday and that allies forces occupied that port early this (Wednesday) morning.

American war ships supported Italian States troops under Gen. George Patton, Jr., in the western Sicily tank formations being driven eastward and about 20 miles south of Pante Empedocle, on the south coast of Sicily west of Agrigento.

American forces in the Catania area are reported to have advanced toward Agrigento against stiff opposition.

The communiqué said there were further general advances in all sectors. American forces are reported to have captured the town of Ragusa and Iarardo. The American forces had about 20 miles from the junction yesterday at Ragusa, cutting off the whole southern part of the island and ending telephone communications.

Garments shipped to army and navy included 1,100 sweaters, including 88 pneumonia jackets, 47 pair of bed socks, 150 pair of bedsheet slippers, 100 woolen lap covers, 50 cushions and covers, 125 bed-spread covers, 185 bed-side bags, 100 kit-bags and 100 "housewife."

Shipment for June from the knitting unit amounted to 101 garments for civilian relief. Forty-three other garments are now completed but have not been shipped.

On surgical dressings—from Oct. 1, 1942, to June 30, 1943—the number of hours spent in Twin Falls was 21,357 with 339,710 dressings completed. Hours and dressings reported from other towns were 10,011, 6,289 hours and 82,452 dressings; Hansen, 1,211 hours and 1,373 dressings; Piler, 2,515 hours and 2,590 dressings, and Kimberly, 4,201 hours and 49,400 dressings.

Total amounts for all chapters were 38,628 hours and 546,626 dressings.

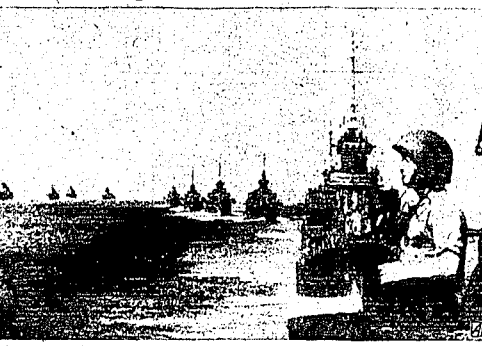

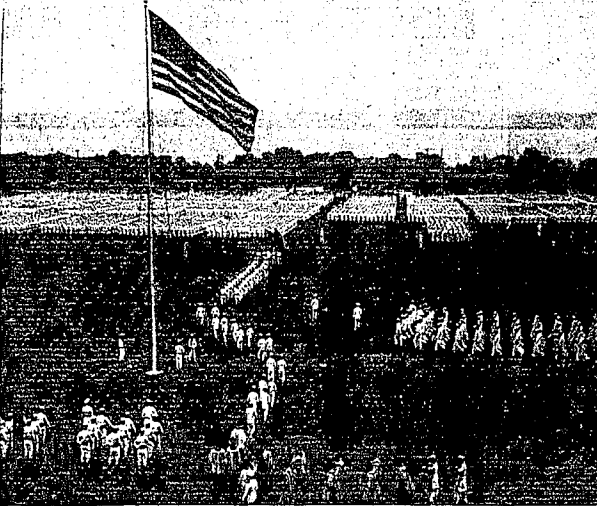

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GREW SAYS NIPS ISSUED WARNING

NEW YORK, July 14 (AP)—Former Ambassador Joseph C. Grew said last night that as early as the spring of 1941 Japan's foreign minister warned him that if the United States got into a showdown with Japan, the United States would be obliged to go to war against the United States.

In an address for delivery at Columbia university Grew, during a conversation he had with Yosuke Matsuoka, then foreign minister at Matsuoka's home in Tokyo in the spring of 1941. He said Matsuoka told him Matsuoka was bankrupt and that "this is the day of the great military powers."

Matsuoka expressed the view, Grew related, that Germany would "inevitably" win the war. Grew said that Japan would be the "stabilizing force" in the far east. "And then he went on to say," Grew continued, "that if the United States would be obliged to go to war with Germany, even in defense against the German submarines, Japan would be obliged to go to war with Germany. In 1941, failed to grasp the potential fighting capability and stamina of other peoples."

"Had the Germans in 1941 and the Japanese in 1941 better understood those things," he said, "had they been accurately conceived, the inherent qualities of their future enemies, might they not have hesitated to rush headlong toward certain ultimate destruction?"

While referring to Japan's defeat as certain and inevitable, Grew warned it might take a long time, even after Germany and Italy have been crushed.

Jerome's Disposal System Underway

JEROME, July 14.—With Jerome's garbage disposal system now underway, all residents have been informed to have their rubbish and garbage in separate containers and placed in the alleyways to facilitate collecting of the material.

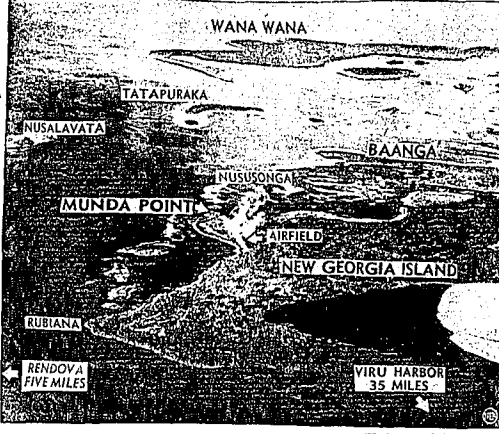
Parents Receive Son's War Medal
