CARE OF YOUR CHILDREN

Skiping in school means that the child is a class without doing the work assigned to that division. It is a bad practice and one that does the student most harm. Children grow by experience and not by words. Numerous facts and marks recorded in a book. School courses are laid down by experts who in agreement with the parents of the community, have selected them for their value in school careers. These courses have been divided into units, each tied to the one before and following. If one is left out, there is a break in the line and that means the child suffered the break in his learning.

Ahead of His Class
The skipping is usually done in the early grades. Bright children memorize swiftly, talk glibly, and are through with their work before their classmates. "He's ahead of his class," is usually said to skip and get ahead. Why? Why lose that unit of work? Why hurry through school? Where is he going when he gets out?

Any sensible teacher will agree that the child who completes his work long before the rest of the class should have a more intensive course and fuller opportunity to learn. Give that to him. Keep him busy applying the work he has learned, doing more reading, helping others about him. But don't skip the class above.

Where Inexperience Is Noted
We have had pupils in the first years of high school who did not fit in anywhere, class or playground or society because they had been hurried through school on the basis of their achievement studies without regard to their physical growth, their psychological and social growth.

Children live in a children's world. To develop normally, they must live among children. Those who learn out of books with ease and rapidly have not outgrown their need for companionship with children their own age. They must have that in order to grow normally, and to live adequately. When they are placed with older people who are matured where these are still children, they are deeply unhappy and their normal life and happiness suffer.

Let children have their full complement of years growth. Give them every opportunity for enriched growth that they can accept. But let there be normal associations with their own set lest they lose their way in life completely. SKIPPING will not serve here. It is harmful to the child it is intended to help.

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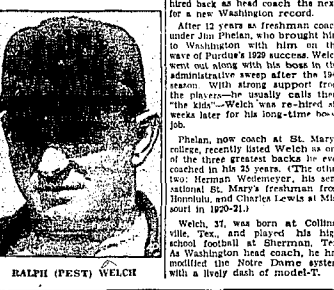

CANS PROVE JAP ARMY USING GAS

 HEADQUARTERS, CHINESE ARMY SOMEWHERE IN THE HINDIAN FRONT
 18 (Delayed) — Green and red marked cylinders of tear and sleeping gas which the Japanese are accused of using on this front were exhibited today to visitors at the United States consulate in Chungking, and correspondents and sample given to an American major to carry to Laos, China, India, and elsewhere.

As indicated in my correspondence with Gen. P. P. Vardini, assistant military attaché of the United States embassy at Chungking, who Jotted down the complete details as Lt. Gen. Lamm Han-ning, commanding this army, talked about the cylinders.

Among the samples was a yellow marked, foot-foot gas cylinder, resembling a fire extinguisher, which I think is identical to the one which had once contained mustard gas. There was no claim, however, that the gas in this particular cylinder had ever been used against the Chinese.

The red and sleeping gas were used recently on the Hainan peninsula, the United States military attaché told me. The Japanese in this territory are reported to have used the sleeping gas on the Hainan peninsula of the south coast and in the Hainan peninsula, which was suffering gas, from which fatalities were reported. The Japanese of this gas is no more toxic than that of war.

The mustard gas cylinders which were taken to Stridwell, was seen to drop from a Japanese plane that was flying over the Hainan peninsula. Mr. Han-ning, the chemical expert, said it was empty when found, he added, but he asserted that mustard gas had been used by the Japanese on other fronts.

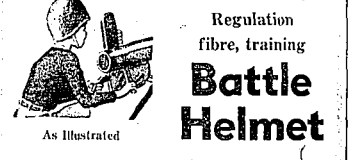
