JAPS MISSING ON "THEIR" SEA AREA

WITH THE U. S. TASK FORCE OFF OLDBAIT ISLANDS, Sept. 25 (AP)—The supposed loss to the Japanese territory but you never would know it.

CHILD'S STOMACH WILL BE RIGHTED

PALL RIVER, Mass., Sept. 25 (AP)—Clinging to a faint hope of her 14-day-old, barely Helen Primus of New Britain, Pa., had feared several days of constant observation before undergoing a hazardous operation to right her upside-down stomach.

Witness to Lidice Slaughter Fails to Elude Nazi Gestapo

LONDON, Sept. 25 (AP)—One of the few men who knew the full story of what happened at Lidice when the Czech village was wiped out by the Germans in 1942, when the Gestapo agents who trailed him 300 miles across Europe.

In a big steel filing cabinet on the third floor of the old houses at a stone building here in London, he is listed as "Karl Horak," but his true identity, known to fewer than a dozen persons is hidden among the names of the Lidice town.

By his Nazi intelligence agents. They have pieced together the story of his 12-month flight from Czechoslovakia to a friend in Britain where he had hoped to tell his story, but the trail disappeared three months ago with word that he was crossing the German frontier to France.

No further reports have been received from the underground network which helped him slip past German border guards, but there were days when he hid in forests and barns, sleep in the rain and snow was cold and wet hunger, hunger, despair and always the Gestapo on his mind as his way across Germany.

But before he vanished Horak told part of his story to underground leaders and from their reports the intelligence officers have been able to piece together a fair picture of what happened at Lidice.

Horak didn't face a mad firing squad with Lidice but had slipped over a class of wine in Prague and missed a bus home. He hitched a ride past his wife, then cut across the fields through Kitzbühel forest.

Heard warning... On the forest's edge he stumbled into a trap... The plan was just rising when the British A-871 overtook Lidice.

An army glow rose from the valley in which the village nestled. He heard gun and saw German armor drawn up about the village. He heard the screams of women and children being carried away in trucks to concentration camps and "sanitation centers."

St. Martin's churchyard. He watched great fires sweep through the town. He saw anti-aircraft blast the town into rubble. From his vantage point on the hill, he watched Lidice die.

During the major battle there we all had our share at the machine guns. On one occasion I was in a dogfight. When I came my turn to shoot the target, I fired and I looked straight into the guns of a Japanese pilot who was engaging in dog-fight strafing.

Schumacher reported that popular motion pictures on 16 mm film often were shown at Pacific outposts before their premiere in the States.

Tells of Genetres... The sergeant said that the U. S. canteens in the Pacific are more beautiful than many here in the states. Each grave is marked with a headstone of metal or cement, the grounds are well landscaped and cared for by natives and every grave-yard has a picturesque chapel.

FINNS READY TO TALK PEACE PLAN

HELSINKI, Sept. 25 (AP)—The problem of peace between Finland and Russia has narrowed the question of "what sort of peace is possible," Finance Minister Valter Tanner, who after has been denoted as the "strong man" in the government of Premier Edvin Lohiainen, said in a long discussion of the country's war position.

"The question," he said, "is only what sort of peace is possible. It is honest aim if it guarantees us peace in the future." Tanner said the Soviet union has not declared its viewpoint. In event it wishes to announce its thoughts, it can find enough channels through which to communicate to us."
