## Soviet Sweep Nears White Russia Bases

LONDON, Sept. 28 (AP)—Three key cities of White Russia—Gomel, Mogilev and Vitsebsk—were in danger from advancing red army forces today, while further south other Soviet countries continued their unrelenting pressure against Kiev, Kremenchuk, Dnepropetrovsk and Melitopol, bringing about a possible drive into the Crimea.

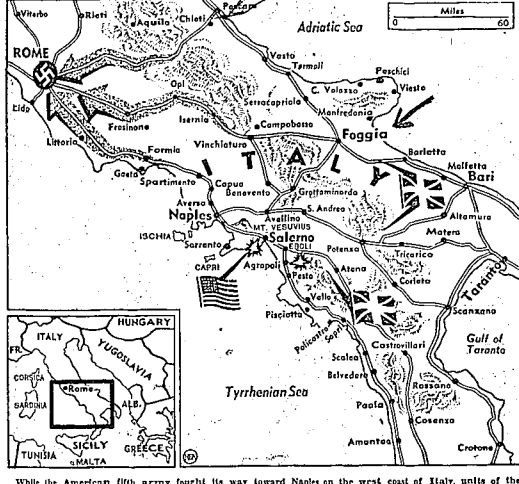

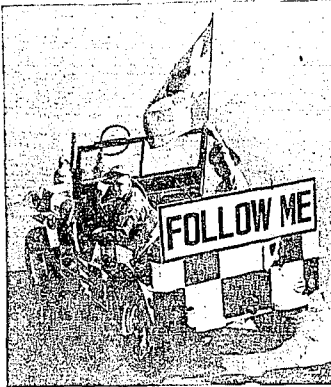

# CITY WILL FIGHT ELM TREE PEST

Cooperation of the city in fighting the elm leaf beetle was requested by the city council Monday night, after G. Claude Stewart, parks superintendent, had reported the first known appearance in Twin Falls of what is said to be one of the most voracious insect pests of the elm.

Stewart told the council that the beetle had been discovered in cork elm trees on the property of Edward Cooper and L. E. Beckwith, ridge in the 20 Block of Seventh avenue north. These trees, he said, had been cut with insecticide, but the specific treatment for the insect for this time of year.

"It is possible that this infestation was still localized when introduced," said Stewart, "and it may not spread further. However, unless some elm trees on his property should examine them for the beetle, and notify the city if it is found."

City Will Spray

The council agreed that it was to the interests of the city as a whole to more quickly for control of the pest, and agreed that the city should spray trees in which the beetle is discovered this fall. In the spring, when the eggs and larvae of the beetle are in the higher parts of the tree the city spray equipment is unable to reach them.

The adult elm leaf beetle are about one-fourth of an inch long, yellow in color when newly emerged, but they later become a dull yellow olive-green. They have a dark color or black line on the outside of each wing cover, and black spots on the head. The eggs are yellow, elongated or bottle-shaped, and are attached to the underside of the leaf. They are laid in clusters or masses of two or three rows, with 29 or 30 eggs to the mass.

Feeds on Leaves

The elm leaf beetle feeds voraciously on the leaves of the elm tree, reports a pamphlet on the beetle issued by the University of Idaho extension department. When numerous they destroy the foliage in a few weeks, and such injury reported will kill a larger shade tree in two or three years. The larvae feed on the underside of the leaf until nothing remains but the lace-like skeleton.

The most effective control for the pest is a foliar spray of DDT acetate.

The first appearance of the beetle in Idaho was at Lewiston in 1917. It was found in southern Idaho when it began damaging elms at Nepesin in 1931, and was discovered at Gooding in 1935. It has been known to travel long distances in human cars which had been parked under infested elms.

# RAIL PAY BOOST APPROVED BY FDR

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (AP)—The White House disclosed today that a railroad emergency board had recommended a wage increase of at least four cents an hour for 70,000 operating employees of the nation's rail carriers.

The board reported to President Roosevelt these workers were entitled to that much under the little steel formula and implied it would have recommended a higher figure if he had left the government would approve.

The report was submitted on a 2 to 1 vote, the minority number dissenting sharply because it favored a more substantial increase, amounting to 7 1/2 per cent.

The 4 cents an hour proposed by the majority amounts to 4 1/2 per cent of the average hourly earnings, 89 1/2 cents, paid on January 1, 1941, which is the base date for the little steel formula.

The first operating brotherhoods had asked an increase of 30 per cent, or \$2 a day, which never would be higher. Unless set aside within 30 days by the economic stabilization director or rejected by the employees, the increase would be made effective as of April 1, 1942.

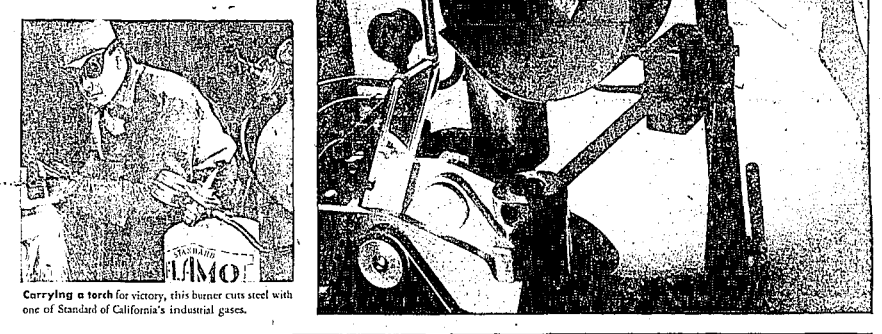

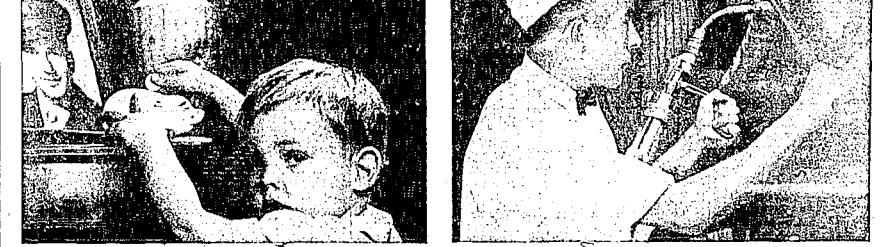

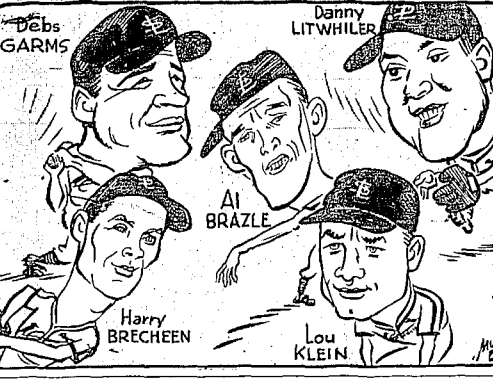

### SUBSTITUTE FOR JAP AGAR FOUND

MADISON, Wis., Sept. 21 (AP)—Wayne Umsted, assistant professor of agricultural bacteriology at the University of Wisconsin, has found a new way of beating the Japs on the home front.

By doing so he also has enabled the university to continue supplying farmers with the bacterial root-nodule cultures which clover, alfalfa and other legumes need most have if they are to utilize efficiently the "free" nitrogen in the air, the department announced today. Prof. Umsted has developed a substitute for Japanese agar, a gelatinous substance used in bacteriology as a solidifying agent in culture media. Impacts of agar, upon which bacteriologists had been dependent for many years, were cut off by the war.

After failing to find a substitute among several American-made materials, Prof. Umsted made an excellent bacterial jelly from carboxymethyl cellulose. Agar and carboxymethyl cellulose are both produced in the country from seaweeds. Prof. Umsted noted, however, before Pearl Harbor, the Japanese took the raw material from the Pacific coast of the California coast, shipped it to Japan and processed it at a cost with which American manufacturers were unable to compete.

Tests showed that root-nodule bacteria grow just as well on media containing carboxymethyl cellulose as on those made up with agar and contain just as much nitrogen.

Prof. Umsted reported the new substance proved satisfactory when put into use by thousands of Wisconsin farmers this year.

### City Ponders Tax Bill for Weed Cutting

Charges for weed removal may show up as an important part of the tax bill against certain Twin Falls city property next year, it was indicated at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

Councilman Lloyd I. Perry, acting as mayor in Mayor Fred A. Hargreaves' absence, said weeds were still uncut on quite a few lots over the city. The council considered the question of having the weeds cut and mowing the cost assessed against the property, as it was said would be done in order to property owners several months ago.

No More Available  
City Clerk Gloria E. Larsen, who is also water department superintendent, said the city has no cut the weeds on the lots in question because no mowing machine is available at this time, and the city has elected to have the work cut by hand, because of the greater cost. It was pointed out that most of the lots with weeds still standing are the property of non-resident owners.

The council indicated that the weeds might be left uncut until after frost, and then be burned off by the fire department.

The council granted permission for three property owners to tap the private water main extending a half-mile north of Five avenue on Blue Leake boulevard after approval had been given by two members of the three-man board representing the owners of the line.

Those receiving permits were Ross French, Roy G. Kirk and E. L. Molan.

Ons Refused O. K.  
Permits of the owners was given by H. R. Grant and George Bullock, two of the members of the three-man committee, but not by Asher Wilson, the other member, whose objection to further tapping of the line brought a delegation, headed by Grant to a recent meeting of the council.

City Engineer John E. Hayes told the council that checking the plans for the Shoshone street bridge shows that it will not satisfy appropriate concrete floor, which will be one of the possible floor repair moneys under consideration. He said it was possible that a steel web over the existing planks, after they had been checked down with steel strips, might be the economical way to repair the floor.

A building permit was approved for the construction of an elevator by the Landtrock food company at a cost of \$5,750.

### OPA to Require Farmers' Report

Farmers are reminded by Carl N. Anderson, chief clerk of the Twin Falls county sales board, that they must be sure to fill out the required forms for reporting of all sale and transfer of rationed foods, showing the collection of ration stamps.

The warning rationing laws require that persons who sell or transfer rationed foods must collect ration stamps or other ration currency," said Anderson. "The proper form (No. 1020) must be filled out by all farmers who have sold or transferred any meat, lard, butter or cheese in any reporting period."

Anderson said he thought carelessness and possibly lack of information practically responsible for most reported cases of failure to comply with this provision of the rationing regulations.

"However," he declared, "this is an important part of the program, and vital to success of the entire plan."

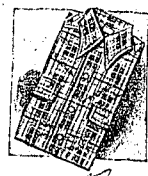

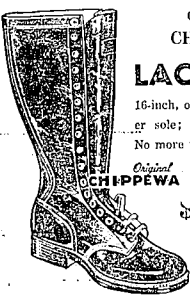
