WOUNDED FLIER DODGES 5 ZEROS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 (AP)—The story of how a Utah flier, his arm wounded, blood covering his eyes, flew his P-39 Alcoba between five attacking Japanese zeros and landed it safely was told by the war department Wednesday.

The aircraft was First Lt. Mack Bunderson of the 48th Fighter Group, based at the home of Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy Bunderson, Emery.

Exciting Bombers
Bunderson was helping escort Liberator bombers on a raid against Japanese-held Kaituma in the south Pacific. When the bombers began their run, Bunderson and other Liberator pilots were on the outside of the formation. Two zeros attacked Bunderson but failed to hit him.

Another Japanese plane made an overhead pass at the Utah flier; Bunderson pulled up sharply, firing at the enemy but he stalled before he could see if he hit the zero.

Coming out of a swing, Bunderson looked around and could not locate his wingman. But he did see a Liberator, one engine gone, that was being attacked by a zero. Bunderson went to the bomber's aid and scared away the attacker with a sharp burst.

Five Japs Attacked
Five more zeros then picked out Bunderson and drove at him one by one. Bunderson dodged them in the right foreman. Another dashed the top of his canopy. Bunderson was injured by the wound, but his plane into a shallow dive, holding his altitude with his knees. He flew straight and level flight despite damaged controls.

Bunderson's compass was knocked out. But he flew with the sun to his left in the general direction of his base. He doesn't remember how he got back—except that the Japanese planes chased him 50 miles. At the base, Bunderson made a write-up of his flight and was sent to the hospital for treatment.

Bunderson previously had downed two zeros in combat and was the distinguished flying cross and the air medal with three oak leaf clusters.

RUSSIA'S ALTERNATIVE

In an attempt to clarify what many consider the puzzle of Russia's attitude toward post-war collaboration with the other United Nations, James B. Reston, head of the New York Times' London bureau, has produced a thought-provoking piece based upon his conclusions of the various sources open to this correspondent in the British capital.

Superficially the analysis is reassuring, but throughout the article undertones. Putting these together, it appears that the highest British diplomatic thought foresees trouble with Russia—unless—

Rationing is being discontinued Oct. 31 on many items except those listed in schedules 1 and 2, including schedule 3 items, and those previously rationed which are not listed in schedules 1 and 2. Rationing will be continued on milk cans and pressure cookers to be covered by supplementary orders. All purchase certificates now being issued by county farm rationing committees will be valid only until Dec. 1, when the changeover will be made, the WPA bulletin said.

Items obtained from manufacturers on distribution of schedule 1 equipment, state boards will set tentative county quotas, which will establish the number of purchase certificates which can be issued in a county. Provision is also made for adjustment of county quotas where, for example, a dealer may receive more machinery than indicated on the distribution plan.

MEDICAL CONTROL PROGRAM RAPPED

Socialized medicine was the topic for discussion at the Lions club Wednesday when Dr. Chester Schell pointed out what he believed the consequence would be if doctors and hospitals were put under federal control.

Enumerating the clauses included in the new bill which would revolutionize the present system of social medicine and provide for federal hospitalization, Dr. Schell said:

"The bill proposes placing in the hands of one man—the surgeon general of the public health service—the power and authority to hire doctors, possibly all doctors, at fixed salaries to provide medical service to displace which doctors can be specialists, to determine the number of individuals for whom any physician may provide service, and to determine arbitrarily what hospitals or clinics may provide service for patients."

Schell declared that unless a vital way of interest were forwarded the "power, this bill might be enacted into law.

He showed that there would be "little incentive" for the doctor to become skilled in the art of medicine. His advertisement would depend upon his influence with politicians rather than on his skill or character of his work.

"The doctor's political control of medical care means incompetence, professional deterioration and the forfeiture of self-respect," he said.

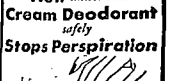

CARE OF YOUR CHILDREN

A deficiency in arithmetic brings prompt notice from the teacher. It is one of the important school disciplines, especially in the lower grades. It calls for close attention, good memory, some reasoning, perfect accuracy. Accuracy is the most important point in the matter. When the pupil says three and seven, his arithmetic is useless.

The teacher usually says, "He does not concentrate." You concentrate in another term for steady attention. The teacher is saying that his falling child does not look long and steadily at this number problem so his mind cannot get hold of it.

It is true that the child looks away from his father, away from the teacher, but his mind does not get hold of it. What is being over-looked is the fact that for some reason or other this child's mind is not open to receive the number idea.

The child who is not open to receive the number idea, that says nothing to you, does not help you and it does it for you. A child who does not see the number quality in the five and three combination is greatly retarded by his struggle to get it.

Find Why Mind is Closed
When a child fails in arithmetic, the teacher must search the child's mental condition for this particular activity. WHY does his mind say closed to three and five? Find that there is a chance to learn how to open his mind to it.

Are his eyes and ears doing their duty? Can he see the number and hear the three and five? Are his hands and feet doing their duty? Can he write the number and hold the pencil?

When you find a child who is not open to receive the number idea, you must search for the cause. It may be a physical defect, it may be a mental defect, it may be a lack of interest, it may be a lack of attention, it may be a lack of understanding.

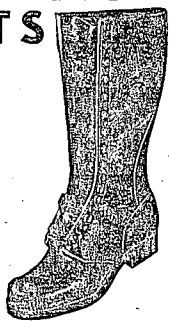
