**House Overrides Tax Bill veto by 209-95 Vote**  
**Senate Passage Predicted**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—Expressing strict rebellion against President Roosevelt's veto today voters 209 to 95 to pass the \$2,300,000,000 revenue bill, only the second time since 1932 that the House has overridden a presidential veto.

The Senate is expected to duplicate the vote early tomorrow, putting the tax bill on the statute books, "the President's objections notwithstanding."

A resolution in Democratic ranks that reeled political Washington back on its heels predicted the house action. Involved were Senate Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky, and Chairman Taft of Ohio, both of the ways and means committee, both of whom called for action overruling the President.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—Sen. Allen W. Barkley of Kentucky today resigned as Democratic floor leader of the Senate, but agreed to accept the post anew when his colleagues unanimously rejected a vote of confidence in his tax bill split with President Roosevelt.

The Democratic caucus today adopted a resolution proposed by Sen. Joseph W. Eastland, D.-Miss., which asked Barkley to resign and accept the post anew.

# FLEET SEARCHING FOR JAP'S NAVY

The United States Pacific fleet, big enough to be both bold and persistent, still is hunting for the elusive Japanese navy.

Last Thursday and Friday the hunt turned to Truk in capital strength, the Jap navy apparently wasn't there. Tuesday the Americans had a look 100 miles beyond Truk in the Marianas. What was found remains to be disclosed.

That is one view to be taken of the latest news from Pearl Harbor. The whereabouts of the Jap fleet may continue to be one of the most frequently asked questions of the Pacific war. After the Truk attack, Tokyo radio took pains to explain to nippon that the Jap fleet had moved for a moment of opportunity moment. For the defense of Japan?

Last Feb. 4 when two Liberators flew north from the Suoyon to take photographs of Truk in preparation for the forthcoming carrier plane assaults were reconnaissance flights, reported sighting two carriers in the 40-mile wide lagoon. Where these carriers were located would be capital ships to prevent the Jap from attacking the island.

Yet when the results were in on the two-day air pounding of Truk the largest ship located was a transport and a cruiser. Pearl Harbor correspondents were permitted to see their dispatches that the big units of the Japanese navy may have taken warning and left Truk between Feb. 4 and Feb. 16.

Did they go to the Marianas?

The Truk attack shocked Japan. Tokyo radio admitted losses virtually matching those announced by Admiral Nimitz. Premier Tojo drastically shook up his war cabinet.

Now, while still stunned by that stroke, Japan gets the news that another powerful carrier fleet has fallen even closer to the home islands—and in less than a week's time.

A force of carriers and battleships moving near enough to the Marianas to send out planes must be directed by any threat to its rear by Japanese warships at Truk. Therefore, the pilots of American planes which bombed Truk must have brought back encouraging reports.

# BRITISH RELEASE ON POLITICS HIT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—Senator Byrd, D. Va., asked Wednesday for an investigation to determine whether the British distributed to American troops a tabloid newspaper containing a story that political opponents of President Roosevelt are ready to spend \$50,000,000 to defeat him for reelection.

HAGERMAN N. V., Feb. 24.—Dr. J. E. H. H. Bakelite, 80, inventor of bakelite, one of the most successful plastics, died here today in a hospital where he had been a patient for several months.

Dr. Bakelite was working on the production of an artificial warfish in his Yonkers, N. Y., laboratory in the early days when he found he had made a hard, transparent, lustrous, unalterable resin which he thought might have value as a new type of material.

Successful in producing the substance in the form of bottles and pipe stems, the Hagerman chemist announced his discovery at the Chemists club in New York in 1906.

In New York City there are 433 pipe stems and more than 6,000 hand lances.

# DIFFICULTY SEEN IN RECONVERSION

NEW YORK, Feb. 24 (AP)—War developments are making it more apparent every day that the convulsions of reconversion may be harsher and more painful than earlier estimates indicated.

The declarations by Prime Minister Churchill, Secretary Knox and President Roosevelt that the European phase of the war must continue into 1945, together with the heightened pace of the offensive against the Japanese in the Pacific lead to this possibility.

The period between the end of the European war and the end of the Pacific war may be much shorter than the 18-month basis on which so many postwar industrial planners have been counting.

While there are scores of postwar planning groups few have allowed for that possibility and therefore may find their carefully outlined programs marred.

Another obstacle to most planning pointed out last week by Harold K. Brown, a former director of the national planning council of Atlantic City, is that while there are many groups now working on postwar employment there are few which regard it as their main concern.

The Postwar Business Week, discussing the two basic economic problems, worked out by Senator George and Leonard Hatch committee.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—Food pills for horses, designed to give Dobbin his chow in concentrated form, have been developed experimentally by the U. S. department of agriculture.

The new measurement for insect was produced during investigation made at the army's request and aimed at developing concentrated rations to eliminate difficulties of transporting bulky meals for cavalry and artillery troops. It is the bulkier part of traditional rations.

Studies for the army have been completed, but agricultural department researchers said the concentrated rations still need to be made "feasible" possibilities for use by domestic horses in military areas far removed from the big stables.

A daily diet made with the pill ration weighs 20 per cent less than the standard standard ration, and occupies one-half as much space to transport.

It contains more grain than the standard diet, but grain is much bulkier than hay. Two feed concentrates—alfalfa leaf meal and oat bran—fill out the diet.

Served in Pellets  
Instead of being served as hay as are hay and grain, the new ration pops up in feed bags in the form of pellets about the size of pebbles. Of course, a horse can't make a meal out of one pellet—he has to eat hundreds of them—but each still contains all ingredients of the diet.

The agriculture department's bureau of animal industry, in its annual report, said that horses doing ordinary farm work were maintaining for six months in excellent condition on the concentrated rations.
