LONDON, Sept. 21 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill declared today that the second front will be thrown open "at the right time" and "a mass invasion of the continent from the west will begin."

Calling the Mediterranean battlefront the "third front," the prime minister told congressmen that the second front "already exists potentially" and "already is rapidly gathering weight."

The second front exists and a main preoccupation already with the enemy.

"It has not yet been thrown into play," he continued. "That time is coming."

"At what we and our American allies judge to be the right time this front will be thrown open and a mass invasion of the continent from the west will begin."



As the American fifth army turned back German counter-attacks and began a new push to capture Sicily, French and Italian troops seized control of the island of Corsica, Sardinia, and other important bases for operations against the mainland, left to the allies Sunday.

## French Take Corsica; Allied Headquaters Destroyed

—WITH AMERICAN FIFTH ARMY, ITALY, Sept. 21 (UP)—The Germans tried to unleash a counter-attack in the Salerno area yesterday but were slammed back with heavy losses by fifth army assault forces.

—ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NORTH AFRICA, Sept. 21 (UP)—French and Italian troops, already in firm control of Ajaccio, capital of Corsica, were reported driving the Germans back toward the sea today, and the allied fifth army on the Italian mainland captured Ebboli and halted its way toward the Naples plain.

—WITH AMERICAN FIFTH ARMY, ITALY, Sept. 21 (UP)—A big allied push which started 24 hours ago was well under way today and several more Italian towns—all of them of strategic importance—had fallen into American and British hands.

The Germans, as they were shoved back along the entire Salerno front below Naples, began resorting to the demolition tactics they used in retreating before the eighth army in the toe of the Italian boot. The enemy had mined areas from which they were retreating in a vain effort to destroy moving bridges and roads in an effort to break contact with the swiftly-moving fifth army and retard its progress.

### PLANE DESTROYED

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### SERVICES LIMITED BY BAN ON 'TIES'

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—After challenging Rip Van Winkle for his sleeping record, the armed forces of the United States in the Pacific have finally awakened and the result has been victory with a capital 'V' over sleep.

In other words, there no longer is any real navy, marine corps, merchant sealer or coast guard. It is now the "armed services."  
As soon as pretty Jeannettes were laid aside, as soon as Admiral William B. Halsey Jr. issued orders in the south Pacific to "put aside your ties for the duration," the aquatic life was turned on Guadalcanal and it has been on the edge ever since.

### SOLON HITS AT FEDERAL WASTE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—By James R. O'Connell, serving today that he is leading for a "commando raid on the waters in the federal government" in introducing legislation aimed at obtaining for congress information on general expenditures and any "unexcused duplications and waste of public funds in government agencies."  
Solon's three bills would repeal the prohibition of the administration's organization plan No. 1 which transferred the budget team from the treasury department to the executive office of the President.

James would make the bureau an independent agency reporting to congress and to the President details of all requests by departments and agencies for appropriations. It also would furnish information on whether the requested money would be used to carry out functions not authorized by law.

A second bill would appropriate \$200,000 for the remainder of this fiscal year to permit the comptroller general to make inquiries, reports and recommendations to congress on overall disbursement and application of public funds.  
The third measure would require the comptroller general's office to make disclosures and withhold reports where expenditures are made illegally and to start collection proceedings against those receiving the illegal payments.
