BOTULISM TOPS CANNING PERILS

With an even greater emphasis on home canning, Miss Florence Scholz, district home demonstration agent, warns inexperienced canners against the danger of botulism poisoning.

"Many women are canning for the first time in their lives this year, and it is particularly important for them to get accurate information and take proper precautions. Unless canning is done under scientific conditions a hidden danger lies in home canning in the form of botulism poisoning.

Although she said the food might look and taste good, with no peculiar odor, the botulism spores could still be there.

The botulism bacillus, which is present in the soil, is transferred from the soil to food products, remaining only in the absence of air, the airless interior of a sealed tin or jar for its ideal condition for its growth and production of toxins in the food.

Miss Scholz says that these spores can be destroyed only by sustained high temperatures. Home-canned foods which are under pressure cookers may can with safety.

Explaining that the hot-water-bath method of canning is safe for such acid foods as fruits and tomatoes, pickles and pickled beets, Miss Scholz stands firmly on the importance of the processing of non-acid beans, peas and other non-acid vegetables and meats under steam pressure. It is in the non-acid food that the botulism spores flourish, she says, why be discarding whole fish, "there are many foods that

may be canned without a pressure cooker, and most of those for which we recommend one can be safely and effectively prepared by dry-drawing. In fact, peas, corn and such non-acid vegetables actually retain their flavor, color and vitamin content better by dehydrating.
