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## Utah Captures Basket Crown

NEW YORK, March 31 (AP) — Utah's blitz kids, winners of the N.C.A.A. title, reached basketball heights last night by defeating St. John's, victor of the national invitation tournament, 43 to 36, in a Red Cross benefit game that attracted 18,125 fans to Madison Square Garden.

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# WORKERS OUT OF STATE VOTE

BOISE, March 31 (AP)—Idaho out-of-state voters as well as her soldiers, have an opportunity to register by mail for the state elections as the result of an opinion today by Attorney General J. H. # Night for the Morrow

LITTLE JAN  
Jan had a friend in America, a young man in New York. Frequent letters came from him, describing in glowing language the wonders of living in the United States. In 1910 Jan came to New York, bringing with him his bride, Maria, the daughter of a neighbor of Jan's parents.

Jan was a personable young man, tall, husky, with a square chin and a head that seemed to come out of a cloud. He soon secured employment in a hotel.

Two children were born to Jan and Maria in New York. The first was a son, named for his father, Jan. The second was a daughter, named for his mother, Maria. Jan was a good father, and Maria was a good mother. They were both of the same age, six, and were both of the same sex, boys.

Jan Merick was somewhat older than most of his neighbors. There were no other Czechs in the neighborhood and, though his grandfather mastered the language, Jan's grandfather was not so readily adapted to America or to Colorado. But his grandfather appeared to suffer from grief at the loss of her son, the seldom left the farm. For these reasons, Jan Merick developed few close friendships. Yet he loved Colorado, the bright air of the sunny high altitude, and most of all, the chance of creating a little world of his own.

He did this on a temporary basis, for he had already seen drought in Colorado. But during the overabundance of the war and the exorbitance of high prices and abundant rainfall, Jan found that fighting with food was a most profitable endeavor. With his earnings he was able to pay fully for several square miles of brown Colorado soil and to improve his land with fences and fine buildings.

All of this happened, however, Jan was born or old enough to be a thoroughly qualified observer. My first impression of Jan Merick was when I was about six years old, at this time an incident occurred which created between my grandfather and Jan a bond that had more friendship and comradeship in it than is customary between grandfather and grandson.

My grandfather had died the year before, in October of 1921. My father, mother and I were living in town, where father had a job selling cars for an enterprising local automobile agency. Grandfather and a hired man lived on the farm, cooked their own meals, did the housework in lachrym fashion. The hired man ran more to muscle than mentality, and other than for anti-
