10 BILLION WORLD BANK PLAN ASKED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—The United States today proposed establishment of a world bank with \$10,000,000,000 in capital to be used in the development of war and developing the world's resources in the future.

Dr. Harry D. White, director of the treasury division of monetary research and author of the world currency stabilization plan proposed by this country, announced the proposal at a press conference. He indicated it would be sent for approval to members of the United Nations at the immediate future. It was presented to six congressional committees in executive session late Tuesday.

To include Long Term Loans
The chief purpose of the bank would be to encourage private financial concerns in the various countries to provide long-term capital for the sound development of the productive resources of member countries. Loans would be restricted to reconstruction rather than rehabilitation. They would be made by the bank itself, or by the banks in conjunction with private agencies. Loans made by private capital also would be guaranteed.

White would not estimate the amount of the United States in the suggested \$10,000,000,000 capital. He said it would not run to 50 per cent of the total. The chief purpose would be to prevent an overlapping of loans by private agencies such as the many nations to borrow more than they could pay after the war.

To Be Guaranteed
All loans made by the bank or by private capital under its authority would have to be guaranteed by the government of the nation to which they are made.

Control of the bank would be exercised by a board of directors composed of one director from each member country. Voting power of each country would be proportional to its share of the bank's capital. Upon establishment of the bank, 20 per cent of its capital, or \$2,000,000,000, would be paid in advance. The bank would call in an additional \$8,000,000,000 as needed, but not ask for more than \$2,000,000,000 in any one year.

First Navy Secretary's Kin Will Recruit WAVES Here

Ensign Lucia Brown, direct descendant of the nation's first secretary of the navy, will be in Twin Falls Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 13-14, to recruit young women interested in enlisting in the WAVES. It was announced last night by Specialist C. A. Severin, in charge of the local navy recruiting station.

The great-great-great-granddaughter of Benjamin Franklin who was appointed the first secretary of the navy in 1775, Ensign Brown has been in the WAVES since last spring. Now at Base recruiting headquarters, she was on duty at Portland interviewing and enlisting WAVE applicants before coming to southern Idaho.

Ensign Brown is a native of Spring Hill, Tenn., near Nashville. She was a feature writer and reporter on Tennessee newspapers and worked with the public relations section of the U. S. department of agriculture in Washington, D. C., before joining the WAVES.

While in Twin Falls, Ensign Brown will make her headquarters at the navy recruiting station below the Fidelity National bank. Personal interviews will be granted without obligation.

Interested applicants who meet WAVE physical qualifications will be sent at navy expense to Boise for aptitude tests, physical examination and final enrollment at the new branch office of naval officer procurement, Severin said.

JAPAN-PORTUGAL BREAK IMMINENT

MADRID, Oct. 9 (AP)—Reliable sources today said that Japanese-Portuguese relations have become severely strained and an unexpected upset reaction could result. The Japanese legation in Lisbon has begun burning secret papers.

Speculation grew in Madrid that Portugal is on the point of severing diplomatic relations with Japan, which is declaring war on Japan or entering into a defensive alliance with it.

Portugal was said to be demanding that Japan immediately withdraw troops from the Portuguese island of Timor located one of the Japanese stronghold of northern Australia, and ease pressure against Macao Island, in the south Chinese near Hong Kong.

Portuguese Premier Dr. Antonio de Oliveira Salazar and justice minister Mario Morshlims were understood to have exchanged angry, persistent words during a two-hour conference Thursday and to have parted without shaking hands.

There was no further news of the special session of the Portuguese national parliament, which was to have been held to hear an important government statement.

A Lisbon dispatch denied that any parliament meeting had been held and described the report as an episode of civilians from Lisbon as exaggerated. Authoritative circles in Lisbon were quoted as expressing confidence that Portugal would continue at peace. The dispatch acknowledged great public curiosity, however, over the movement of military trucks and troops officially described as part of the military maneuvers now under way.

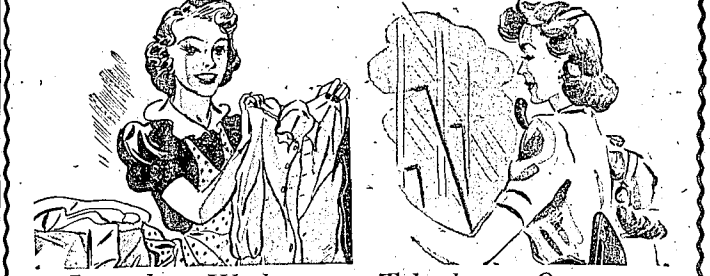

SENATE PROBE OF LEND-LEASE SEEN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—A congressional scrutiny of lend-lease operations to assure protection of American interests may be one of the first tangible results of a world tour by five senators.

This likelihood arose after an executive senate session at which a statement by one of the five travelers that use of Russian Pacific bases could save 1,000,000 American tons was sharply contradicted by others in the related group.

Those who differed with the high figure mentioned by Sen. Henry Woodruff, R., Idaho, reported they held no such estimate by high military officials. Lodge, was not present.

Both Democratic and Republican senators discussed a bill to check on lend-lease after hearing members of the committee and report that operations to date appear to have been far from keeping American interests foremost.

Sharp Criticism
However, a sharp critique developed in sentiment on post-war foreign policy.

One veteran senator said "some very divergent sentiments" were expressed at the closed session.

Sen. Ralph O. Brewster, R., Me., one of the "right trotters," told press conference afterward that he thought "we should talk it out now rather than delay the resolution of differences."

Reasons for scrutiny
Senators who were asked about the reasons proffered their names were not disclosed, however, said that the demand for a closer scrutiny of lend-lease arose from reports by the traveling committee that:

1. The British are permitted to remove American tanks from lend-lease supplies, replace them with their own, and then sell them to the United States.

2. Lend-lease allotted 20,000 American-made trucks for civilian use in Australia in one year during which only 1,000 trucks had been allocated for civilian use in the United States.

3. Lend-lease purchases nickel in Canada and turn it back to the allied war effort, although it is mined in a Free French possession in the south Pacific, sold to private interests in Australia and resold to private interests in Canada. The U. S. purchase price includes profits for each handler as well as a 17 per cent export tax by the United States under which it is mined.

4. Lend-lease supplies to some areas include items which they could well contribute to the war effort themselves. Petroleum products supplied to Great Britain was cited as one example.

5. Recent lend-lease falls far short of the amount the United States is committing and short of the ability of some allies to contribute themselves to the allied war effort.

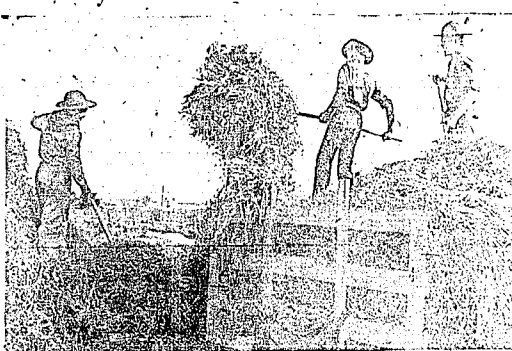

Snake River Area Scouts Aid In Five Varied War Services

Acting as official dispatching headquarters for the OWI, collecting in 1942 over 250 tons of scrap metal, distributing 30,000 OPA leaflets, collecting 200 odd tons of waste paper and working an estimated 520,000 hours on farms in southern Idaho this summer, the Boy Scouts of the Snake River area council are participating in at least five war services.

Ray Halmforth, Scout executive in southern Idaho, said that the services rendered by the work done on farms this year:

1. The national office Scout executive, Dr. Elliott K. Fretwell, provided the chief of war production that the Boy Scouts of America would furnish a hundred million Scout-hours of agricultural labor during the year 1943.

"In a preliminary survey and estimate of the hours put in by Scouts of the Snake River area council, we estimated that about 50 per cent of our membership as employees either part or whole time this year have 1,200 Scouts, that would be 1,940."

"Each worked 10 hours per week, five days per week, they would have 1,940,000 hours."

The county's goal was \$559,000, and total bond proceeds amounted to \$641,725.00.

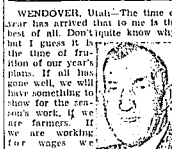

VATICAN EXPECTS SACKING OF DOME

By ALDO BONTE
ROME, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Promoter reports indicated today that the Vatican is preparing for a German sack of Rome following the flight of Mussolini's puppet government.

The first Italian agency "Justice and Liberty" reported rumors have been circulating in Italy that Benito Mussolini is dead and that his body has been taken to Germany. A German newspaper also reported rumors from the fact that the pope in his only public appearance since Sept. 27 had nothing in common with that of the former duke. While supposed pictures of him were so blurred identity was unrecognizable. With menacing silence came within 100 miles, the hurried evacuation of the fascist leaders was thought to have struck fear in the Vatican that the city was being turned to their military defenses.

Building Wives Reserve information, according to a source, said the papal authorities have begun construction of a water reservoir to insure a water supply in the event that the German command will take the Vatican as dependent upon the power lines inside Vatican City. Frank Knox, returning from a tour of the Mediterranean basin, said in Puerto Rico that he believed the Germans would turn Rome into a museum as they prepared to leave. The situation within Rome was said to be increasingly tense because of the long-standing Italian hatred of the Nazis increased by the critical position in the capital.

Holding Nazis Responsible
The Romans are holding the German troops responsible for the failure to obtain food. For example, milk, which usually reached Rome from the north, is now in short supply because of the shortage of rolling stock and the fact that the roads are jammed with German military traffic.

Trade Rome, all bus and street car lines were said to have been halted, and almost all the stores in the city are closed.

The frontier reports indicated that Mussolini's new seat of government will be Florence or Bologna.

Bologna was believed the more likely choice, since Florence probably would be some time before the fall of Rome. Some reports said the Italians plan to declare Florence an open city, as they did Rome.

Germans Turned Naples Into Starving, Death-Ridden City

WITH THE AMERICAN FIFTH ARMY IN NAPLES, Oct. 3 (AP)—Naples is a city with its hand out.

It is a bigger city of almost a million people without water and without food, except scraps, for a week. They have been hungry so long they have forgotten they are hungry too.

The city is perhaps the largest that has been completely and utterly paralyzed. In the days when the Neapolitans were still in the hands of the Germans, the German soldiers worked areas on the stock and warehouse areas.

Then when Italy capitulated, the Germans laid their plans to bring Naples to life once again, exacting vengeance from the men, women and children there to save their own wounded vanity. With bombs and shells they systematically destroyed all remaining communication systems, blew up power feeder plants and smashed what remained of the water supply system. There were no lights.

Civil war broke out when they tried to draft 30,000 young Italians for forced labor in north Italy and the rebels. For seven days machine guns and rifle fire swept the streets and the noise of capitulating grenades.
