KIWANIS OPPOSES 'SECURITY' PLANS

Taking action against senate bill 1101, a measure introduced four months ago proposing wholesale amendment to the present system of social security, Twin Falls Kiwanis has voted to notify U. S. senators and representatives of their opposing stand.

A resolution was also passed to send copies of the Twin Falls club's opinion to all other clubs in the United States district. The Kiwanis public affairs committee, which includes Judge Porter, Frank L. Buckley and A. W. Young, were instructed to act on this matter.

Business Phases

Prior to the action taken, three Kiwanis speakers discussed different phases of the bill. U. S. Terry covered the social insurance aspect; Roy Palmer the employment service; and C. A. Robinson summarized the entire discussion. Dr. J. W. Marshall had already communicated on the medical and hospitalization phase at a previous meeting.

Declaring the bill would be prohibitive, Terry said the outline of simplifying the entire program was laid down by the Wagner bill which would be increased from the present one per cent to six per cent in many cases. He said, too, he believed the U. S. had gone far enough at the present time in its social program.

Palmer, in discussing the employment service phase, said that apparently the present U. S. employment service would simply be taken over from the manpower commission under which it is now operating and be placed under the social security board without much change in activities.

Matrimonial "Grab"

In a summary of the entire discussion, Robinson pointed out the fact that bills of this nature were simply further "matrimonial measures" by which the administration sought to gain greater control of personal affairs—in direct violation of states rights and freedom of individual action.

ACE-DOWNS 12TH JAPANESE PLANE

SOMEWHERE IN NEW GUINEA, Oct. 20 (Delayed)—Capt. Neal "Thunderbolt" Kearby, Texan with twinkling blue eyes, brought down two more Japanese aircraft over Weakaw yesterday. But he and his three companions almost got caught in the wrong end of their own technique.

On the ground for Kearby now stands at 12, all bagged since Sept. 4, 1941 of them in the last nine days. 1941 was a whole new year for 41 enemy planes to their credit since they were made contact with the enemy Aug. 16.

Kearby, Capt. William Dunham, Nevers, Ind.; Capt. Fred Franklin, B. Love, Manchester, N. Y.; and Theodore S. Wood, Lansing, Mich., went to Weakaw yesterday and hung around at 8,000 feet. "We wouldn't wake on the water offshore but we couldn't see a ship. That seemed odd so we dropped down a bit to investigate. We saw a six star Japanese biplane about to take off, Kearby said.

Down they roared the four Thunderbolts and in the first run over the enemy, four of them rocketing into the water. Kearby and his partners pulled up and landed, then they went at their points, with practically all sea level, that I looked up and saw about 12 Japanese fighters waiting upstairs," Kearby resumed.

"Ordinarily, we wouldn't like nothing better than to tangle with them. But in that position they had the drop on us. There was nothing much we could do but get out from under."

So the Thunderbolt pilots roared home with the scoring reading: Kearby, two downed for a total of 12; Dunham, two downed for a total of four; Love, one, his first; and Wood, one, his first.

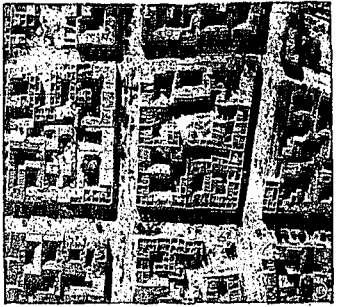

Local Sergeant Lauded for Crane Handling in Britain

HEAD QUARTERS, EUROPEAN THEATER OF OPERATIONS (Special)—The skill of Staff Sgt. Dick H. Wright, Twin Falls, 10a, in operating a heavy power crane is largely responsible for his engineer aviator battalion's reputation for speedy construction of airfields in Britain.

Large enough to accommodate a copy of the largest allied bombers, these pre-fabricated steel structures, 200 feet by 120, are being put up in two weeks by crack United States army engineer outfits like Sergeant Wright's.

Wright's specialty is crane work in assembling the mammoth steel structures requires perfect teamwork. The crane operator must be able to place an elbow joint in exactly the right spot, without a wasted motion.

There is almost an art to his unerring manipulation of the 40-foot boom of his crane, says Lieut. Arthur Tanton, Melrose Park, 11, who commands this platoon of engineer battalions.

"Back at the old station I was made ready to be evacuated from the island. I asked them to let me stay, but what was my next against the doctor? I hope I have better luck next time!"

When presenting Eddy and other marines wounded in the Solomon, the commanding general said:

"No citation is needed for the man wounded in action. His wound speaks for itself. He can wear the Purple Heart as visible evidence of his country's appreciation of his courage and devotion."
