NAZI DESCRIBES MURDER OF BEDS

MOSCOW, Dec. 17 (AP)—The Moscow press reported today that two of their four pages to the Kharkov atrocity trial of German soldiers accused of murdering 100,000 Jews and Russian prisoners of war.
 The second yesterday began with the questioning of Landwehr by the prosecutor, colonel of the justice department N. K. Chertok. He told the press that this account of the trial:
 "The trial of the questioning, Landwehr was asked:
 "It is established that orders for the mass extermination of innocent Soviet people were issued by the German government."
 "He answered:
 "The Kharkov trial then related how 100,000 Jews and prisoners of war were killed in the Kharkov prison to prevent their escape."
 "Then he asked Landwehr:
 "How many Soviet citizens did you kill yourself?"
 "It is hard to say exactly but I think about 100," Landwehr answered.
 "How many were killed by the Germans in Kharkov and Kharovk?"
 "I heard about 30,000 and about 100,000 in the Kharovk area," the prisoner's published testimony said. "About 15,000 were killed in Poland."

 News of the citation was in the form of a personal letter to his parents from Lieut.-Col. Allen P. Erickson, commanding officer.
 "On Aug. 22, 1943 your son, at the risk of his own life saved a companion from his battery by jumping into the ocean and rescuing him. Only by his bravery and willingness to risk his life did your son able to save his buddy. The ocean was rough and more than once he was carried under by the swift current causing him to strike his head upon the coral."
 "This medal was presented to your son by General Clegg at an appropriate ceremony... I am proud and honored to be the commanding officer of such a fine group of American boys of which your son is a member."
 McDrummond enlisted on Nov. 24, 1939 and has been overseas nearly two years.
