COAST OF GUINEA BOMBED BY NAZI AIR FORCE

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Southwest Pacific, Dec. 1 (AP)—Nazi aircraft bombed the New Guinea coast at Sio as Australian troops, in pursuit of Japanese forces retreating from Huon peninsula, captured the Bonga supply center, a communique announced today.

Including in the campaign to the New Britain coast, the warships—probably destroyers—shelled Sio, 50 miles above Pincelana, twice during the night of Dec. 30 and Monday evening and Tuesday morning. The communique mentioned no enemy interferences and the attack was made with "good effect."

Protected by Flares

Dispatches received in Lisbon from the middle east today said Winston Churchill, Premier Joseph Stalin have opened a momentous conference in Teheran, Iran, and that Generalissimo and Mr. Chiang Kai-shek also were in the Iranian capital.

The Lisbon Daily Osceola published a dispatch quoting the inter-information agency of Ankara that the "big three" leaders were meeting in Teheran where they had been planning the Russian, American, U. S. ambassador to Turkey.

It gave no indication as to whether Churchill would participate. A American and other allied short-wave radio transmitters in broadcasts to the world said Churchill's meeting had conferred with Premier Churchill and Churchill in Cairo recently and suggested that he would meet Stalin.

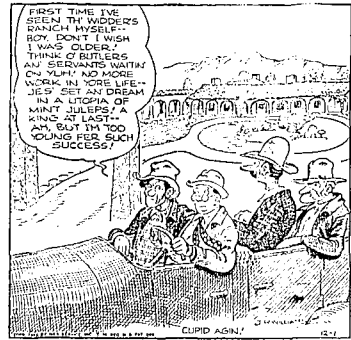

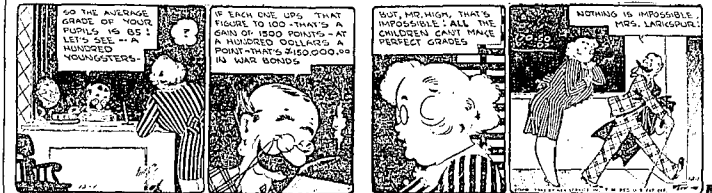

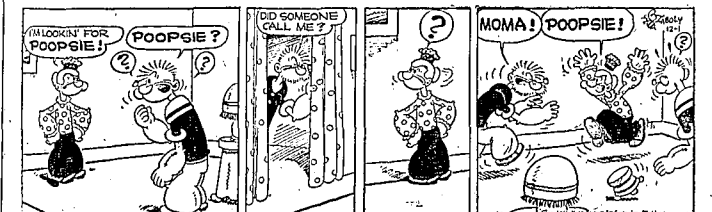
