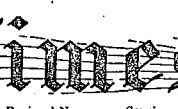

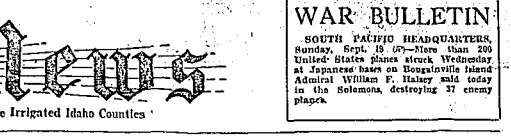

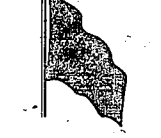

MUSICIANS LIFT RECORDINGS BAN

CHICAGO, Sept. 18 (AP)—The American Federation of Musicians today announced that it has signed a contract with the Decca Broadcasting Company that will lift the recording ban on the world's broadcasting system.

James G. Petrillo, AFM head, ordered the ban's recording effective Aug. 1, 1942, on the ground that the making of records caused "undue interference" with employment of musicians. The AFM executive board said that displacement of musicians by "canned" music "would eventually destroy the entire structure for the study of music, eventually would destroy the entire structure of the music industry."

Petrillo admitted that the recording ban had resulted in employment of more than 100,000 musicians, but he explained that this was because of large reserves of recordings made before Aug. 1, 1942.

MILK SITUATION NO. 1 PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—War food administration officials agreed unanimously today that the milk situation is the nation's number-one food problem and the question of whether to subsidize production was already being debated by congressmen and food officials.

Milk shortages have become acute in many areas, due to heavy demands by the military and lend-lease. Many farmers also have sold off their herds because higher feed and labor costs make production unprofitable at present prices.

The WFA plans to announce a national program shortly to limit total milk production, but the question of production remains to be solved.

Sen. Robert F. Wagner, D. N. Y., says he believes any form of subsidy must be adopted whether you like it or not—to maintain production and still keep prices within the range of low income groups.

Food Administrator Marvin Jones proposed three milk subsidy plans yesterday to the War Food Administration's committee, which Wagner is chairman.

One was a flat subsidy to producers estimated to cost \$59,000,000 over a 12-month period. The second was a combination of producer subsidies in areas where milk costs are high and rationing in areas with low cost areas. The third was a flat subsidy to keep food costs in line with milk prices, estimated to cost \$3,000,000 for three months. (The cost of the second plan was not given.)

Price Increase Asked.
A farm bill introduced by Sen. John Bankhead, D. Ala., who is also on the banking and currency committee, contained farm suggestions with a demand for a price increase of one cent a quart to producers.

It said he was not particularly ardent subsidy, but doubted that Jones' proposals would solve the problem.

"One cent may not sound like much," Wagner returned, "but to poor families it is a lot." He admitted that a majority of his committee are opposed to subsidies, but said he hoped the administration could work out an "acceptable" program.

Representing the Combined U. S. Forces WITH FIFTH ARMY, ITALY, Sept. 17 (Delayed AP)—Patrol of the fifth and eighth armies met to abruptly they almost passed each other.

But an Oklahoma officer's shout of "hello" and an Irishman's brogue-tinted response—plus a bottle of wine—brought them together.

They met late yesterday on a stretch of mountain road in the picturesque country between Fascium and Sanir.

I went south with a patrol ordered to travel south until I met eighth army units.

It happened along a good dirt road not far from the Mediterranean. The soldiers had machine guns and rifles ready. Our three Jeep's rounded a bend when two British armored cars, traveling at a fast pace, appeared.

Before the drivers could stop the lead cars passed each other. Our leader, Lt. H. B. Baker, Elk City, Okla., called out his "hello" and gave with a dusty head called back "hello" from the first armored car. He was Sgt. Martin Butler, County Kildare.

After introductions, they exchanged news and then Butler, who was accompanied by Pvt. William Noble, London, said: "I think this calls for a little wine produced in this beautiful land." He had the wine. Two barfoot Italian goat herders watched the drinking ceremony.

An old Italian who spoke English and who had worked in a tannery in Montana had his wife prepare us a meal and we talked until the moon came up. The Italian family complained that the Germans never were friendly, wouldn't even wave to them.

Within a few hours we were back in sight of the flames of guns at the front line.

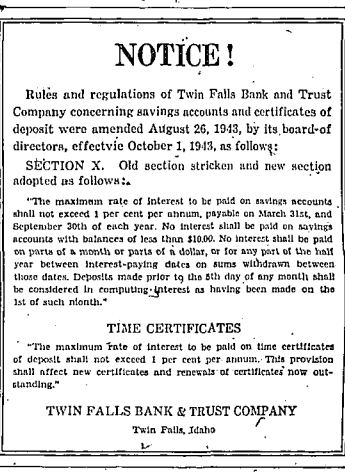

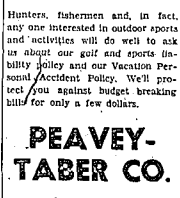

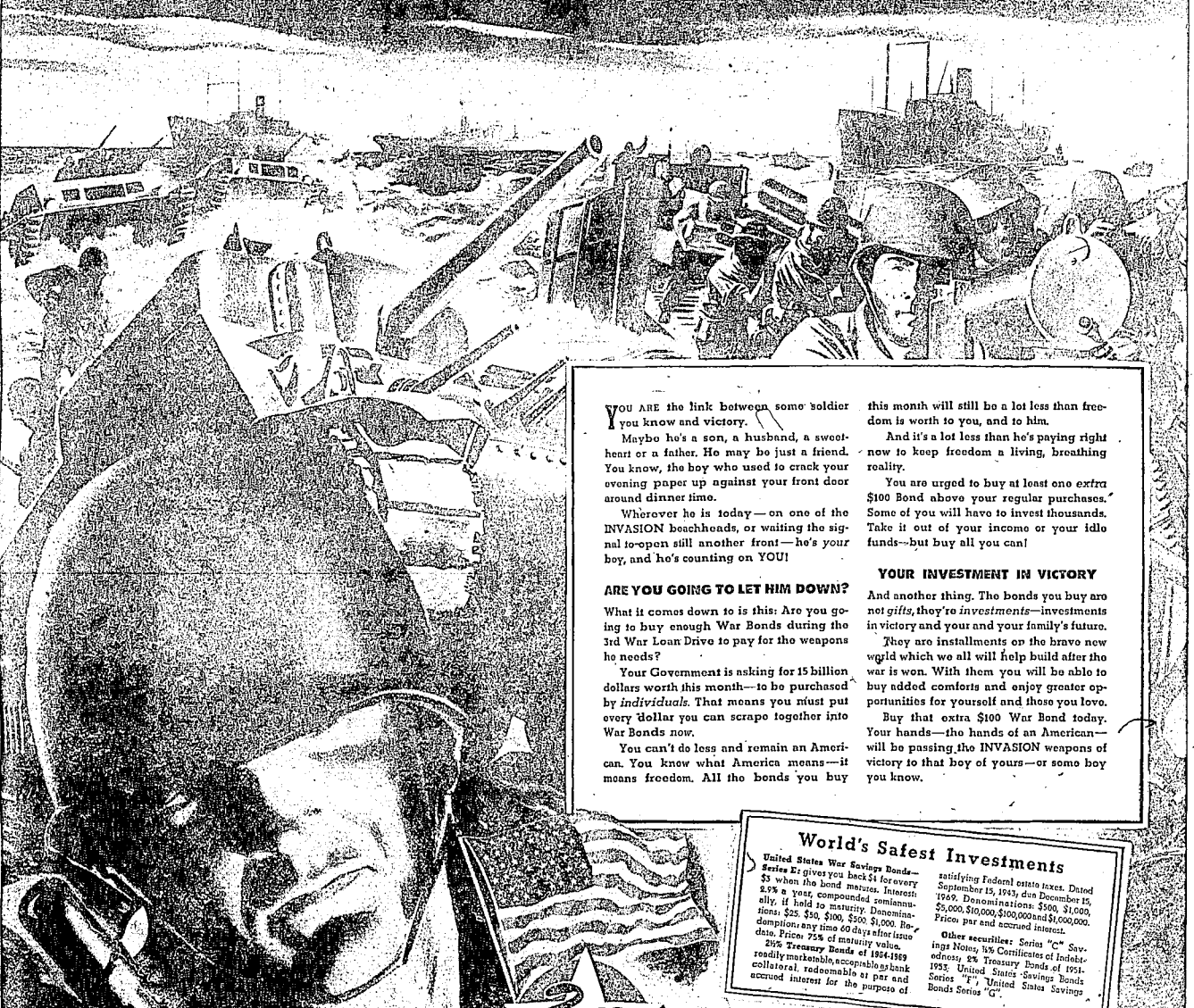
