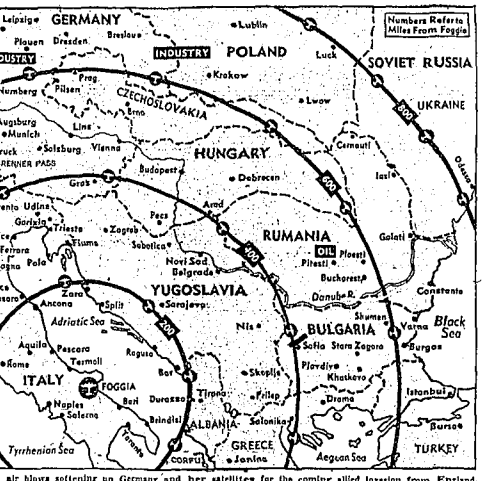

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RUBBER USED TO SPAN VOLTURNO

THE NORTH OF THE VOLTURNO RIVER, Italy, Oct. 16 (AP)—It took engineers half a rubber pontoon bridge across the Volturno river east of Cassa after hauling off four victims German counterattacks within this space of a few hours yesterday.

The engineers suffered heavy losses in penetrating the neck and the Germans finally pulled out suddenly this morning. As a result, soldiers are removing the deal from the north bank of the Volturno. Close by there is a motor ferry, imported from rubber pontoons and two cars attached. It is carrying half-tracks across.

The bridge resumed this morning, dropping soldiers already soaked from wading or swimming across the Volturno in the early stages of the attack.

Many Germans were taken prisoner as the enemy's resistance weakened and fifth army units were northward from their hard-won bridgeheads.

The Germans attempted a streak all day this morning on our articles and ferry service on the Volturno, but were "thrust off quickly by American fighters."

DEATH OF HULLDOZER WHEEL BY NOEL MONK

WITH THE FIRST ARMY ON THE VOLTURNO FRONT, Italy, Oct. 15 (AP)—I saw a German soldier die at the wheels of bulldozers cutting down a new-wood portion of the north bank of the Volturno river to clear the way for tanks.

Only a few minutes after the first bulldozer went to work, the driver was blown to pieces by a German shell.

A second man climbed into the seat a German shell blew up both him and the bulldozer.

Within a half hour, three more bulldozers and their drivers were knocked out. The last was hit just as he was about to start on a bank of earth barring the bank to tanks.

WILLKIE ATTACK PLEASING TO GOP

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)— Wendell L. Willkie's charge that proposed presidential fence-raisers free government was regarded here today as the republican party's keynote speech on the fourth term issue.

Though they may differ with Willkie on other issues, Republicans are likely to accept the argument that "long continuance of power is hazardous to the preservation of free government," Willkie made that statement last night in his St. Louis address which, as a whole, promises to win applause among Republicans.

Willkie spoke as an acknowledged candidate for next year's Republican presidential nomination and dedicated himself to ousting President Roosevelt from the White House, Republicans are for that.

Willkie contended that individuals enjoying unlimited power "inevitably come sincerely to believe that they alone possess the requisite knowledge to govern the people."

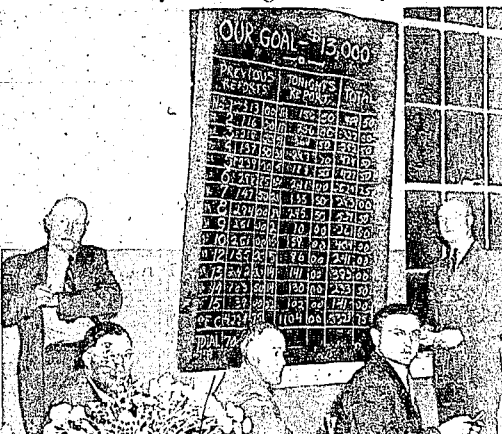
Mr. Roosevelt has not revealed his political plans for next year. There is a possibility here which believes he will not seek renomination, but most politicians believe he will be a fourth term candidate and a great many of them think he will be re-elected.

WELLES DEMANDS 4-POWER ACCORD

NEW YORK, Oct. 16 (AP)—Sumner Welles declared today in his first address since his recent resignation as under-secretary of state, that unless Britain, Russia, China and the United States arrive at a mutually agreeable, sound, hope for a stable world after the war will be "illusory."

But only should there be such a four-power agreement, Welles told the Foreign Policy Association at the Waldorf-Astoria, that the United Nations should form a permanent executive council with power to resolve such political and other questions as may be referred to it by the participating countries.

Welles said his suggestions were made "solely as one American citizen, who is not entitled in any way to speak for our government." He also recalled, at the outset of his speech, that he was speaking as a private citizen for the first time in more than 10 1/2 years.

"It seems to me that now more than ever before," Welles said, "both in the executive and legislative branches of our government, the people have not only to elect the people, but also to elect to assume leadership by urging the adoption of that policy which in his considered judgment will most fully respond to the need of our nation for security, social progress and prosperity in the post-war years in order that they may enjoy the fruits of a new age on it."

In determining its future, Welles said, the nation has "one great asset."

"In more than 100 years of our national history," he said, "there has been no President so superbly fitted to understand his constitutional responsibilities of conducting our foreign relations as Franklin Roosevelt."

10 DIE IN CRASH OF AIRLINE PLANE

CHATTERTONVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 16.—An American Airlines transport plane, its pilot apparently seeking desperately for a place to land, crashed in a deep gulch last night, killing all 40 persons aboard, witnesses told the United Press today.

The big plane was circling over the heavily forested area 15 miles north of Here, Justice of the Peace W. M. Aydelott said, and suddenly went high in the air before it crashed. Aydelott said the plane did not turn. "It was just crumpled up like you'd throw a paper bag and blow it up and bust it," the justice said, who viewed the wreckage and returned to Centerville.

Earlier reports from police had said the plane caught fire and all the occupants were burned beyond recognition.

The wrecked plane was found by John Dooten, woodworker, white on a team of mules. As he walked past the gulch he saw the transport crumpled at the bottom.

Aydelott said that several woodmen saw and heard the plane circling that night, apparently in trouble and looking for a landing place. They heard the crash, Aydelott said, but did not expect it.

"There are no telephones around here," Aydelott said, "and they just didn't report it."

"Pat" Finn, Bull Navy Hero, Modest About His Exploits

BULL, Sept. 16.—Aviation Machinery Mate Donald P. "Pat" Finn became an American citizen in May, 1929, but he has rendered more service to his adopted country than the brief period between the turn-about rescue of him and his crew from Amilia Isle.

That was the opinion of many of the friends of the 28-year-old son of E. A. Finn, Bull, after reading of his latest exploits—his rescue with 12 other members of the crew of a navy patrol bomber from the lonely, uninhabited Isle of Amilia in the central Alacutans after the bomber's crash in the waters nearby.

Enlisted in 1929

Since he enlisted in the navy on Aug. 13, 1929, to fulfill the dream that began to bud when, as a little boy, he played about the planes at airports near Jax and Redota in his native Saskatchewan, Pat Finn's experiences have been many and thrilling.

But only through the navy and the newspapers has the world learned about them. To Pat, they are mere scraps to tell.

"All that I have I read in the newspapers," he told friends and neighbors when he returned to Bull on navy leave in May, 1942.

Even then he knew one of the biggest stories of the war—the sinking in the Aleutian straits of the aircraft carrier landing to which he was attached as a member of the crew of a Catalina bomber. Neither that nor the full details of the damage wrought by the Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, which he also viewed through, could even his father coax from him.

OPA'S POLICIES RETARD FEEDING

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—The uncertainty of OPA price policies are contributing to a reduction in the movement of cattle to feed lots for winter and spring slaughter, agriculture department officials said today.

The department, in a survey of the cattle feeding situation, said price policies on beef coupled with rising prices and reduced supplies of feed, have created uncertainties in the minds of cattlemen regarding feeding operations.

OPA ceiling prices on beef have held cattle prices to about the same level as a year ago. Meanwhile, feed prices, most of which are not under ceilings, have increased an average of 23 per cent, officials said.

The movement of cattle from ranges directly to market, however, has been about the same in recent weeks as a year ago. That meat is not of the high quality of corn-fed cattle, cattlemen will be able to obtain fewer choice cuts than formerly.

The war food administration announced that starting next Monday federally licensed slaughterers must not receive higher cents of their slaughter of utility grade—the medium quality—beef for government purchase. They already were required to get 48 per cent of the better grades of beef for government purchase.

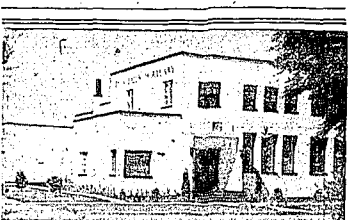




