Italian Peace Group, Headed By Grandi, Arrives in Lisbon

LONDON, Aug. 25 (AP)—A Swiss dispatch said today that an Italian peace group headed by Count Dino Grandi had arrived in Lisbon coincidentally with the reported start of discussions for an armistice to separate peace for Italy.

The dispatch, quoting the Zurich newspaper, said that the participants in the peace discussions were not known, but added that Grandi, appointed to contact with British diplomats. He served as foreign minister and ambassador in London in various Mussolini governments.

The Grandi group was the second Italian mission to reach Lisbon within a month, the dispatch said. Grandi had been in Lisbon since following the arrival there of a mission headed by Armando de Ameglio, but informed sources in the Portuguese capital insisted de Ameglio merely was awaiting the arrival of Italian diplomats from Chile.

McNUTT STATES 'DADS' DRAFT TO SPEED UP WAR END

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (AP)—The war manpower commission prepared today for sending congressional attacks with the declaration of WMG Chairman Paul V. McNutt that drafting of fathers is a move dictated by "stern logic" to prevent a "paralyzing lull in our whole production program." McNutt said in a radio address last night.

"We are making sure that the war will not be prolonged for even one unnecessary hour. The only original life is lost which it would be possible to save," McNutt said in radio address last night.

No Easy Task
He said it was no easy task to recruit fathers for the armed forces of thousands of American families, and tell the father and chief breadwinner he must go to the front to serve in the armed forces. But there is a way, McNutt said, to achieve the size of the armed forces ordered by the commander-in-chief.

McNutt said the only large number of single men eligible for service in the armed forces is the one million who are in the armed forces, either those possessing civilian skills or those who are in the armed forces of the less skilled and unskilled labor force of industry.

"We cannot take them," he said. "A stern logic dictates the only alternative is to draft fathers from their own homes, and men with children born or conceived before Pearl Harbor."

375 Sacks Per Acre—Here's Potato Yield to Crow About

Homer Ramseyer's potato fields look like an obstacle course for commands training. That's because you have to stand the sacks close together to get 375 sacks to an acre of ground. Ramseyer is now harvesting 375 acres of early crop potatoes in his place four miles north of Filer, and the startlingly high yield is not the only notable feature of his crop. The full potato people say it is one of the poorest crops for their purpose which they have seen in a long time. The Ramseyer harvest began Tuesday and on that date the average was 375 sacks to the acre. Wednesday it was going ahead all what appeared to be about the same rate. When the first 1,000 or 1,700 sacks had gone through the sorter, said Ramseyer, there was only one pile

11 Men President's Eyes and Ears on Home, Battle Fronts

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—Who are the real presidential advisers? Who help make White House decisions? Mr. Roosevelt, in office hours, consults almost exclusively with these men: Admiral William D. Leahy (retired), whose title is chief of staff to the commander-in-chief of the army and navy; James H. Doolittle; Gen. George C. Marshall, U. S. Army chief of staff; Admiral Ernest J. King, chief of naval operations; Gen. H. H. Arnold, commander of the army air force; James H. Byrnes, war mobilization director; Fred H. Brown, director of the War Relocation Authority; Leo T. Crowley, economic warfare director; William L. Clayton, director of State War and—night and day—Harry Hopkins. These are the President's eyes and ears on the national, international and battle fronts. They issue his orders by delegated authority, and participate, on day-to-day White House business. Probably the most powerful group on civilian war strategy is Chairman Byrnes, who mobilizes the best of himself, Winston, Simpson, Knox, and Hopkins. It is Byrnes, domestic and war strategy. Theoretically, at least, it bores every item of national and war production, manpower, supplies, wages, prices, rationing and to some degree foreign relations. FDP's Answer to Wrangling The board is Mr. Roosevelt's authority over two years of wrangling, creation of a "war cabinet." Leahy has no military authority but acts as a sort of secretary of military affairs. When land, sea or air matters are discussed before an audience, they usually see the admiral who sees the President and come back with the mobilization order. He is chairman of the Joint Chiefs-of-staff committee, which is a composite of military and naval assignments. He is also the war strategy and boss shipments from the American war arsenal to the battle front. Mr. Roosevelt has selected for himself the role of war strategy, post-war world planners, leaving most domestic matters almost entirely to the war cabinet. The so-called "assistant president" is Byrnes. He is the departmental and congressional officers and delegates formerly created by Mr. Roosevelt. MUNITIONS FIRM INDICTED BY U. S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—The justice department announced today that a federal grand jury here has indicted a Texas munitions manufacturing company, its president and a court-martialed army officer on charges of bribery and conspiracy to defraud the government. One indictment charges the American Manufacturing company of Texas, President William J. Yare, on charges of "soliciting and procuring" a court-martialed army officer, with unlawfully, wilfully and knowingly conspiring to defraud the government in the purchase of machine tools. The second indictment charges that between Aug. 16, 1941 and March 5,

1942, Courtney gave the officer six checks totaling \$200 with the intent to influence the decision and action of Courtney in his capacity as a war department officer assigned to recommend the amount and kind of tools for government purchase. The announcement said Courtney was convicted April 16, 1943 by a general court martial at Fort Myer, Va., on charges of "soliciting and procuring" a court-martialed army officer to bring discredit to the military service and of conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman. Courtney was dismissed from the service, the announcement added, fined \$1,000 and sentenced to two years of hard labor. The justice department reported that the indictment is based on information supplied by the war department as a federal bureau of investigation inquiry. Maximum penalties under the first indictment are a \$10,000 fine and two years imprisonment and

under the second, three years imprisonment, plus three times the amount of the alleged bribe. Idaho Recipients Of Aid Drop 101 BOISE, Aug. 26 (AP)—Idaho recipients of public assistance decreased by 101 in July from June. H. C. Baldridge, state commissioner of public assistance, said. Assistance in the amount of \$254,414.84 was given to 12,773 persons in the month. Recipients of old-age assistance dropped seven in the month to 9,764. Funds distributed rose \$427 to a total of \$284,820, for an average \$22.02, seven cents more than in June. A total of \$70,209 was distributed to 8,273 dependent children in 1933 for an average of \$8.48 per child. The average grant per family was seven cents from June, but the

average per child was down three cents. The number of families decreased by 88 and the number of children dropped 125. AID to the blind went to 246, same number as in June; in the amount of \$82.25. The average payment was \$23.13, up 12 cents from June. Direct assistance recipients decreased by 28 to 745 cases, a total of \$129,254.61 was disbursed, for an average of \$172.25, up 50 cents. 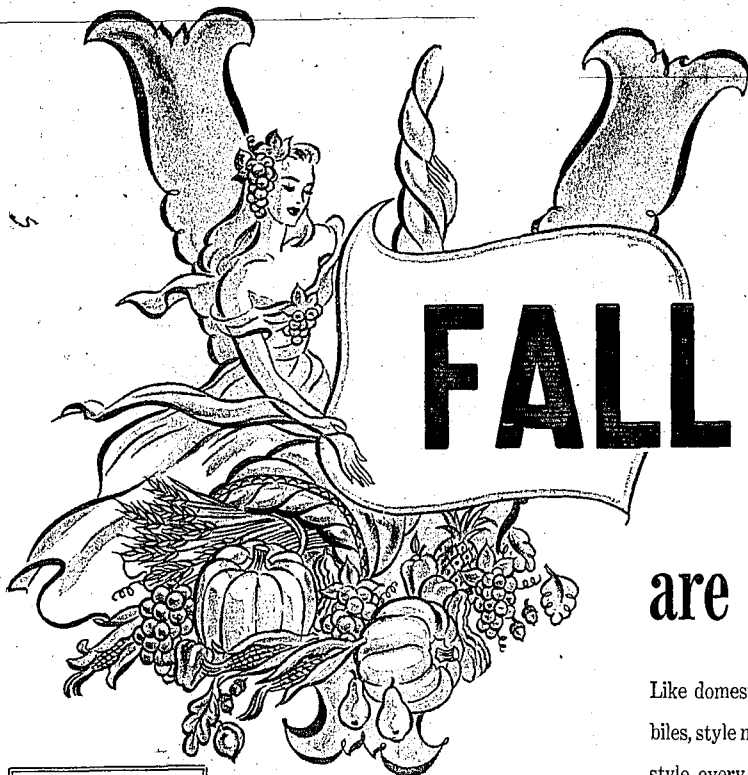

FATHERS IGNORE MINUTT WARNING

By JAMES MARLO
WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (AP)—Draft-age fathers in non-deferred jobs have taken warning as many without budging—the warning that they must shift to war-related occupations or be placed first on the list of army inductees.

A national run-up by the Associated Press showed that the center poll, WMO Boss Paul McNutt's new regulations issued Aug. 14 have little real effect in prying fathers loose from their non-deferred jobs.

The information was obtained from draft boards and officials of the WMO and U. S. employment service in a number of cities.

Some of them frankly said the results to date were "regrettable" or "disappointing" or "very discouraging" although they admitted credit in the "inquiries" about the regulations.

Reasons for Non-Compliance
The poll disclosed various expressed reasons for the "regrettable" attitude of "let 'em take me," belief that congress will block a re-draft, and lack of interest in McNutt's ruling.

Only Philadelphia—with the possible exception of Des Moines—among the reporting cities showed a strongly affirmative reaction for in the former place WMO reported a tremendous "hump" in the draft.

Des Moines' WMO area Director Lee Feyzer said the rate of transfer from non-deferred jobs had risen to his new cut since started the warning but he gave no comparative figures except to say the previous transfer was six.

Awaiting Penalties
One WMO official, not named, said men in his area had received previous manpower directives from McNutt's office and probably are waiting to see what's to be done about the latest of them.

WMO directors in Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, Montana and Nevada, explaining the slow job-shift reaction in their territory, said the married men apparently feel congress will not permit their being drafted. Several officials said they were hesitant about shifting from their present occupations— even though they were—because they feared their jobs would disappear after the war, leaving them out of work, whereas if they stayed where they are until drafted they would have a job to which to return.

Decorated Flier Making His Symbolic Photo 'Come True'

One of the pilots flying the big bombers who are breaking down German morale before invasion is Lt. John Welles, the army flier who posed for a symbolic Christmas feature picture in the Times-News last Dec. 21.

Lieutenant Welles, whose home is in Louisiana, has been ordered to fly a mission with two oak leaf clusters, his first in action, and has flown enough different bombers over the continent to indicate that his job is a lot different from the civilian commercial airline flying. Word of lieutenant's exciting career in a letter to Miss Shirley Smith, Twin Falls, who met the lieutenant at the school the local USO room last December.

The lieutenant and his crew went to England in a bomber titled "Foot for Me," named by one of the gunners. Their next ship, the "Lullaby," which was shot for Luftwaffe "Lullaby." "Lullaby" was loaded to a crew which can carry 100 men, and "Helen Bak" was the record not saying what happened to that ship, and Lieutenant Welles is now flying "Freaky Commendo." A "Freaky Commendo" incidentally is a London "wolf."

Lieutenant Welles has a scar near one eye from a wound received on a mission over the continent, one of his original gunners is dead, and his radio operator was confined to his hospital with severe injuries. When others may have been injured since, last reports is not known.

The composite photo printed last December, of which the accompanying portrait is a post-depleted Gaius handing the globe to the American military, with the intention to help make it free. Lieutenant Welles was sitting in the USO room when the photographer went there for help in finding a subject. It was at that time that he learned how actively the subject chosen by chance would assist in carrying out the rest of the picture.

PENICILLIN GETS COUNCIL PRAISE

CHICAGO, Aug. 25 (AP)—The National Research Council, in its first clinical report on penicillin, gave high praise to the new bacteria-killing agent, calling it a "most potent weapon."

The council's committee on chemotherapy and other agents of the division of medical sciences, outlined in the Journal of the American Medical Association the results of 500 cases of infection treated with penicillin.

"Penicillin has been found to be most effective in the treatment of staphylococci, gonococci, pneumococci and hemolytic (blood destroying) streptococci infections," the report said.

It has been disappointing in the treatment of bacteria endocarditis (inflammation of the membrane lining of the heart). Its effect is particularly striking in autoimmune resistant gonococci infections."

It related that out of 120 cases of gonococci infection—all of which did not respond to the sulfa drugs—12 were free from symptoms and no bacteria could be found within nine to 14 hours after treatment with penicillin.

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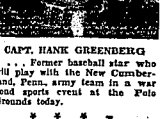

How the nation's food supply can be immeasurably enhanced by checking restrictions on ammunition is the subject of a letter written by G. K. Hunt, Twin Falls, Idaho, and sent to a large number of government officials and other public figures.

Declaring that "the government is making a serious mistake" in restricting the purchase of ammunition by sportsmen, Hunt quotes department of interior figures to show how sportsmen can add to the nation's meat supplies, and how sportsmen can be enhanced by control of predators and the normal procurement of game supplies.
