Japs Fleeing Allied Drive To Take Lae

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Southwest Pacific, Sept. 14 (AP)—Allied troops chased a disorganized Japanese force up the New Guinea coast today toward a death trap at Lae after capturing Salamaua in one of the major triumphs of the Southwest Pacific offensive.

A communique announced that American and Australian forces occupied Salamaua, once a strong enemy naval and air base, on Sunday as the remnants of the enemy garrison fled up the coastal route.

Australian units from inland positions drove toward the coast, seeking to cut off at least some of the enemy troops, and turned northward to herd them into the tightening noose at Lae. At least 2,000 enemy troops were believed caught in the narrowing allied lines.

The enemy's only sanctuary was Lae, approximately 25 miles north of Salamaua and that could only temporarily since allied forces intended that stronghold.

Preparations for an assault on the Japanese were well advanced, and the Allies were expected to capture Lae in the next few days.

Bond Chairman Disappointed; Raps Self-Righteous Buyers

Disappointment with the \$20,457.90 worth of bonds sold at the end of the fourth day of the third war bond drive was expressed Tuesday by C. R. Nelson, Twin Falls county chairman.

Nelson Tuesday made a total of \$10,000.00 by the end of the fourth day, declared Nelson, "but we fell short of that figure."

"There are too many people buying one or two small bonds and taking the self-righteous attitude that they have done their job," he said.

"Too many of us are trying to figure out how little will be required, instead of trying to figure out how much we can buy."

Nelson Tuesday made a special appeal to Twin Falls county farmers, pointing out that only about half the farmers of the county purchased bonds in the second war bond drive.

"It is estimated that net farm income for the United States after deduction of all expenses, said the chairman, will reach a total of \$11,000,000,000 in 1945, compared to \$6,000,000,000 in 1942. These figures should be of interest to all of us," he said.

"The farmer is the backbone of our country, and it is his duty to do his part in the war effort. He should be encouraged to buy more bonds and to help in the war effort."

SOVIETS SEIZE BRYANSK RACE TRAP NAZIS

BY ROBERT MUSEL — LONDON, Sept. 14 (AP)—(German) radio reports of the loss of Bryansk, great railroad hub linking the central and southern fronts in Russia, and Moscow said a red army column was racing against the Nazi flank to cut off the routed paratrooper.

Berlin, in its familiar manner of backing into an admission of a major defeat on the Russian front, said the German paratrooper evacuated Bryansk last night "according to plan" and had "destroyed all the installations so thoroughly that the Soviets are putting their hands in an empty pocket."

Are Storming City

Confirmation of the Soviet capture of the city supporting the now unshaken ends of the front was expected later today, it was reported that Soviet troops had forced the Deena River at Bryansk and were occupying the area.

The fall of Bryansk, from which railroads radiate to Moscow, Kiev, Genet, Kiev and Smolensk, was foretold by Russian reports that the red army had surged in against the city, capturing two outlying rail junctions and laying siege to the town across the Deena from there.

The Germans seized Bryansk in their first invasion sweep which included the city and the Soviet defenses in October, 1941, and had held it ever since.

Tactically admitting that they evacuated Bryansk to avoid encirclement, the Germans drew a propaganda parallel between their capture of the city and the capture of the city. LONDON, Sept. 14 (AP)—After the Allies today were celebrating the rebirth of freedom under Benito Mussolini's personal command with a resolution that he would cancel Italy's capitulation, recognize the Italian army and pronounce the end of the rule of the house of Savoia.

Further opposition to the presence of the German forces in Italy is spreading all over the country, it was reported by the Associated Press. In the Balkans, too, German troops have been challenged everywhere by Italian soldiers.

Fighting in Belgrade

"Fierce fighting" occurred in Belgrade, two thousand Italian soldiers are in the mountains of Montenegro, and the Italian forces are fighting against the Germans. The Balkans are becoming a theater of operations.

Trying to stall new made from the name of the man who once set thousands of Italians rocking to sleep, Mussolini's propaganda declared that news of Mussolini's liberation in a Hitler-engineered broadcast was a "hoax."

Belgian divisions from the Italian front indicated that fascist uprisings and parades had taken place in Brussels and Antwerp.

Former fascist officials said that the Italian army was taking steps to take control of all anti-fascist activities in the country.

AIRPORT RUNWAY JOB COMPLETED

Completion of a runway graveling project at the Twin Falls municipal airport at a cost of \$23,000 was announced today by City Engineer John T. Hayes.

The David Reed construction company used 3,471 cubic yards of gravel to complete the project. The runway is 2,000 feet by 75 feet on the east-west runway, and 1,000 feet on the north-south-east-southwest runway. Two hundred thirty-seven cubic yards of gravel were applied and the gravel was well-rolled to form a closely packed surface around the gravel retention area.

SHERIDAN, Wyo., Sept. 14 (AP)—They aren't measuring "Tanks" across the yard yet, but they may come on northern Wyoming cattle ranches there, breeders are pointing toward chunkier beef producing meat animals.

Sam Moss, owner and head wrangler of the Butler-33, one of Sheridan County's showplaces, and his neighbor, husky Allen Fordyce, predict that continued cautious and studied breeding will establish first in the "compact" line of Herefords—a critter carrying much more meat than the "compact" steers.

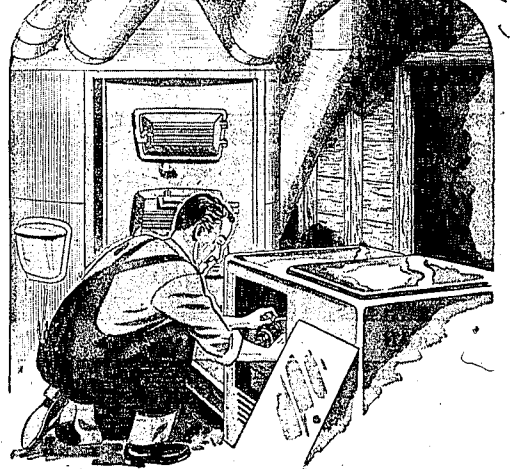

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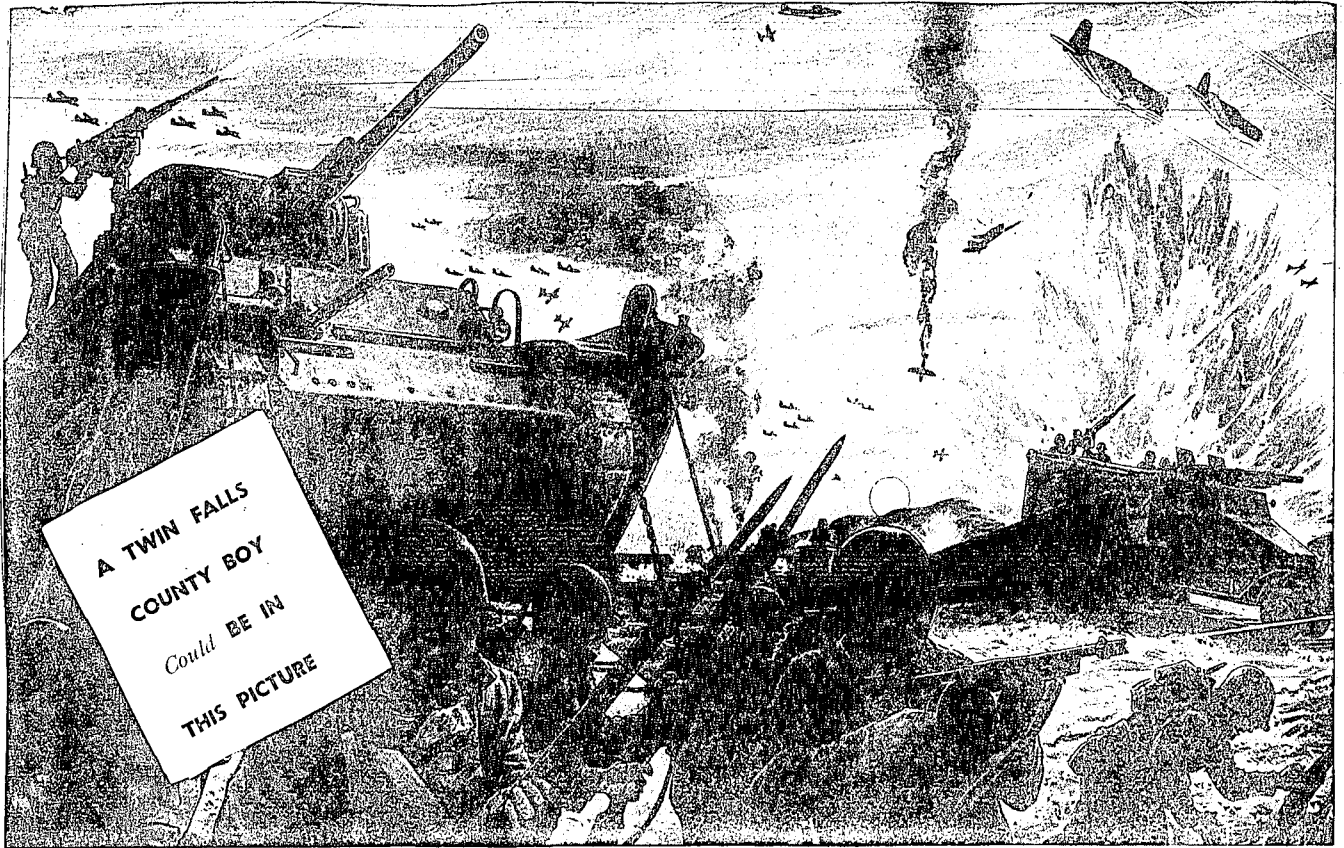
