FDR ERASES WAR NEWS 'BARRIERS'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—President Roosevelt, taking stern measures to prevent leaks of important war information, today directed the war and navy secretaries and the director of the office of information to refuse to issue in advance for release to the public any information to be given in a future hour, any news having a security value.

"The American people," he said in a memorandum, "want promptly all the news which can be told safely, and they are entitled to have it without the interpolation of artificial barriers."

"The text of his memorandum: 'You are fully aware, I know, of the regrettable confusions which have arisen recently over the issuance of official news relative to the war, particularly in connection with the conferences at Cairo and Tehran.'

"We may all be proud that American newspapers, news agencies and broadcast news kept the faith and observed the release dates, which had been fixed by international agreement. It is most disappointing that such loyalty should have been penalized by failures elsewhere."

"I see no point in prolonging controversy over that matter, the important thing is that we take positive action to prevent a recurrence. To that end your department, and all other branches of the government will be guided by the following:

"First, no information having a security value in connection with the war will be issued in advance for release to the public at some

BEEF SUBSIDIES BASED ON GRADE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The defense supplies corporation announced today that future subsidy payments to meat packers will be based on the grade of the meat rather than the weight of the carcass.

The payments currently are being made on the basis of cents a pound less weight on all cattle slaughtered.

The graduated scale, the agency said, will be effective on all beef slaughtered after the 7th of the month. The packer's most accounting period following Dec. 23.

The new prices are: A or choice, one cent; A of good, 1 1/2 cents; B or commercial medium, 3 cents; C, utility or common, quarter and cutter, 3 1/2 cents; D, 4 cents.

The portion of the carcass which was explained to be having a maximum number of pounds of meat in it is to be set aside at the same time discounting the weight of the carcass. Hence the lower price will be given on A or choice grade.

Arrangements of the change are included with the action of the office of price administration and the war food administration. The war food administration is to be the maximum number of pounds of meat in it may spread for the entire year for full subsidy payment.

CIVILIAN SUPPLY OF LARD SCARCE

 TWIN FALLS, Dec. 18.—Despite an anticipated increase in lard production in the 12 months which began Jan. 1, the supply for civilian consumption may not rise from its present level, S. A. McMurray, provincial expert of Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Broun, said today.

McMurray asserted there was a broad demand for lard from the soap industry and from expanding military, headless and triangular-tube lard markets. He stated that lard would serve to control civilian supply.

Adequate tank out facilities for quick loading of surplus, McMurray said, and producers buying last year had meeting freely in the past and the future supply depended upon the having in hand and out the soap industry.

"Otherwise," he said, "we would have lard and will be continuing to 'eat-of-the-land'."

14,000 of 18,000 "Missing" Found

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP).—More than 14,000 American soldiers out of some 18,000 actually listed as missing in action in the Philippines have now been reported prisoners of war, including 54 out of 69 heroic army nurses.

Of the total 1,516 have been reported to have died from disease in Japanese prison camps; another 200 died of wounds.

The inclusion of 10 army nurses in today's prisoner of war releases by the war department bring to 77 the number of nurses accounted for out of the 84 who were of American and Canadian. Most of the other 11 are believed to be alive, and hopes are felt that they will ultimately be heard from.

"Mercy" Slaying Of Woman Probed

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 18 (AP).—The apparent "mercy slaying" of a 55-year-old Alder, Wash., woman was being investigated by sheriff's officers today after the woman's son allegedly admitted killing her through with a fishing knife "because she suffered too much."

The son, Alfred Norberg, 31, was treated at the county hospital for cuts and bruises after the car, he was driving crashed over a 50-foot embankment following the slaying.

The body of Mrs. Mary Norberg was found in a dog house at her home at Alder, 30 miles southeast of here. Neighbors said she was feeding a dog there, she was also trucked.

Norberg was held on an open charge and was to be questioned at length today.
