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8,906 PREDATORY ANIMALS KILLED

BOISE, Aug. 7—A total of 8,906 predatory animals were destroyed in Idaho during the past year.

Included in the predators killed were 4,947 cats, 1,068 dogs, 2,391 bears and 47 muskrats.

In most parts of the state, losses are sharp from predators reported by stockmen from the central region and about recent control of the U. S. fish and wildlife service, reported today.

The state fish and game department cooperates with its control measures and stockmen killed many bears that were molesting their herds.

Predatory animals killed in Idaho last year were:

Cats, 4,947; Dogs, 1,068; Bears, 2,391; Muskrats, 47.

During the year, \$34,000 was received from the sale of fur taken or government traps.

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Sicilian Chief

DETROIT, Aug. 7—The backing of demand for passenger automobiles in the post-war period is steadily as Americans continue to prefer old cars virtually no replacement available. Cars are wearing out.

Figures compiled by the salvage division of the auto production board (WPB) show that in the 12 months ending last June nearly 11,000 old cars were scrapped.

This is somewhat below the previous average of approximately 12,500 to 13,000 scrapped cars yearly, but greater than many industry analysts expected in the face of a nationwide drive for car conservation.

Contributing to the deterioration moving more than 4,000 cars a day from service is the increasing difficulty in obtaining replacement parts.

WPB has authorized an increase in the production of these parts during the remainder of the year.

Many thousands of cars, however, are approaching the stage when replacement is prohibitive in cost. This, while month-to-month percentage of scrappings may show some variation, there is little likelihood the number of vehicles to be scrapped in 1944 will fall below 15,000.

The 850,000 new cars available when production for civil use was halted in February, 1942, have undergone to approximately 100,000 cars by the present rate of distribution, will be exhausted by next Jan. 1.

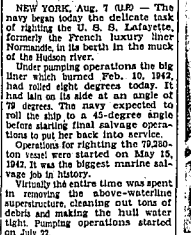

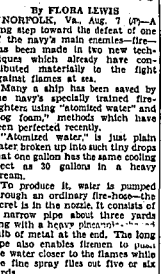

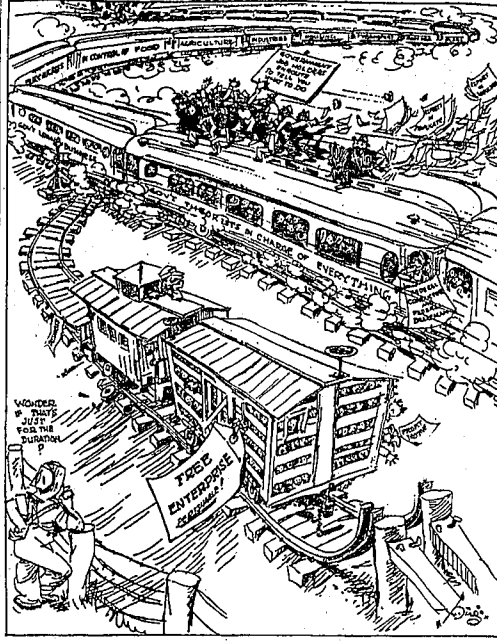

WHEELER IRKED BY DADS' DRAFT

 WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—A collective service directive placing pre-World War I fathers at the bottom of a national draft list is not eliminating the liability of their induction after Oct. 1, according to a statement by Gen. Paul H. Wheeler, D. Mont.

Wheeler carried on his threat to request congressional leaders to reconvene congress to handle draft bills by legislation. He previously had announced a new emergency commission Chairman Paul V. McNutt of "invading the business of congress in such a manner as to make such a thing impossible."

Wheeler's action against legislative fathers had been Washington commission after Oct. 1, all men now classified in the first category of military service unless defense because of occupation or because their induction would cause serious drafting difficulties on their family.

Wheeler, author of a pending bill in the senate to defer fathers at least until Jan. 1944, immediately threatened to demand the return of congress to handle the issue of deferment.

The temporary deferment plan, though, seems the effect of placing the drafting of fathers on the supply of available men. The states would be to "control" their induction. The order, he said, represents no temporary deferment for those holding a 3-A classification.

"The demands of the military are the controlling factor in the drafting of all eligible men, whether they are present here, fathers or not," he said. "There are no guarantees when additional quotas must be filled."

That was substantiated further in a statement by the selective service director, Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hays, at Sacramento, Calif. He said that despite the best efforts of the national draft organization to make the call of those fathers simultaneous throughout the nation, the call may vary as much as three months from state to state.

The only way to keep the call absolutely uniform would be to have the case of every potential inducible reviewed in Washington, said Hays, adding "and I don't know how that day." He said a three-month variance would be only reasonable among the nation's 48,000 local draft boards.

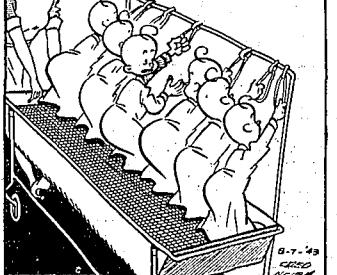

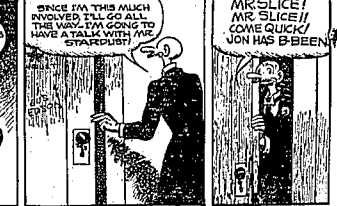
