YWCA Program Shows Varied War Help, Civic Cooperation

Outstanding war service projects of the Y. W. C. A., senior and junior Christian organizations for young women, include war bond and stamp sales, silk and nylon stocking drives, assistance with the rationing program and work at the Red Cross surgical dressings headquarters.

Enumerating other services performed, Mrs. H. L. Rice, Twin Falls secretary, explained how the organization cooperated with other agencies, both public and private, by recently establishing public rest and waiting rooms for the community.

"We also gathered 144,000 red crosses for the Red Cross, made Red Cross bed side bags, fracture pillows, USO booklets, USO packets and helped in the potato drive."

Today the Y. W. C. A. of Twin Falls emphasizes the growth and ability and understanding between two parts of the same job—between the historically steady, ongoing backing Y. W. C. A., and a new emergency program.

As one of the six agencies making up the national United Service Organization, the Y. W. C. A. is one of the agencies for which the Community Chest campaign is being held. This young women's Christian group will be allotted 12 1/2 per cent of the Chest funds here.

Of the 263 girls registered in the Twin Falls Y. W. C. A., four general groups are represented, including a young matrons group, the business and industrial girls and senior and junior high school groups.

Representing a cross section of young women and girls in the community, their personal goals are to help each other grow individually in interests, ideals, skills and abilities, and to help themselves as individuals and as a group to assume responsibility for "building a local and world community in line with Christian purpose."

SPEEDING BRINGS TAXIGAB WARNING

Twin Falls taxigab companies were threatened with revocation of their licenses in a "blast" by Commissioner W. W. Thomas, police commissioner, at Monday night's meeting of the city council, when he delivered a blanket indictment of permit company managers for permitting "reckless" and "high speed" driving.

"If cab companies continue to let drivers drive recklessly and at high speed, as they have been doing," he declared, "I am going to recommend that their licenses be revoked."

Thomas said police records show that there have been nine accidents involving taxigabs in the last two months. That, he said, is for the city alone, and there have been others outside the city.

"The accidents have been well distributed among the three companies," Thomas said, "and also among the respective drivers. There is only one driver whose license is on this list of accidents."

The council, generally acquiescent-sentiment was expressed by Councilman Truman T. Greenhalgh.

"The cab companies have been warned time and time again, and it doesn't seem to do any good."

Speed of Nazi Seizure Made Defense of Rome Impossible

SOUTHERN ITALY, Oct. 12 (AP)—Italian military leaders had planned to lend the people of Rome in a last-ditch defense of the city against the Germans, but were thwarted by the speed of the Nazi occupation, an escaped Roman disclosed today.

For a few hours, he revealed, the Romans held faint hope of holding the city, but the Germans moved in before any adequate defenses could be organized and took over after only a minor skirmish.

Following the announcement of the Italian armistice on Sept. 8 and the subsequent flight of the Badoglio government, he said, a group of military officers appeared to Marshal Enrico Cavigliari to organize for a stand against the Germans. Cavigliari suggested that the people themselves should be armed, and during the evening of Sept. 8 about 600 rifles were distributed.

"That night Romans heard heavy gunfire. Fighting was in progress at San Paolo and Cerechi Hill, with Italian troops in retreat before a combined force of Germans and fascist blackshirt units.

The various ministries burned their documents, and on the following morning, posters appeared over the city announcing that Cavigliari and later commandant general officer in Rome said was attempting to organize a defense.

At 3 p. m. it was announced that negotiation between Cavigliari and the Germans had been broken off, the Italian troops raced across the Piazza Venezia to take up defensive positions. Officers returning to the city from the fighting in the suburbs reported that the Nazis had broken through their lines at several points.

Fighting broke out at the railroad station inside the city and the Germans quickly overran the Italian positions. At 3 p. m. the Rome radio informed the people that a truce had been arranged and Gen. Count Ciano di Bergolio had taken over the "open city of Rome."

The truce provided that the Ger-

mans were to remain in the outskirts and occupy only the radio station, the German embassy and the telephone building in Rome proper. The following morning the city was swarming with Nazi troops and armored cars.

Orders were issued to all civilians to surrender their arms. Soldiers constituted shooting at passing Germans throughout Sept. 11 and 12, whereby the press announced that all soldiers or organizers of any kind of public disturbances such as strikes would be shot.

The Germans then broadcast an appeal to Italian soldiers to join them against "the British and Badoglio and his traitors," while the blackshirts paraded the streets in an effort to persuade the regular troops to cooperate.

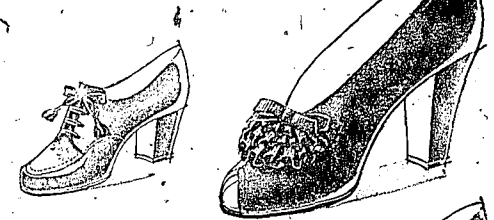

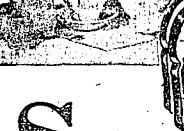

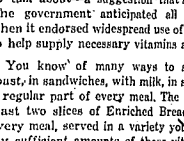

SAMOS HOME OF NOTED SCHOLAR

A single word can carry an unusual significance. Late September we read of the occupation by the allied forces of the island of Samos. To many, this is merely one of the "thousand tales" which dot the histories of ancient Greece. Readers of astronomical history will find almost beyond the horizon of the scholar's knowledge the name of Samos. This distinguished Greek, often called the Copernicus of antiquity, was born about 310 B. C. Modern times surely have no man who has been keener intellect and wills that dare to more against current opinions.

First to Freisian Solar System Aristarchus of Samos is generally acknowledged as the first to teach that the earth makes an annual trip around the sun. He believed that much of the phenomena which required intricate diagrams to explain would become very simple if it were assumed that the earth had an orbital motion. He also taught that the moon's diameter was larger than had previously been thought.

Other learned Greeks before him had decided that the earth was spherical and made daily rotation on its axis. But still, they were sure that the earth was the center of the entire universe and that heavenly bodies, including our mighty sun, had been designed to revolve around it.

Opposition Arose
Aristarchus' theory was regarded as heretical. He was accused of gross impiety. His author was determined to complete the work of those who a few centuries ago revived the idea. Other noted Greeks who later appeared on the scene pronounced the theory untenable.

For almost 2,000 years the world has tumbled, the earth remained the center of the universe in scientific opinion. Just 100 years ago Copernicus advocated the sun-center doctrine. It faced better odds than Copernicus' theory. Galileo, Kepler and Newton strongly championed it. Today it is universally held.

It was all very humbling for those who had held the earth so important to find it relegated to a minor role in the great universe.

Dr. C. R. Smith, of the Griffith observatory has recently stated there is nothing so gigantic as humility.

KNOX SAYS SUBS SERIOUS MENACE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (AP)—But a few days ago the director of European battleships, Secretary Knox expressed his apprehensions that the German submarines in the North Atlantic can be considered a serious menace.

Questioned as to his confidence about the appearance of the U-boats after the late summer lull, he retorted by a recent attack on an allied convoy in the western Atlantic near Knox, said.

On the other hand, Knox predicted that the British submarines which have been operating in the Atlantic since the German battleship Tirpitz operated 1,000 miles from home with two mines.

The submarines slipped through minefields and made their way to nets to launch their torpedoes against the mighty mad battleship in a Norwegian harbor.

Knox said the attack on the principle was called out while he was in England and was "characterized by a high spirit of initiative and courage that is amazing."

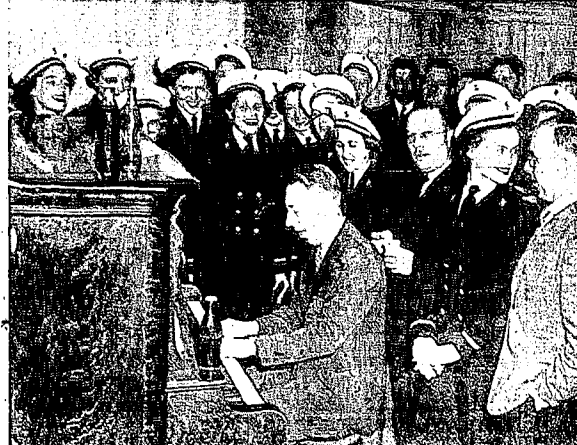
Knox added: "Speaking for the American navy, I think to express the highest appreciation of the courage shown by the British sailors who carried out this attack."

NAZI AIR FORCE SHRINKING FAST

LONDON, Oct. 12 (AP)—The Nazis' airplane rocket guns which have been firing at the British bombers, were invented too late to help the German air force, it appeared Monday.

On the basis of official claims, the Germans lost at least 300 fighters in air battles during the six-day allied offensive ended yesterday.

The losses, however, have not convinced the Germans that they need to pull out of the air war. The two main German fighters are the Focke-Wulf-109 and the Messerschmitt-109.

In August and October formations from the middle east and north-west Africa blasted the factory complex at Wernau-Neustadt, south of Vienna, while British-based American leaves hit the plant at Regensburg in southeast Germany, which has been said to produce possibly 75 per cent of all German airplane propellers.

Next to van came the Focke-Wulf assembly plants last week-end. Aerial reconnaissance already has shown vast destruction at the Wernau-Neustadt plant, it is estimated. Half of the Focke-Wulf staff plant at Aachen also suffered serious damage.

The plant turning out fighters at Hamburg, Berlin, Bremen, Berlin and Moscow also have been pounded.

An indication of the German plane shortage was seen recently in stories of American airmen that the German fighters were "stuck where they are," indicating they were out of the old Stuka dive-bombers.

Regardless of the number of planes, it appears the German air force has been reduced to a few fighters from an offensive force of 2,000 planes, it is estimated.

WAR RISKY FOR GENERALS, TOO
WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (AP)—Modern warfare has little respect for rank and position, and the generals and flag officers of the army and navy has shown.

It used to be said that generals died in bed and admirals passed away in their swivel chairs. But in this war, the safety factor has been greatly reduced for those in top command.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (AP)—The state department has released a mass of evidence dealing with this country's efforts to avert war in the tense decade between Japan's blundering attack on Shanghai in 1937 and the Pearl Harbor raid ten years later.
