Nazi Retreat in Russia Near Rout

MOSCOW, Aug. 11 (AP)—Russian armies drove ahead over the near approaches of Kharkov and stepped up pressure on a broad southern front. In an effort to turn the orderly German retreat to a complete rout, Soviet front dispatches reported today.

General Staffs Meet as Churchill Plans for Conference With FDR

QUEBEC, Ont., Aug. 11 (AP)—Strict military secrecy today surrounded plans for the sixth meeting of President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill and it could only be assumed that it would occur "somewhere in America" within the next few days.

Churchill arrived yesterday from an east coast port where he reached Canadian soil after a journey from London. The general staffs of Great Britain, the United States and Canada were engaged in strategy talks here designed for a quick knockout of the axis.

The Roosevelt-Churchill meeting will be a British-American affair, it was revealed. Mr. Roosevelt said in Washington yesterday afternoon, a day after Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King announced that Churchill was in Canada, that no representative of Soviet Russia would be present. Mr. Roosevelt indicated his disappointment. Nor will there be a Chinese representative.

SECRET ROADWAY AIDS SICILY NAZIS

 WITH THE AMERICAN TROOPS FIGHTING TOWARD RANDAZZO, Sicily, Aug. 9 (Delayed)—American forces which have smashed in multiple assaults a warfare to within seven miles of Randazzo, key junction northeast of famous Mount Etna, have captured the western terminus of a long-sought German supply road.
 This hidden highway, which is not shown on any map, was one of the chief factors enabling the German troops to bring up heavy artillery, ammunition and troops into the rugged terrain between Casero in the hills and San Agata on the north coast. Built Old Trail Into Road
 "The Germans apparently took the old trail and built it into a serviceable military road."
 Schermerhorn, who was able to explore the road for only two miles because of enemy fire, said it was approximately 15 feet wide and apparently was used by the Germans only for essential traffic going up to the front.
 "The road was in good shape and it looked like most of the repair work had been done by hand labor rather than with machines," he said.

SOLONS STUDYING COAL CONVERSION

SHERIDAN, Wyo., Aug. 11 (AP)—A senate subcommittee met today in this hub of cattle and dude ranch operations to discuss with government engineers, educators and coal and oil operators the availability of coal in Wyoming, Montana and North Dakota for conversion to liquid fuel.
 The hearing will be the fourth in a cross-country series being conducted by the war materials subcommittee of the senate committee on public lands and surveys to investigate supplies of coal and oil shales in western states and the possibility of producing liquid fuels from them.
 "The coal in the Sheridan area is ideally suited to the manufacture of synthetic oil and gasoline," Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D., Wyo., chairman of the committee, said on arrival for the meeting.
 "Because of the importance of oil for industrial uses and for possible war needs in the future and well as future industrial needs it is imperative that we develop as soon as possible the production of synthetic liquid fuels from coal and oil shales."
 In Salt Lake City on Monday the committee was told that Utah has 200 billion tons of coal which could produce 20 to 70 gallons of oil per ton, and other billions of tons of oil shale which could yield a minimum of 35 gallons of oil a ton. The group was also told that Colorado could produce about 47 billion barrels of oil from shale deposits.

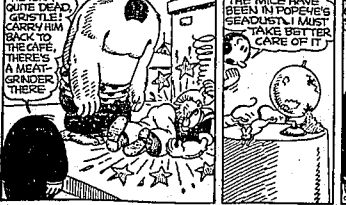
