Pacific Fleet Rounds Japs

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii, Sept. 20 (AP)—New lows by the U.S. Pacific fleet against Japanese bases on Tarawa and Nauru islands were regarded today as part of a drive to force the enemy back to his major naval stronghold at Truk.

The type of the attack was not described in the first report. Earlier this month a carrier task force consisting of the USS Yorktown and other carrier-based planes carried out the attacks and they raided not only Tarawa and Nauru but also nearby Makin Island.

The raids occurred Saturday night and Sunday, Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, fleet commander, revealed in a communique, and presumably were delivered by a carrier task force during the afternoon again to fight in defense of its outposts.

Both Tarawa and Nauru—two of the 160 islands in the Gilbert Islands approximately 200 miles southwest of Honolulu and Nauru to more than 1,000 miles west of the Hawaiian Islands—lie 1,600 miles east of Truk, the enemy naval hub for the southern Pacific region.

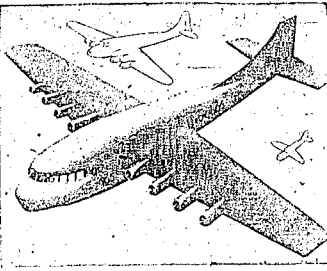

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Industrial America's outpouring of ships, planes and munitions for the navy has built up the most powerful air power in the world—a gigantic fleet operating around the globe. A navy inventory disclosed today that the fleet now includes 14,072 vessels, 612 of them warships. In 1940 the navy had only 1,070 vessels, of which 353 were fighting craft.

They thought I was being mysterious, but it was not until we were well at sea that I gave them a partial envelope of documents, and even when I read them I knew little more than I had before.
