RIVERFORD, Calif., Sept. 15 (AP)—One woman was killed and 16 other persons were injured, none critically, Tuesday when a railroad switch engine smashed into a motor bus carrying March field civilian work ers and soldiers from the army air base.

The bus was Mrs. Pauline Crocker, 30, Riverford.

The injured were taken to hospitals after a section had been used to cut away sections of the bus.

### RATIONING UNITS HEAR OPA CHIEFS

JEROME, Sept. 15—State OPA officials from Boise convened with local ration boards of counties from the Magic Valley area at Jerome Monday afternoon to discuss rationing policies and procedures existing within the local boards' territories.

Executive OPA officials present were Walter T. Lockwood, informational officer, W. J. White, state price officer, William Calloway, state rationing officer, and representatives of the rationing division—Potter Howard, Walter Deleford and Norman Egan.

Also attending the meeting was Carl N. Anderson, chief clerk of local OPA boards in the Twin Falls area.

**Pledges Cited**

State price officer White pointed out that the principal problem in rationing was the matter of the consumer and merchant pledge.

"The merchant pledges to sell no goods above ceiling prices and to demand points for rationed goods. The consumer pledges to buy no merchandise above the ceiling price and to give points for rationed goods. When this pledge becomes universal, all black markets should be stamped out."

**Main Reason for Rationing**

"The principal reason for rationing," he said, "is to equalize the distribution of scarce commodities. It isn't a project of coercion, but means of getting cooperation between the consumer and the merchant."

White demonstrated by a statistical chart that the OPA has been reasonably successful to date but explained that dangers are ahead.

With the chart, he illustrated the comparative cost of living of this present with that of industry and of living and inflation in the last war.

"Price rationing is helping cope with inflationary problems, but there is still much work to be done."

In closing, White compared OPA with England's system of rationing.

### TUCKER'S NATIONAL WAR RELIEF

**HAZARDS OF TRAVEL**

Apparently sabotage has been eliminated as an explanation of the coincidence by which, between dusk and dawn, two of the world's most famous trains were wrecked within a few hours of each other.

This raises a question whether the wrecks of the Pennsylvania's Advance Congressional and the New York Central's Twentieth Century Limited and before that of the Lackawanna train at Wayland, N. Y., and then the explosion of an Erie locomotive at Port Jervis, N. Y.—were due to faulty maintenance alone.

It will be some time, probably, before final reports place responsibility for each of these accidents. Even then, there may be a legitimate question whether the series of mishaps was coincidental, or whether they might have occurred in pence times, with the utmost of preventive attention, but just happened to come now, when we are prepared to expect the worst.

It is probable that maintenance faults were at least partially responsible, nobody need be surprised. The railroads have been pressed to the limit to handle unprecedented intrusions of army equipment, which have been a great motive and every car capable of standing under its own weight, and to run them day and night with a minimum of opportunity for checks and tinkering.

Like everybody else, the railroads are handicapped by inability to obtain replacement of equipment, or even ample material for renovation. Shop equipment is at a premium and they are forced to use working forces—they do not even have their normal personnel of veteran men, because the armed forces have taken thousands of railroaders.

It is probable that every working piece of equipment was checked, not merely to satisfy curiosity, and surely not just to the point where it was too late to do anything, in view of the burden they are carrying, the railroads must be given special consideration as to manpower and materials and machinery.

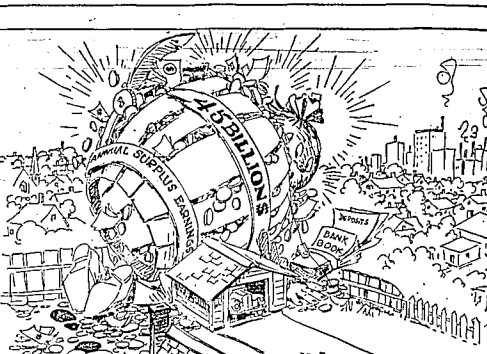

When a handsomely dressed man and woman knocked at the door of my house one night about midnight and asked me to help them, I went with reasonable ease. They had their apartment key in the theater, they had their money and no matter at the street door was a long black Rolls-Royce with a chauffeur. On the way to a fashionable address on Park avenue, I told them that I never placed an apartment door until the superintendent or the elevator operator identified the owner. They looked at me with surprise as the superintendent was reached. I said to myself, "I wish I was a millionaire."

When the superintendent arrived, cross and sleepy, I told him the number of the apartment that I had never placed. "Wait a minute," he answered. "I'll be right up." The owner of that apartment is just a wealthy "bore." When I hung up the telephone the boy was rapt. A few minutes later the superintendent arrived in his hatbox, carrying a key. There was a man in a Rolls-Royce in sight.

The only customer who admitted to my better judgment by playing on my sympathy was a thin, nervous, anxious-looking, middle-aged woman who brought into my shop a soap impression of the lock of a jewel box. She was a lady's maid, according to her story, and had been out of work for three months. She had a very good story, a wealthy woman on Long Island. Everything had gone well until the day that the woman had a jewel chest. The loss had not been discovered yet, but it would be the next time there was a wedding or a theater party and the maid was streaming down her cheeks. The woman asked me to make a key. When the middle-aged man got out of work, it was very hard to find a new job to get at an office safe and to find the most cautious of us.

I started out with no suspicions the first time I was asked to go down to a Wall street office on a Saturday afternoon. Most of the offices in the building were closed, but in this one the staff was working. There were several typewriters there, a brick young man who showed me into his office where the safe was kept. I started to work but somehow there was a shanty all about that office. Whether it was the manager of the machine or the way the safe typed, presenting themselves if they were short girls giving a good performance, I couldn't tell.

The association soon had 1,100 members and chapters in every city. Within a year, we were holding our first national convention.
