## FTC Approves Tax Levy of 15 Billions

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP)—The administration today formally proposed a tax program that would yield the treasury \$15,860,000,000 in new revenue.

In a statement endorsed by President Roosevelt, Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., proposed that \$10,650,000,000 be raised by severely increased individual and corporation income taxes and gift and levies and hikes in a long list of excise levies.

Some of the increased individual income taxes would be refunded after the war under either of two proposed alternative plans.

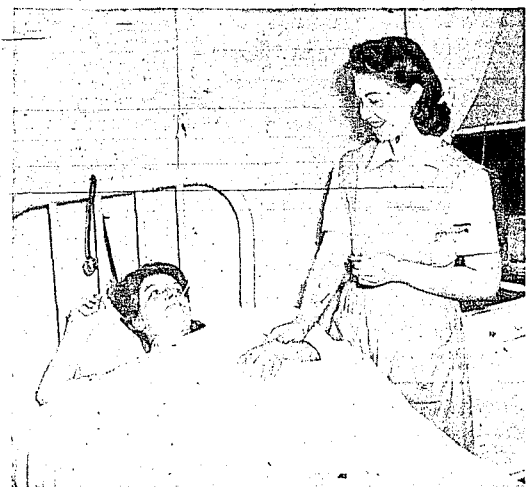

### CARE OF YOUR CHILDREN

By ANGELO PATRI

A child's age is a rough measurement of standard achievement in schoolwork. His age and his grade give one a fair idea of his ability to master the course of study, and also a fairly accurate judgment of his ability to do what the children of his age are doing. Some children do not measure up to this standard and suffer humiliation, and the age are doing. This suffering is needless and requires only understanding of the child's development, his rate of growth, his abilities for complete adjustment.

During the first term in school some children do not learn to read. They are not ripe for reading yet. They sit and listen and hope and wait, and sometimes in a year, after they have expected to read, they begin. The same thing happens in other fields of study and learning. Until the child is ripe to do the work he is doing, he cannot do it, and no amount of practice and prodding will make him do it. He could be helped in time he usually does, provided his desire to do the work is not destroyed by mistaken efforts.

It is a mistake idea, for example, that leaves him back at term after the other children are promoted. When a child is left back the sufferer's emotional shock that affects his growth. This shock is resistant when the child is called him "dumbbell," and shove him aside. He goes backward socially, mentally and physically. Nothing more harmful to the child of delayed development can befall him than being left back.

Some teachers think that promotion is a reward for the rapturized workers, and being left back is a just penalty for the child's ability set back. # JOHN STEINBECK

## CABLES FROM LONDON

"I HAVE SEEN the soldiers come down from the ships and stand in long lines on the docks, their 'B' bags beside them and their packs on their backs and their rifles slung over their shoulders. They have come to a new country and it is strange to them. They are puzzled and although only a little time from home, they are homesick.

"I have seen the supplies come in by the hundred shiploads, locomotives and tanks and trucks—acres of boxed food and great mounds of hams, shiploads of bombs stacked in from keel to hatch and all materials that we need at home—steel for bridges and buildings, food for our own people, material enough to make all America well fed and well housed and well clothed. And all this dumped on the docks of a foreign country.

"I have seen American railroad men shunting cars on the British line, men who got good pay on the B. & O. and on the New York Central and now with Sergeant's stripes and Sergeant's pay.

"I have seen the men climb into the Fortress in the

early morning and fly away waving with elaborate nonchalance and I have seen the gap in the mess when they did not come back and the empty bunks, the blankets thrown aside as they threw them, and the framed photographs on the steel lockers.

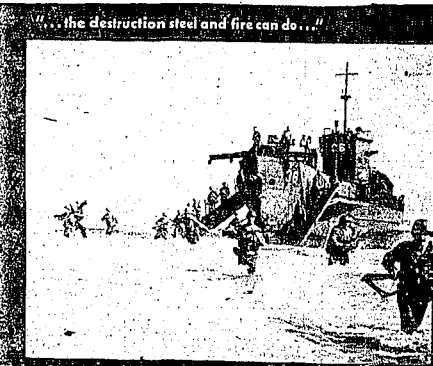
"The men have gone up the gangways again to go into action and they jump from landing barges to a beach, strewn with the bodies of their own people, and they claw their way like animals into a hostile coast.

"I have seen the hospitals with the mangled men, the legless and blind, the fingerless hands and the burned faces—all the destruction that steel and fire can do to a man's body and mind. I have seen children hauled out of a blasted building; lumps of crushed, dirty meat in pinafores, and dead—boxed and buried carrion. In God's name, what is it for except to get this horrible thing over with as quickly and as thoroughly as possible? And if this is true, it should not be a matter of 'Who will lead his money?' but 'Who dares not to?'"
