 under cover of night through a muddy stream. They erected pontoon bridges and built a massive barricade of sandbags and barbed wire. Soviet forces then advanced across the Don and Dnieper rivers. Before crossing the Dnieper, the Russians trapped a large German force on the east bank, and the survivors perished in the ice.

Red Star attributed the success to their first crossings to the swift destruction of the last Germans on the east bank of the river and their capture of the stock where the Germans had expected a crossing. Other Soviet armies to the north advanced through Niev, 60 miles east of the Latvian border, on a 10-mile front and captured 1,000 miles southeast of Leningrad, in three drives apparently designed to meet at the north before Leningrad and liberate the Baltic states.

Still another Russian force was mopping up the last remnants of the German army in the western end of the Tannu peninsula, and capturing 1,000 miles of the liquidation of the Nazi bridgehead in the northwest Caucasus.

FINES, ALL GIVEN ON LIQUOR CLAIM

Emil Gunderjohn, 41, Idaho Falls beer distributor, and Donald P. Feder, 21, Idaho Falls beer party proprietor, were fined \$500 each and sentenced to serve three months in the county jail by Probate Judge G. A. Bailey, after they had pleaded guilty to a charge of unlawful possession and transportation of liquor. The two men are now at liberty on \$500 bonds after their arraignment. Wednesday, and Judge Bailey said they would begin serving their sentences early next week.

Sheriff Lowery said this was the first illegal liquor to be confiscated and stored in this room for at least the last 10 years—the period since the repeal of prohibition—and that the room still had been closed by a quantity of the hooch of that day, including home brew.

Sheriff Lowery said he was aware of the possibility that the "whisky room" might again come into more general use, with a liquor shortage now making bootlegging attractive to certain individuals and the prospect of higher liquor taxes possibly acting to increase such traffic.
