DANISH UPRIISING AT NEW HEIGHTS IN WAKE OF RIOT

A mounting wave of Danish resistance and opposition throughout Axis-occupied Europe was pictured today in a booklet published by the Danish government in London as the Danish resistance movement gained momentum and disintegration spread into Finland, the Baltic states and the Balkans. The booklet, which is being distributed by patriots preparing for the coming of allied liberators, and depicts many individual instances of bravery.

Unrest arised in Sweden, meanwhile, as a Swedish government communique said an investigation had been conducted by the government in the sinking by German mine sweepers of two Swedish fishing boats off the northern coast within two days.

Called "Bristol Attack" the Stockholm newspaper Dagens Nyheter editorially termed the incident a "brutal attack" and "surprised what we were expecting from that direction in the last war."

Dispatches from Stockholm said Denmark's "people's front" and German occupation authorities reached an agreement in the wake of a riot in the center of Copenhagen yesterday.

German soldiers and Danish police clashed in the demonstration the second in 48 hours. At least 100 persons. An undetermined number of persons were injured.

Resistances of the first riot Wednesday night said German soldiers threw a tear gas canister into the place and fired a volley of shots to break up the demonstration.

Clashes continued. Anti-Nazi sabotage, general strikes and clashes between Danish and German soldiers were reported today by the Danish government.

Disguised Nazi Soldiers in Rome to Help Fascist Plot, Traveler Claims

LONDON, Aug. 27 (AP)—German soldiers disguised as civilians remain in Rome despite Italian attempts to make it an open city for the purpose of aiding a fascist plot to seize the government when the Allies start an invasion, a Spanish traveler from Italy said today.

A Barcelona dispatch said Marquis Bujada, who arrived from Rome by plane, reported that the disguised Nazi soldiers numbered in the thousands. It was not known the plotters hoped to restore Benito Mussolini.

Coincidentally a Swiss dispatch quoted an interview with a neutral diplomat from Italy that the fascist movement was being revitalized while other political parties were ending their quarrel to unite against Premier Marshal Pietro Badoglio because of his failure to end the war.

Bujada said the plot was in the hands and had fascist leaders to seize the government offices at the moment allied troops strike. If it were left to the Italian people, he said, they would capitulate quickly and greet allied troops cheerfully.

Under international law, Rome must be stopped of all troops and military units in order to be considered an open city.

The neutral diplomat, interviewed by the Swiss newspaper Gazette de Lausanne, said there were no signs of progress under suppression as rigid as those of the fascist regime.

THOUSANDS FLED HOME
MADRID, Aug. 27 (AP)—A new worry has been added to Italian Premier Benito Mussolini's care in recent days, for despite all efforts of police and military authorities thousands upon thousands of provincial Italians are moving into Rome for refuge.

Air travelers from Italy arriving in Madrid today estimated that more than 10,000 more Italians than it did before the allies landed in Sicily, and said the number is daily increasing.

RED GESURES TO FRENCH TERMED COOPERATIVE ACT

MOSCOW, Aug. 27 (AP)—The Soviet Union gave evidence of political satisfaction today over Anglo-American cooperation with the United States and Great Britain of the French committee of national liberation.

This recognition, the French committee, which was understood to be a result of the Quebec conference, was the first time that Moscow had been informed of the decisions made by the French committee and Prime Minister Churchill, and the first indication of collaboration in carrying them out.

Simultaneously, the army newspaper "Pravda" declared, "only with a real and not a paper peace front in the West can effective aid be given to the army."

Fighting French Recognized
Foreign Communist Vycheslav Molotov gave notice of the recognition last night at a meeting at the Kremlin with Gen. Charles de Gaulle and other French leaders.

A communique announcing the decision to exchange envoys published today, said the French committee was "the French committee of the state interests of the French republic and leader of all French patriots."

Close Relations
The Soviet Union had close relations for more than a year with the De Gaulle movement, which is represented here by political and military missions and "Normandy" fighter aviation squadrons, which are based in North Africa.

Full Red Approval For French Chiefs of Ops . . . S., British

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (AP)—The Soviet Union's unqualified recognition of the French committee of national liberation today overshadowed by the United States, Great Britain and Canada.

The Russian action, recognizing the committee as "representative of the state interests of the French republic" and pledging an exchange plenipotentiaries representatives, was not a surprise.

Soviet officials for sometime have been pressing for allied recognition of the French committee, jointly headed by Gen. Charles de Gaulle, Gen. Henri Honoré Girard and Gen. Philippe Leclerc de Hauteclocque.

The success of such a policy will not be determined immediately. The qualifications will make it possible to affirm the recognition by the United States and Great Britain.

Names of the British and French committees were disclosed at a press conference today by the committee.

French sources said they had hoped that the American and British governments would stipulate that the committee be recognized as the "sole" representative of the French people.

FIVE SUBS SUNK BY YANK PLANES

NEW YORK, Aug. 27 (AP)—At least 10 German U-boats were sunk or damaged recently in 13 air-sea battles between U. S. Army air forces and German submarines in the Atlantic Ocean, the AAF's anti-submarine command announced today.

The anti-submarine command said five submarines were believed to have been sunk, and two damaged, and three were forced under water and thereby prevented from attacking nearby allied shipping.

None of these battles had been reported previously. The anti-submarine command said.

B-24s specially equipped for anti-submarine warfare were sent far as 1,000 miles from their home bases to battle the submarines, the command said, and all returned safely, although five of them were subjected to severe anti-aircraft fire from the U-boats.

Crushing Air Smash Hits Jap Supply Base

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Southwest Pacific, Aug. 27 (AP)—A crushing blow by the largest allied bombing fleet ever assembled in New Guinea left a huge gap in the vital Japanese coastal supply line at Hinsa bay today as ground troops scored gains at both ends of the southern Pacific front.

Nearly 100 Liberators, Flying Fortresses and Mitchells, escorted by Lightnings, blasted Hinsa bay Wednesday with 150 tons of bombs, raking the area for an hour and setting a five-mile-long mass of flames along the shore.

BOOK DESCRIBES NAZI ATROCITIES

LONDON, Aug. 27 (AP)—The German mass murderer, Adolf Hitler, is described in a book of espionage and war crimes, "The Nazi Atrocities," issued by the Inter-Allied Information Committee.

The document depicted a ghoulish scene of a German soldier throughout Europe as the conqueror of peoples prepared for the coming of the allied liberator.

While the Belgian had not seen his wife and child in an adjoining room, he heard his wife talking and the baby cry "daddy."

In one Polish village a dead man apparently was shot at the door to the family, the Germans murdered the prisoner and beat him until he collapsed. Then he was dragged into the courtyard and executed on the spot.

The "document" shows the Nazis collected through underground channels in every country—arrest, torture, hostages, wholesale massacres, mass deportations, forced labor, concentration camps and systematic starvation.

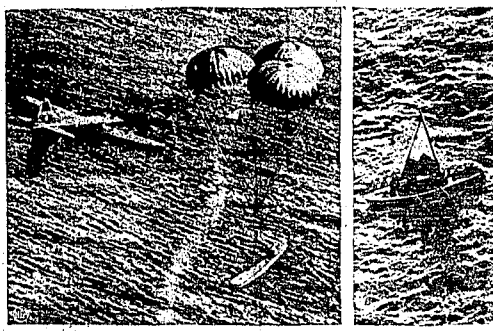

HUNT GROUP WILL LEAVE FOR JAPAN

HUNT, Aug. 27.—Ten families and three single persons who have been residents of the Minidoka relocation center will board an east-bound train at Shoshone Sunday afternoon to start a three months' journey which will end in Japan.

These 40 persons have requested repatriation or expatriation to Japan and will sail from New York on passenger ship Gripsholm. At the expense of American civilians who were interned in Japan will be made for Japanese civilian interests. Their exchange is expected to be carried out by Oct. 15, according to the state department.

A group of 23 Japanese from the central Utah relocation center will leave Shoshone at the same time.

Others to Be Moved

Hunt officers who have applied for repatriation or expatriation and others who have indicated by action and statements that they are loyal to Japan and not in sympathy with the United States in its war effort, will be moved within the next few weeks to the Tule Lake center in northern California. They include 280 persons who are tentatively scheduled to leave Oct. 1. About 1,500 others will be moved later.

Nearly 2,000 loyal Japanese-Americans in the Tule Lake center will be transferred to Minidoka when Tule Lake becomes a segregation center. This will fill the Minidoka center to capacity. The present population is about 1,000.

May Seek Release

While the movements to and from Tule Lake have been completed, all the persons of Japanese ancestry remaining in the relocation centers have been checked and will be eligible to apply for release from the relocation center and entry into normal communities where they can contribute to this country's war effort.

From Minidoka to date 1,768 evacuees have gone out on indefinite leave and 1,133 are out on seasonal leave working in food production and food processing. Those on indefinite leave must report changes in address, and those on seasonal leave cannot without permission leave the country to which they are assigned. Others out on leave cannot travel without permission of a U. S. citizen.

U. S. Advertisers Urged to Help in Giving Food Data

NEW YORK, Aug. 27 (AP)—Palmer Hoyt, OWI director of domestic operations, advises advertisers to cooperate with the government in informing the public of the need for rationing, for food conservation and for the proper use of food supplies.

Addressing a meeting sponsored by the war food administration, the office of price administration, the office of war information and the advertising council, Hoyt declared that for Americans had a clear picture of the food situation as a whole.

The meeting was attended by food industry executives and their advertising representatives, and its purpose was to discuss the industrial participation in the governmental "food fights for freedom" educational program.

"There is not enough food in total to satisfy all the demands at home and abroad," Hoyt said. "Get food can shorten the war, save American lives and help write a decent peace if we use it properly and if we at home can be informed and persuaded to take certain actions that will enable us to provide enough food for civilians and still meet the increased demand for food for war purposes."
