BIG GAINS MADE IN SHIP BUILDING

NEW YORK, Dec. 4 (AP)—Shipyard has surpassed the 1942-43 new ship construction goal of 24,000,000 deadweight tons by nearly 100,000 tons, fleet manager L. Vickers, vice chairman of the U. S. Maritime commission, disclosed today.

Speaking before the University club he said that all ships produced since Dec. 7, 1941—Pearl Harbor—steamed in a column south of and beyond the coast, and formed an unbroken line extending from Maine to Scotland, or from Dutch Harbor to Tokyo.

"Helen of Troy has long been known, among other things, as the girl with the face that launched a thousand ships," he said. "I suppose you would think that the faces of Hitler and Tojo would only be good for stopping clocks. But as matters stand today, the ships they have caused to be launched make Helen look like a piker."

Vickers listed November deliveries as including merchant ships of 164 vessels totaling 1,822,000 deadweight tons.

GREATER OUTPUT ASKED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—The aircraft industry, which produced 8,780 planes in November, including more than 1,000 four-engine bombers, was called upon by War Production Board chairman Donald M. Nelson today to produce still greater numbers of still larger planes.

The November record, which Nelson described as "astounding," showed that planes rolled off the line at a rate of more than one every five minutes. Numerically, the output last month was 333 each working day and exceeded October production by 47 planes.

Production in November was 97 per cent of schedule, the highest in the history of the program, was indicated. WPA experts said on the basis of the figures that production this month would probably exceed the established goal of 9,500 planes per month.

SECT ADHERENTS GIVEN SENTENCES

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 4.—Two admitted members of a strange religious and political organization in Utah today were sentenced to federal prison for Mann act violations, but a third member was freed on the condition he enter military service.

The sentences brought to a stirring climax the government's case against the sect, known as the "Mann act" and its adherents. The trial was charged with dragging through the Utah-Nevada state line for purposes of obscenity and with violation of the Lindbergh kidnaping act. They were convicted on three counts, but a mistrial was ruled on the Lindbergh act count.

John Zenz, 34, was sentenced to five years in prison and his wife to two years in a women's reformatory. Zenz's wife was sentenced to confinement in the army. He was taken to an institution center immediately.

Despite the severe sentences, the Zenz couple maintained their belief in its religion that advocates the practice of "Mann act."

"This is no religion and I believe in it with all my heart," Mrs. Zenz told Federal Judge William T. Johnson.

"I only enter on the grounds of religious belief," the wife Zenz said.

The first time during the case, the latter declared that she had practiced the Mann act since the practice of polygamy was outlawed in 1862. She said that when John Zenz admitted that the church had repudiated the doctrine of polygamy, Zenz's sect, calling itself the "priesthood group" of the Latter-day Saints, is composed mainly of former members of the LDS church who have been excommunicated.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Irving Fisher, professor emeritus of economics at Yale university, urged the senate finance committee today to combat inflation by approving compulsory savings legislation on the rich and on corporations.

Fisher testified during the sixth day of hearings on the house-approved \$2,140,000,000 bill, entitled "Treasury officials who had proposed \$102,000,000 in new levies."

Fisher attacked increased corporation taxes as "killing many jobs that would be golden eggs," and warned that inflation was the real problem that is just beginning.

"It is hard for me to believe," he said, "that the American people are so stupid as to think that they are making the rich by these killing taxes."

"What we need is not heavy taxation on business expansion, checking that expansion," he said, "but heavier subscriptions to government loans to create more expansion."

He urged them to go to the government out of anything as the best means of preventing inflation and insisted that compulsory savings must be adopted "at once."
