Clark Launches New Offensive Which Cracks Nazi Volturvo Line

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Algiers, Oct. 14 (AP)—British and American troops of the fifth army cracked the strong German lines along the Volturvo river in a fierce night attack early yesterday and have established several armor-reinforced bridgeheads across that most formidable obstacle in the path to Rome, allied headquarters announced today.

Gen. Clark struck at a time to take advantage of stormy weather when the enemy's armor was virtually impassable because of high winds.

But the Germans had rushed fresh contingents south from the home area in recent days and an expected attack, as do the British and Americans, showed they were up the steep banks fierce fighting paraged up and down the north side of the stream.

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U. S. Bombers Resume Nazi Air Assaults

LONDON, Oct. 14 (AP)—Four-motor bombers of the eighth United States air force resumed the offensive today against the heavily defended German air bases in the Ruhr valley, penetrating deep into central Germany to attack targets not identified yesterday.

American Thunderbolt fighters supported the heavy bombers of the first major operation of the eighth air force since the bombardment of Münster and Coesfeld by Flying Fortresses Sunday.

Reports of the attack suggested the target of the raid might approach that of a raid last Saturday which took American and Portuguese to northeast Germany and Poland.

The general of the allied offensive against the continent followed reports of a big influx of American bombers, highlighting the fact that unprecedented aerial operations were being conducted.

Speculation was fanned by hints that the raid would be named after British forces here. Beginning today a similar but less important offensive will be named after the British and American forces in the Ruhr valley, and during the night the allied conducted a large-scale operation against the French channel coast.

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Reds to Demand 2nd Front Plan

LONDON, Oct. 14 (AP)—The Russians today were expected to submit plans to the approaching tripartite conference for a final and integrated allied offensive—designed to bring the German defeat before the winter snows melt in Europe.

Russian emphasis on the military phase of the Moscow conference was foreshadowed clearly by a statement in Pravda, official communist newspaper, organ, declaring suggestions the conference should be largely political issues such as postwar frontier questions.

Former Enemies of Italy Skeptical of Help in War

LONDON, Oct. 14 (AP)—Italy's former mistreated women and strongly alive today after the British government's declaration of war against Germany.

SOLOON DECLARES DEBT U. S. ASSET

DISCOVERIES TO REMOVE TYPHUS

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—American medical discoverers which unite to wipe out typhus fever among American forces all over the world were described by the American Public Health Association.

The typhus fever is the largest killer of all previous large-scale wars throughout the United States. The American discoverers, which range from penicillin to vaccines, probably would end typhus in all countries, provided they were used.

The typhus mites were described by Gen. James H. Dillmore, director of the army's preventive medicine division. He has just returned from a four-month visit of war theaters. There have been to date, he said, only three typhus epidemics among American troops.

Body lice are the carriers of typhus. The Americans have discovered that metal bromide is a natural killer of both lice and typhus. In clothing, Strain chambers that to be used in world wars.

The military forces also have the Cox vaccine, developed by this office of the public health service. Tried in mid zones in the Orient, it did not prevent typhus, but none of the vaccinated men died. Now the army has a more concentrated form of this vaccine, under trial in the Philippines.

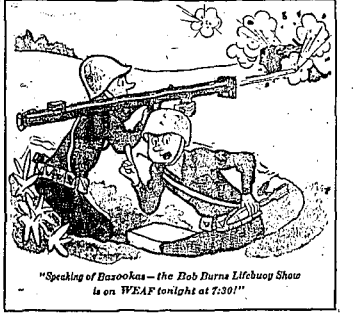

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—Louis B. Mayer, movie producer, drew the biggest pay check—\$949,765—reported to the treasury for the calendar year 1941 or fiscal year ending in 1942.

The motion picture industry, as usual, furnished the lion's share of the personal service income above \$15,000 shown in corporation income tax returns.

The list of such incomes, made public by Secretary Morgenthau as required by law, included 923 names, 215 of them movie figures. Loew's, Inc., paid Mayer \$107,000 salary and \$752,255.64 in commissions for the fiscal year ended Aug. 31, 1942.

Newcomer Second place went to big-money newscaster, C. G. Scahill, president of the Dixieland corporation, Houghton, Conn. The management and engineering service firm paid him \$51,500.16 salary for the year ending Nov. 30, 1941, and \$49,145.11 for the next fiscal year.

Scahill is also vice-president of the war-expanded High Standard Manufacturing corporation which he organized in 1925 to produce pistols, small tools, and similar articles.

E. G. Grace, president of Bethlehem Steel company, was third with an income of \$37,724.43. He was later for comedian Bud Abbott and Lou Costello. Jointly they received a \$24,458.21 salary and \$32,264.33 other compensation from Universal Pictures for the fiscal year ending last Oct. 31.

Largest individual salaries listed for film stars included the \$300,000 paid Jeanette Mac Donald and Bing Crosby by Loew's and Paramount, respectively; Gary Cooper's \$297,174.84 from Summit children and Bob Hope's \$244,510.17 from Paramount.

Others received larger aggregate amounts, however, notably Charles Colbert's \$100,000 from Paramount and 20th Century-Fox; Director Rogers' \$155,000 from RKO; Healy and 20th Century; Gary Gray's \$101,252.50 from Columbia; RKO and Warner brothers; and Charles Boyer's \$150,000 from Paramount, Universal and Warner. In most cases the payments covered overlapping periods embracing more than 12 months.

The clerk hesitated. "You can identify yourself?"

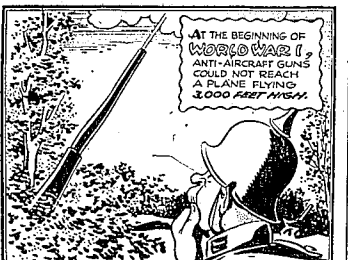
