STUDENT-WORKERS DESERVE PRAISE

Before dismissing their contribution to the war effort as an outstanding job well done, it might be well to make a final appraisal of the past student workers played in saving fall crops throughout Magic Valley.

Figures on the number of students who pitched in to help, the days they worked, and the amount of money they are almost unbelievable. When one stops to realize that student-workers were responsible for getting in 50 per cent of the potato crop in Twin Falls county last year, students participated in working a total of 33,281 hours and made combined earnings of \$124,248, it all measures up to a combined achievement of which every one in the county should be proud.

The same kind of record was made by school students in every county of Magic Valley where help was needed on potatoes, onions, sugar beets, apples and miscellaneous odd jobs. On a few farms graduates contributed their bit.

This is but one of many rumors that have been circulated by individuals who patronize the state liquor store. Such rumors are a point to "something fishy" being responsible for the liquor shortage.

There is one fact, that those who are doing the drinking should get straight in their minds, instead of kidding themselves. There is a serious shortage of whiskey all over the country because not a single drop of whiskey has been distributed since Oct. 1, 1942 when the entire industry turned all its facilities into the production of nothing but alcohol for war purposes for the government.

At the present unprecedented rate of demand for whiskey, such a shortage is inevitable and black market operations, the supply of whiskey in storage in the United States today would last less than a year.

The liquor shortage is a problem that is necessary. That's why the public should realize that its consumption of whiskey must be curtailed to allow its consumption of all other commodities. There are many rumors, complete and untrue, that are not good produce any more whiskey until war-time needs for alcohol have been fulfilled.

REVOLUTIONARY PLANS

ITALIANS LOSE N COMEBACK DRIVE

By REYNOLDS PACKARD
WITH THE ITALIAN FORCES OF THE FIFTH ARMY FROM THE ITALY, 3 (Delayed) 6—The Italian army was forced into retreat in its first campaign attempt since it became a "co-belligerent" of the allies, but fell back only in the face of superior numbers and heavy losses.

Meeting a vendetta against their former ally partners, Italian Bersaglieri, Alpini and regular infantry crossed no man's land in the Mugello sector at 8:20 a. m. yesterday in the first Italian action on the side of the United States and Britain since World War I.

They had reached the heights of their first objective, a hill in the mountains below Ronco, at 9:20 a. m. when the German, cross-country, artillery fire, and were advancing toward the Italian line. The attacking enemy suddenly counter-attacked with bayonets and hand grenades.

From all reports, the German put everything back into the counter-attack when they realized the Italians were opposing them. The most vicious sniping fire was the heaviest yet encountered in this sector.

The Italian line held at first, but then wavered as the enemy built up a strong position on the heights. Their loss, Bersaglieri, they were engaged in the center, shifted to the left flank to take the brunt of the counter-attack in a desperate effort to save the situation.

But the Italians were outnumbered, and their increasing casualties were forcing them into a slow retreat.

\$4.75 for Christmas Trees Too Much; Tops Around \$2

Although there is no price ceiling on Christmas trees, the sale of prices in Twin Falls stores shows that no buyer need pay more than approximately \$2 or slightly above for the largest tree. Others can be gotten at lower levels.

That was shown last night in a Times-News survey following statements issued by the rationing office and the Chamber of Commerce, both of which pointed out that some buyers are paying far more than necessary. The approximate \$2 level with an occasional very large tree at \$2.50 was tops in leading stores—but the survey showed that the trees selling at \$2 in most stores are priced at \$4.50 and \$4.75 in a few places.

Carl N. Anderson, ration board chief clerk, and the Chamber of Commerce both derided such "excessive charges." They declared that the \$4.75 \$4.75 price for a 12 tree "shows concretely what could and would happen if there were no price ceilings to help the consuming public."

Anderson explained that while there is no ceiling on Christmas trees, his office has been receiving complaints of high charges. In absence of a maximum price rule, however, his board cannot act.

"This same boosting of prices to extremely unreasonable levels, unneeded for in earning a fair margin of profit," he said, "would be the inevitable result in all lines if we had no price ceiling program."

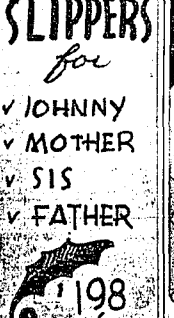
