YANKEE BOMBERS OFFENSIVE INTO SIXTH DAY

LONDON, Sept. 7 (AP)—American heavy and medium bombers, carrying the allied aerial offensive against western Europe into its sixth straight day, blasted at targets in Belgium and France this morning following a heavy RAF night attack on Munich.

The target of the British overnight assault was identified first by the Berlin radio, a preliminary London announcement saying merely that Germany had again been hit.

In addition to being the site of important industries, Munich is a major railway center through which flows lines leading into Italy via Brenno pass.

The British air ministry said 16 bombers were lost in the night's operations. The attack was effective, although clouds prevented full observation of results.

ALLIED BRIDGEHEAD Front Extended to 70 Miles in Italy

Invasion Spearhead Deeper
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Sept. 7 (UP)—The British eighth army has captured the 15th century town of Palmi in an eight-mile advance up the northwestern coast of the Italian toe to extend its bridgehead front to more than 70 miles, it was revealed today.

While the bulk of the British and Canadian forces drive up the coast toward the Calabrian boot, other troops seized Delianova, Sinopoli and Cosoleto, all of which are south and east of Palmi, and moved inland to slash off the end of the mountainous peninsula.

Allied air forces swirled their offensive against the crowded troops to bombard five enemy air fields in the Naples area and hit up the capture of four air bases from the ground force.

The eighth army troops moved slowly because of extensive enemy demolitions and the rugged terrain. The new front line runs from Palmi inland to Delianova, then to San Stefano, to Reggio Calabria and southward to Mileto.

DEADLINE SET IN FATHERS' DRAFT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Selective service today set Sept. 15 as the deadline for fathers to register their sons to transfer to other work if they prefer a career in the military.

Unless they have actually obtained a career in a business or profession registered with the U. S. employment service, fathers must register their sons before Sept. 15, or they will be liable for the draft.

Today's announcement took the form of an amendment to a regulation issued three weeks ago. It laid down the rule that the 18-day immunity from reclassification "earned" by registering for a job-transfer can be lost if the father fails to register under any circumstances.

However, if a father would bring his son up for induction earlier than the date set by the regulation, a non-deferrable job, he will get no added immunity and will be subject to call for service as a regular draftee after Oct. 1.

Washington draft boards will be authorized to order induction of men in the 18-hour positions recently declared non-deferrable.

The boards, which hitherto have had complete control over each individual's case, subject only to appeal board rulings, were forbidden to order induction of men in these positions unless they had first registered the case to the employment service.
