RUSSIAN ADVANCE TRAPS NAZI TANK ARMY IN UCRRAINE

By HENRY C. CASSIDY MOSCOW, Dec. 27 (AP)—The first army's new winter offensive across the Ukraine was reported today to have cut the Kiev-Zhitomir highway, trapping a German tank and infantry force. Gen. Nikolai Vatutin's first Ukrainian army pushed west along both sides of this road, advancing within 20 miles of Zhitomir, biggest prize of the Germans' disastrous autumn attack.

The Russians continued to edge forward through the Vitkef fortifications in the Ukraine around the city from the northwest, east and southeast and continue to capture miles of this German base.

The Russian offensive in the Ukraine brought one of the most dramatic reversals of the long war from front. It was mounted at a point where the Germans had poured tank divisions and a huge infantry force early in November to invade the Ukraine. The Germans had expected to capture 200,000 Germans, but the tank divisions were captured.

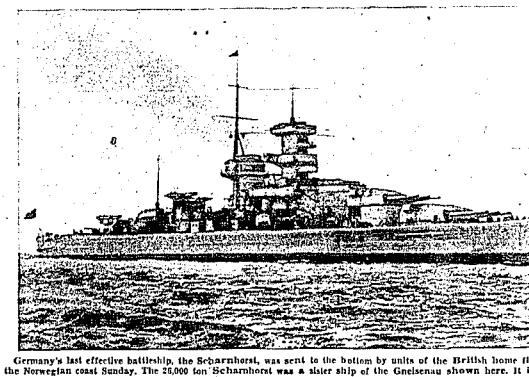

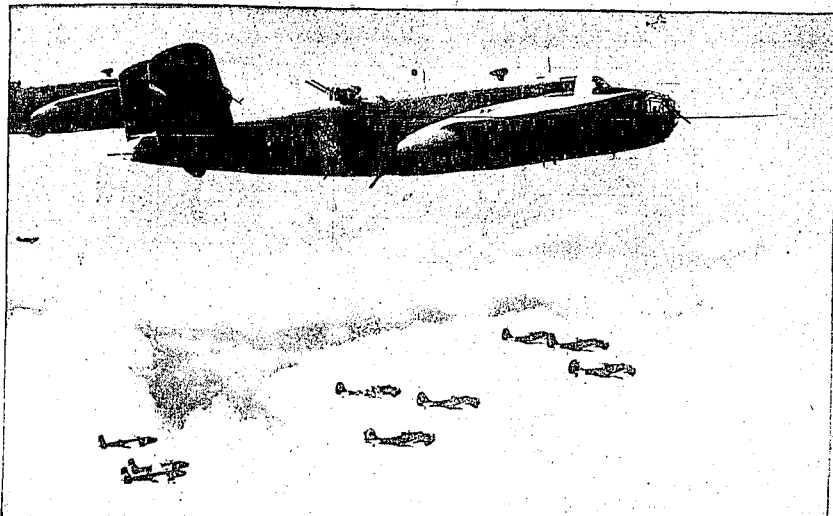
