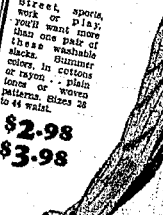

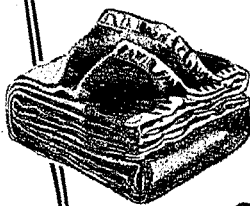

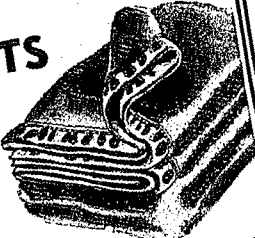

FDD UNITS NEW MINERS' ACTION

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—President Roosevelt's hint that he intends to return the private ownership of the United Mine Workers back to the miners has caused the formation of a new crisis in the long coal dispute.

Mr. Roosevelt's remarks, coupled with investigations by federal agents of militant strikes in Pennsylvania, indicated the possibility of new administration moves against the U. M. W. At his press conference the president today said that he would not be returned to private ownership as soon as practicable but would return to the level prevailing before.

Operating Within Law He said the government certainly was operating within the law. Mr. Roosevelt's remarks may have been prompted by the fact that operators repeated demands that a labor board order be enforced against the U. M. W. and that properties be returned to them. After Lewis rejected the U. M. W. offer, he said he would monitor the members to work until Oct. 31 if the government retained control of the mines.

The president said later he did not recall the Oct. 31 deadline but last Friday he added that he would not want to be forced to sign a contract. The operators interpreted his remarks to mean that the government would not move against Lewis and protested again to War Mobilization Director James P. Wadsworth.

Wishes to Make Findings If the new administration wishes to return the mines to private management, such action presumably would require the aid of the Harold I. Ickes to make findings as to when production would be increased by the first stoppage began last April. The mine owners and operators are opposing singly, in groups and at all once. The government already has returned the mines to the operators. By striking, however, they would be violating the anti-strike law which prohibits a 30-day strike by workers in the coal industry. The government apparently had that possibility in mind yesterday when he called attention to the new regulations.

OPA AIDE QUILTS, HINTS COLLAPSE

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—Price Administrator Franklin M. Rowan is expected to announce charges by resigned Deputy Administrator Earl H. Mason that the OPA's aid to young women—confusion, internal compromise, red tape, young lawyers, professors and aide rule theorists.

Mason resigned less than six months after he had promised, when he accepted chief information officer, to "clean up" OPA in six weeks. He yesterday by his office that he could neither accept the job as OPA's "chief manager" nor continue with OPA. He said the OPA needed a "drastic reorganization," a strong chief director, and a liberal translation of common horse sense.

He denoted the "type of thinking" within OPA and said he was labeling which the OPA industry and our way of life that ever existed, because it is without question the most efficient in the world to eliminate brands, trade marks and even trademarks.

Mason is president of a large advertising firm in Detroit which bears the name of his customers. It includes large food processors. He led the drive against OPA's proposal to grade label the 1943 canned food crop.

Mason's resignation climaxed weeks of speculation whether he would become OPA's chief director, that he could direct OPA with hard-boiled business methods. Through apparently offered him the job, but without their chin.

"Today the morale of the agency is at a low ebb," he said. "The good men are looking for other jobs. The theorists and the young lawyers will of course, continue to look for one of the picture, because most of them are in better jobs than they could obtain in OPA."

The bulk of his statement was bitter re-annunciation of various groups within OPA.

TIME SHORT FOR DRIVE ON KISKA

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—Time for an American offensive against the Japanese base on Kiska Island in the north Pacific is growing short. Responsible opinion here is that if the strategic base is to be recaptured from the enemy this year, weather conditions make it essential that operations begin as soon as possible.

An amphibious attack on Kiska, where the Japanese have elaborate defense installations, an unfinished airfield and a large supply base, high as 10,000 men, would be a logical follow up to the conquest of Attu Island, completed months and a half ago.

The weather in the Aleutians area is never good and at this season is steadily going from bad to worse. By October, ice storms and blizzards will be added to the common fog, rain, and 100-mile-an-hour winds.

The battle of Attu required about three weeks of fighting on May 25. The enemy forces there numbered only about 3,000 men, and they were not nearly so well developed as on Kiska.

The narrative to an attack this year is to let the Japanese suffer the ravages of another rough Aleutian winter with few, if any, supplies reaching them. They can be recaptured only if they are permitted, the nearest American base on Amchitka Island being only 100 miles away.

The shortest route to Japan, whether by air or sea, is across the North Pacific. Long range bombers should eventually be able to bomb important Japanese enemy headquarters directly along this route from bases in the Aleutians. The best of these bases, potentially, is Kiska.

ARMY AIR CORPS SEEKING CADETS

Emphasizing the current need for young men in the Army air force's aviation cadet program, Maj. Cliver P. Shaffer, special air corps representative assigned to the Utah, Idaho and Nevada area, visited Twin Falls yesterday with Mrs. W. A. Hill, Osborn, commanding officer of the Utah recruiting and induction district.

"Men between the ages of 17 and 22 are needed—and needed urgently—in the aviation cadet program to be trained to fly American planes," Major Shaffer said.

This program offers special opportunities for young men, advancement, and service to the men who qualify as pilots, bombardiers, or navigators, he pointed out.

Men from this area are particularly needed now if existing quotas are to be filled, he said.

Young men between 17 and 22 years of age who qualify under this program will be sworn directly into the air force for aviation cadet training. These 17-year-olds will not be called to begin training until their 18th birthday, but while they are waiting call to duty, they may wear the silver and blue wings presented to all men of this age group who qualify, Major Shaffer said.

Men between 18 and 20 years of age may also qualify. They apply through their local boards for voluntary induction and directed assignment to cadet training. For example, Cpl. Moya Doran, army recruiter in the Chamber of Commerce offices, will supply further details.

2,700 Americans Held Near Berlin

NEW YORK, July 15 (AP)—The Young Men's Christian association announced last night the Germans were holding 2,700 American military prisoners in a nine force camp known as "Staging 38" near the Oder river southeast of Berlin.

Most of the American soldiers held there were captured in the north African campaign, the Y. M. C. A. said, describing the camp as consisting of huts and "like a little town, with lots, streets, concrete sidewalks, and a school."

"Between the huts," it said, "are so many open spaces that air and sunshine can reach all of them."

The Y. M. C. A. said it received the information from War Prisoners Aid, a neutral agency of the Swiss Y. M. C. A.

Hitler Abandons Control in East

LONDON, July 15 (AP)—A foreign diplomatic source reported today that Adolf Hitler, after having completed the early phases of the latest German offensive in the Belgian-Gold sector, had relinquished control of the allied attack and had returned to Berlin for conferences with his military staff.

The source, who could not be further identified, said the information came from Hildebrandt, German official in the Casle, Berlin, near Hydegeorge in the old Polish corridor, where he maintains "Ironmole" headquarters.

The source added that some observers believed Hitler's return to Berlin might mean the end of the German offensive for the time being at least.

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CHICAGO SOCIETY GIRL MURDERED

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—The fatal shooting of a socially prominent Chicago actress who had been working as a government stenographer and her supervisor was termed a murder and suicide today by Coroner A. McGrath MacDonald.

The two were 35-year-old Rosemary Sidley, Chicago debutante of 1925, and William Knox Chandler, 42, employee of the office of strategic services and father of two children.

MacDonald said Chandler shot Miss Sidley and then turned the pistol on himself, after which police described as a "jealous argument" Monday night at the woman's rooming house in northwest Washington.

Chandler came to Washington from Nashville, Tenn., last year and his wife, Mrs. Margaret Colton Chandler, and two children joined him a few months ago.

Police said they had learned that Miss Sidley and Chandler had known each other for several months and that he had called on her at the rooming house several times. Arguments between the two, they said, were frequent.

FOR SIGNS BILL FOR NEW ROADS

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—President Roosevelt has signed a bill allowing expenditure of \$77,000,000 additional for construction of access roads to timber and mineral resources.

Senator Hayden, D. Ariz., described the measure as extremely important to the war effort because of new timber and mineral producing properties, particularly in the west, which will be made accessible by the construction of new roads.

Expenditure of the funds, Hayden said, will be supervised by the federal roads administration but actual construction will be under the supervision of state highway departments, the grazing, Indian or forest services—whichever is able to do it with the least delay.

Between 1940 and the end of last month, Hayden declared, approximately \$100,000,000 was spent on such access roads.

Hayden said the measure also contains a provision for reappportionment of highway funds under which Arizona will continue to have available for highway construction \$19,926 which would otherwise have reverted to the treasury this month.

"Old Bill" Gets Back on "Only Wing, Prayer"

AN AMERICAN AIR BASE IN ENGLAND, July 15 (AP)—"Old Bill" was added today to the list of flying professors that bombed Germany and came home only on a wing and a prayer.

"Old Bill" landed on his home field with the nose blown off, one engine shot out, the top turret smashed, without breaks and eight of its 11 men wounded after a mid-air north-west Germany May 15.

When the plane landed, a flight surgeon made a quick inspection and said "there is nothing in there but blood and empty cartridge cases." Engineers wondered why the wind, rushing through the gap where the nose had been, did not split the plane.

The crew that fought its way to the target and back was decorated with two distinguished service crosses, eight silver stars and seven purple hearts.

U. S. SALES TAX STILL OPPOSED

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—Treasury officials said that a national retail sales tax was not being considered as a part of any proposals the administration may make to congress for raising additional billions of wartime revenue.

Those officials indicated the department's stand in opposition to such a levy had not changed.

The treasury's reaction to the position came after Representative Cawthon, R. Calif., in an interview, said he expected the treasury to propose in September a 10 per cent federal retail sales tax and compulsory joint income tax returns for married couples. Cawthon said he himself would oppose any movement toward a sales tax or compulsory joint returns.

Chairman Doughton, D. N. C., of the tax-irrepeal house ways and means committee, just before congress adjourned for a summer vacation, said he would support a sales tax "only as a last resort."

Treasury officials did not disclose what position they might take on a proposition of compulsory joint returns for married couples, which would bring in more revenue.

WARM WEATHER AIDS ALL CROPS

BOISE, July 15 (AP)—High temperatures during the past week proved beneficial in all ways and was ideal for farming activities. H. M. Highman, federal weather bureau meteorologist, said today in his weekly summary of crop and weather conditions in Idaho.

Temperatures averaged somewhat higher than for the previous week, and rains were reported in a very good to excellent condition, although some fields in southwestern Idaho do not seem to be filling. Lodging caused by high winds and rains was reported in some sections.

Early barley was reported about ready for harvesting. The first crop of alfalfa has been cut and stacked in most districts.

Corn showed considerable improvement. Truck crops and vegetables were reported mostly good. Some fields of peas are not being picked because of the labor shortage. Potatoes are about average with a few fields ready to be harvested.

Cherry picking is almost complete and apricots are coming on the market in early sections. Irrigated pastures were reported good, but lower ranges in south Idaho are beginning to dry. Higher

Reynolds Hits at Manpower Effort

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—Opposition to compulsory manpower legislation under present conditions was expressed today by Chairman Reynolds, D., N. C., of the senate military affairs committee who declared the army is growing to a size where its drain on civilian workers ought to halt soon.

Reynolds predicted in an interview that sponsors of the Austin-Wadsworth, manpower bill would demand action on the measure soon after congress returns from its summer recess, but he said there would be a strenuous fight to squelch it. The bill would make both men and women subject to compulsory civilian service, if that became necessary.
