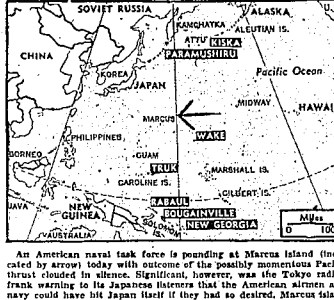

# FARMERS GIVEN BIG BOND QUOTA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—Ascertaining that country banks are literally bursting with idle money, a Treasury official said farmers were expected to play a big part in the \$100,000,000 bond drive which opens Sept. 5.

Lloyd E. Farnham, in charge of the balance of agricultural production for the treasury, said a survey indicated that at least 60 per cent of the nation's 5,000,000 farms have surplus yield bond orders or definite schedules of investment.

"Farmers have the money and they are convinced of the wisdom of financing their surplus by government securities," Farnham declared, noting that "the banks of the country are in a better position to handle the new securities than they have been in the past."

Farmers cited the agricultural income tax which has increased and which has decreased "amazingly" since 1940. Farnham said that the Treasury Department has increased the bond quota for farmers to \$1,000,000.

Increasing the emphasis being placed on conversion of farm bank holdings into war bonds is not a new thing, Farnham said. It is a bond purchase "not merely a patriotic gesture, but a very profitable way of providing an outlet for funds which otherwise would be idle."

Farmers Offset Fertility Loss  
In Indiana, for instance, he said, farmers are planning to pay away to war bonds an amount calculated to offset the loss in soil fertility.

# GIRAUD PUTS ALL ENERGY INTO WAR

By REYNOLDS FACKARD ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Sept. 1 (AP)—General Giraud is devoting his entire attention and energy to the war, and politics will wait until the allies win it, the French commander-in-chief made clear today in an exclusive conversation with this correspondent.

Giraud also professed his satisfaction with the United States equipment his soldiers have received. He declared his confidence that it will enable the French to restore themselves as a fighting power in the near future.

Those were the outstanding impressions received from talks with Giraud for more than 30 minutes. We chatted in his private office, the walls of which were covered with maps of north Africa and lined with bookshelves.

Smiles Punctate Talk  
My first impression was of the evident lack of his military bearing. But after we seated ourselves in spacious low leather chairs, he relaxed personally and physically. Stables frequently punctuated his conversation, and he seemed to cover the main sections of which he spoke.

Giraud's handgrip tightened as he sat there. His blunt eye twinkling, whenever he related military and physical feats of north Africa.

After Giraud dismissed the interpreter, who at first was present in case my French was up to the occasion, we settled down alone to talk about the war and the French people.

Speaks Italian Perfectly  
He told me about his experience as a prisoner in Germany, and I told him how I had been in Italy for five months in Italy.

"Allora," he said, "I speak Italian" (then you speak Italian) he explained, and went on talking to me in perfect Italian for some time.

I had the impression, however, that he was satisfied with and proud of the unity achieved between him and Gen. Charles De Gaulle which enabled him to concentrate on his war task.

Another impression I gathered was that Giraud was anxious about his wife and children, who still are in occupied France under the constant vigilance of the Gestapo.

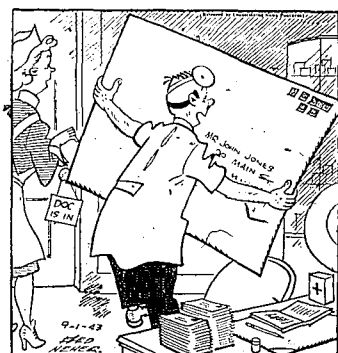

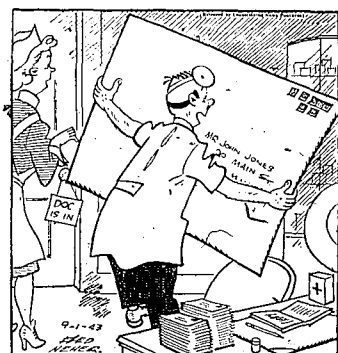

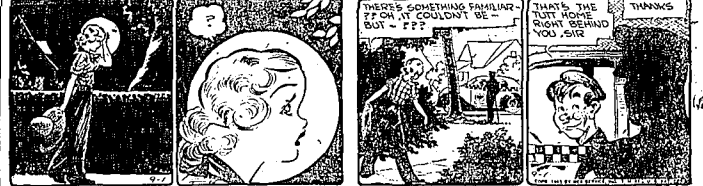

Cyprus, once under constant alert against German bombers, has become a powerful offensive outpost and is being gaged on its capacity to supply the necessary supplies to sustain a German thrust toward middle east oil fields to be targeted for joint assault on Europe.
