FOOD FITS GO TO CAPTIVES WEEKLY

Packages of concentrated food sent by the International Red Cross at Geneva are distributed to prisoners of war in Europe and Asia. O. J. Donnell, director of the procedure of sending, and contents of the package, to the Twin Falls, Idaho, War Relocation Authority.

In both German and Italian prisons in Europe, American prisoners were receiving these food packages regularly according to cards and receipts sent to the International Red Cross in Geneva proper. "It is reasonable to believe that war prisoners are receiving them," said Donnell.

Philippine hospital only in the Philippines is there any real doubt as to whether or not packages are allowed to get through. Although the Japanese government had at first been uncooperative about allowing the Red Cross to make distributions, Donnell said that this attitude seems to be changing, as reports from International Red Cross headquarters indicate that the Japanese are now allowed to be distributed in many of their prison camps.

Leaving the contents of the food kits, he said that there was supposed to be sufficient food for each prisoner a week and keep him in good health even though he received no additional nutrition.

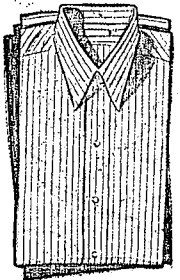

BURDEN—The first session of the 76th congress will have established an all-time record for taxing and appropriations for the federal government.

Capitol hill records were assembled which show that the 76th congress has appropriated the complete bill.

Appropriations for the 1944 fiscal year total 14 billion and 600,000,000. Of this amount only 11 billion was allocated to the military and naval departments and the civilian establishments.

The balance was for war purposes, including \$1,800,000,000 for the war against Germany and Japan.

Since July 1, 1942, 300 million dollars has been voted for the battle against the Axis, the equivalent of the total amount of the national debt.

Each set aside for lend-lease or available through transfer of departmental funds is approximately 60 billion dollars.

To carry this tremendous burden, congress has voted the public debt limit from 160 billion to 210 billion.

It passed two revenue bills, which, according to House and senate committee Chairman Robert W. Taft, will raise about 45 billion in one year of operation. This is the largest amount of resources in 1943 since the five billion 700 million dollar.

THE PROPOSED LIMIT ON TAXES

In recent years, as the urge to use the powers of taxation as a means of accomplishing so-called social objectives has become more and more popular, the tendency has been to extend to an extraordinary understanding of federal power and authority.

The powers given the federal government by the 19th amendment are too much for any government to possess over its states and individual citizens, and this has at last become apparent to a great many who formerly were inclined to overlook abuses of these powers.

Now the tendency is being advanced on the theory that the only way the government can be stopped from squandering money and abusing its powers is to place a limit on taxation. The proposal calls for a 22nd amendment to the constitution to limit the power of congress to impose taxes on income, inheritance and gifts to a maximum rate of 25 per cent, except in the case of war.

It may be surprising to many of us to learn that 15 state legislatures already have passed a resolution which asks congress to submit this proposed amendment to the states for ratification. States that have passed such resolutions are Wyoming, Rhode Island, Mississippi, Iowa, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Indiana, Arkansas, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Texas, Illinois, Wisconsin and Alabama.

It is pointed out that the proposed 25 per cent limitation on taxes is not necessarily the exact figure that should be finally established, but that some definite line should be drawn to give our American economy a sound basis upon which to reestablish its progress and confidence.

All are agreed that nothing should interfere with our present war effort, but a growing sentiment contends that the proposed amendment should be made a definite place in all post-war planning.

In a brief in support of the proposal, Robert B. Dresser of Providence, R. I., sets out the purposes of the amendment as follows:

1. To increase the national wealth and over the years the government's revenue from taxation, and to deprive the federal government of the power through unsound and confiscatory taxation to impoverish the American private enterprise system.
2. To deprive the federal government of the power through taxation to destroy the American system of government by concentrating all power in Washington and rendering the states completely subservient to it.

The proposal naturally brings up the question as to whether or not such a limitation would prevent raising enough revenue to balance the post-war budget. Dresser has this answer:

"The statistics of income furnished by the treasury department years ago prove conclusively that excessively high income tax rates produce less revenue than moderate rates. These statistics show that the rate of steadily increasing aggregate income of all taxpayers for the years 1916 through 1920, when the maximum surtax rates went from 13 to 65 per cent, the number of large taxpayers increased by 100 per cent.

"On the other hand, over the period of 1924 through 1928, when the peak rate of surtax was maintained at 70 per cent, the number of large taxpayers decreased over 100 per cent. If we ever expect to repay the national debt, the lesson we have to learn is that excessively high tax rates are not only destructive of enterprise but also of confidence. It is only through a drastic reduction in tax rates and the elimination of waste and extravagance that we can hope to maintain a balanced budget after the war and pay the federal debt."

The nation is facing a post-war debt of perhaps 300 billion dollars, the interest charges on which are likely to be at least six billion a year. This can only mean that all non-essential governmental expenditures must be eliminated and that everything possible must be done to swell the national income through increased production.

It is hoped that if a sufficient number of states adopt the tax limitation resolution and thus indicate a substantial demand for the amendment, congress will be forced to take action by 32 states, will pass the resolution by a two-thirds vote of both houses. The amendment would then be submitted for ratification by three-fourths of the states as provided by Article V of the constitution.
